

Iowa Park's newly approved water program was given state approval Tuesday at the Water Development Board meeting.

WDB approved two loans totaling \$975,000 to the City of Iowa Park and Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3 for a water pipeline and storage and treatment facilities, and a third loan of \$80,000 to Iowa sewage treatment system here. WDB will buy \$575,000 in gen-
