Deborah Jean is daughter of Mrs. Ruby Swadley of Wichita Falls and Holmes W. Swadley jr. of Olney.

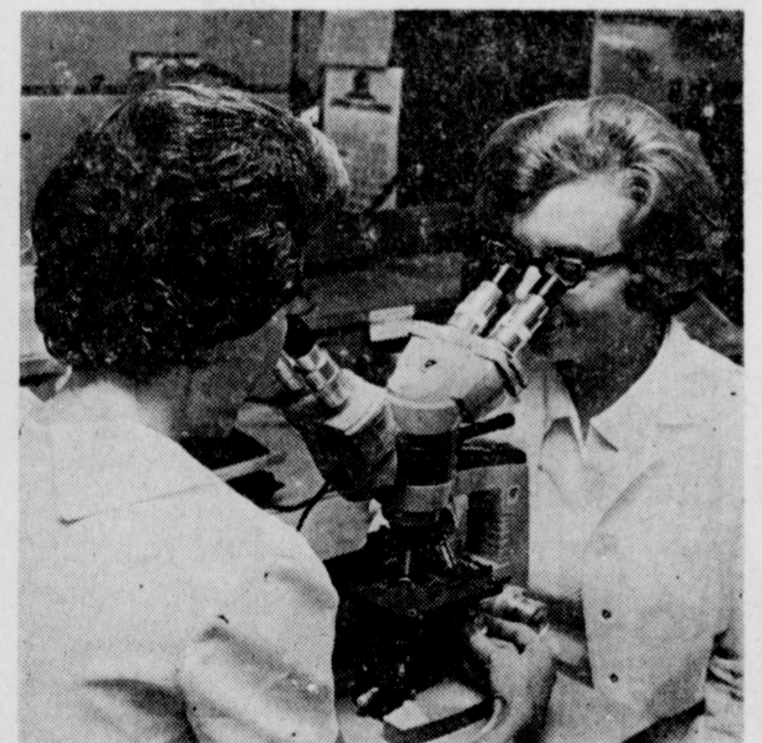
Mikel is son of Mr. and Mrs. O. Ray Brookshire of Iowa Park.

Bonds Accept'd by State

Iowa Park's newly approved water program was given state approval Tuesday at the Water Development Board meeting.

WDB approved two loans totaling \$975,000 to the City of Iowa Park and Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 for a water pipeline and storage and treatment facilities, and a third loan of \$80,000 to Iowa Park for improvements to the sewage treatment system here.

WDB will buy \$375,000 in general obligation (tax) bonds from the City and \$400,000 in unlimited tax bonds from the water district.

Mayor Erwin F. Soell, Gaines Maness, member of the water board, W. J. Wischmeyer, engineer, and W. Wallace Payne, financial adviser, appeared at the WDB meeting.

Iowa Park has negotiated a 30-year contract with Wichita Falls to buy up to a million gallons of treated water daily. A pipeline is to be built for receiving the water.

Payne said final plans on the project are expected soon with bids to be out within six weeks.

OUR SOIL ★ OUR STRENGTH

Local sponsors of the Wichita Valley - Pond Creek Watershed project met with property owners and Soil Conservation Service officials Wednesday in the county commissioners court room.

S. H. Lowder, chairman of the project's steering committee, explained the need to get a flood control project approved for the protection of residents, land, roads and other property in the area west of Wichita Falls in the WV-PC watershed.

Donald Hill of Iowa Park related the status of the proposal, which was first applied for in 1962 and has since been stalled by federal limitations on irrigation improvements. Hill explained that the major purpose must be flood control. Speaking for Wichita Soil and Water Conservation district, he stated the group recently requested the state office to develop an acceptable plan to help prevent future floodings.

Gary Batte, district conservationist at Iowa Park, reported that damages from the August 15 flood has been set at \$663,600 and the figure is expected to reach a million dollars when all estimates are in. A special report has been sent to SCS state office in Temple.

Lowder concluded the meeting by asking that each of the other sponsors request SCS to develop an acceptable flood control plan to be developed.

Besides the commissioners court and WSWSD, other sponsors of the project are Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 2 and Red River Authority.

A big plus for cottonseed is its adaptability to most of the countries that have fast population growth, combined with acute food and protein shortages.

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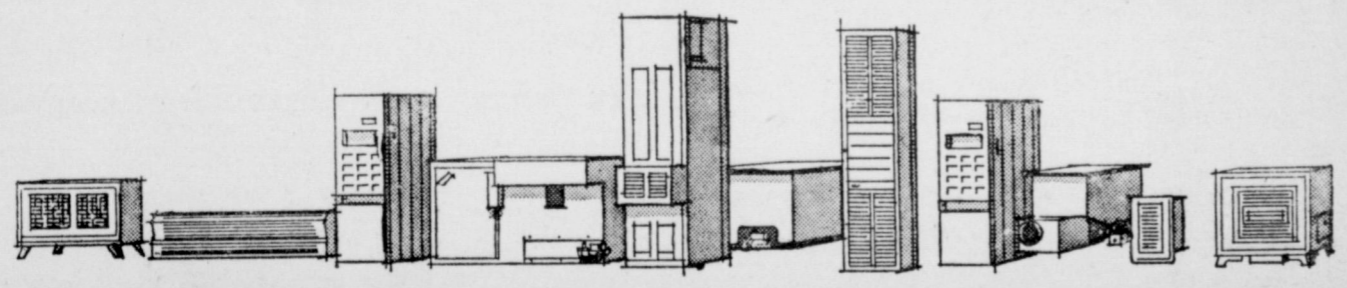

BRANDS S.B. No. 249 AN ACT
relating to the recording and re-recording of livestock brands and marks.

Be it enacted by the Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. (a) This Act shall apply to every county in this state. In all the counties each owner of any livestock mentioned in Chapter 1 of Title 121 of the Revised Civil Statutes of 1925 shall within six months after this Act takes effect have his mark and brand for such stock recorded in the office of the country clerk of the county. These owners shall record the marks and brands whether the brands and marks have been previously recorded or not.

(b) The owner shall have the right to have his mark and brand recorded in his name who accord-

ing to the present records of the county first recorded the brand and mark in the county, or in event it can not be ascertained from the records who first recorded the brand and mark in the county, then the person who has been using such mark and brand the longest shall have the right to have the brand and mark recorded in his name.

(c) After the expiration of six months from the taking effect of this Act all records of marks and brands now in existence in the county shall no longer have any force or effect and after the expiration of six months only the records made after this Act takes effect shall be examined or considered in recording marks and brands in the county.

Sec. 3. All brands and marks registered under the provisions of

this Act shall be re-registered every 10 years in the manner prescribed in Section 1 of this Act. (Sept. 1971)
