Fourth Quarter Rally Falls Short; Hawks Lose to Electra, 6-9

The seasoned Electra Tigers out-fought the valiant Hawks on their home field in the season opener here last Friday night, to eke out a 9-6 victory.

The Hawks couldn't find an offensive pattern which would net them yardage in the first half. They could do nothing right.

First-game-itis caught up with the Hawks, and their lack of experience was noticeable to every one of the 1200 onlookers who were backing them with every ounce of their moral support.

Every Hawk fan could see a possible victory for the Hawks right up until the last dying seconds.

Iowa Park gave up a touchdown, conversion, and a safety, all in the first half.

Electra scored after Fenner's punt had been run back 56 yards by Norman Rodawalt. Officials observed an over-anxious Tiger clipping and placed the ball some 27 yards from the goal line. In three plays Electra moved to the 15, from where Rodawalt burst thru the left side and scored standing up. Nelson Baird tacked on the PAT with a perfect kick.

Electra was awarded a safety when on third down Fenner attempted a punt. The pass from center eluded Fenner and bounded out of the endzone for an automatic 2-pointer.

The third quarter was much the same with the Tigers piling up yardage and first downs but failing to score.

In the fourth quarter a brilliant pass and run play from Klinkerman to David Sewell covered 72 yards. Two plays later Fenner cut through his own left side for the score. The Hawk try for point from placement was wide to the right.

The Hawks fought desperately in the final moments and had all their runs on tiptoe as Klinkerman completed two passes for good yardage and the Hawks seemed on the way to another touchdown and an upset. But the Tigers intercepted and then ran out the clock with ground plays.

Between halves the bands of both schools put on brilliant displays of marching, twirling and music.

The Hawks play Friday night at Valley View.

Iowa Park Set High Mark in X-ray Survey

The free x-ray survey was a huge success in Iowa Park, Wednesday.

We had a record number of 865 examinations made from 9:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. with George Strickland of the state health department as technician.

Strickland has recently returned from Korea, where he served two years in the armed forces. He had been with the health department two years before entering the service. The Wichita county survey was his first assignment since returning to the state health department.

The survey here also put the county over the top with 16,753 x-rays, according to Miss Margaret Hall, executive secretary of the county tuberculosis association. The survey which ended here began in the county on Aug. 19. A previous record was 13,497 examinations in 1953.

Miss Ethyle Kidwell served as chairman of the Iowa Park survey, which was conducted at Metz Appliance. She was assisted by members of the PTA, Modern Music and 23 Study Clubs, ESA, Council of Church Women, C of C, Boy Scouts, Texas Electric Service company, ministers of the various churches, and many other civic-minded persons.

We can be assured now the mobile unit will be back next year. Iowa Park was on probation because just a few over 500 took advantage of it last year.

The turnout Wednesday has proved Iowa Park wants this service again next year.

Lions Learn About Finding Uranium

Bob Carpenter of Wichita Falls was guest speaker at Lions club luncheon Tuesday, and put on a demonstration of prospecting for uranium ore for his interested listeners.

"Prospecting for uranium," said Carpenter, "differs from other types of mineral prospecting in one important respect. Due to the development of portable Geiger counters and Scintillometers, it is not necessary that the uranium prospector be able to identify radioactive minerals or have knowledge of mineralogy.

"It is desirable that he have some knowledge of elementary geology easily acquired by reading and observation, so he can recognize disturbances in rocks such as veins, faults, shear zones, intrusions of one rock into another. And it would be helpful to be able to distinguish some of the main types of rocks, but this knowledge is not necessary.

"A person equipped with a Geiger counter or Scintillometer can systematically traverse favorable areas, listening for indications of the presence of radio-active minerals, or he could test all rock outcrops encountered, old mines, prospecting pits, dumps and the like.

Having found a deposit, he can send samples to the government for free assaying. Thus the amateur has a chance of finding uranium deposits even though lacking expert knowledge and experience.

"Anyone can learn to operate Geiger counters and Scintillometers. Perhaps the most important qualifications are that he should enjoy outdoor life and have some knowledge of woodcraft."



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


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Junior News

September Hymn-of-the-Month

Recommended by the Iowa Park Modern Music Study Club.

"O Love that wilt not let me go" George Matheson, D.D., was born in Glasgow, Scotland, March 27, 1842. His father was a wealthy merchant and the family was concerned over the condition of the boy's eyesight from his earliest years.

After his graduation from the University of Glasgow this condition became worse, and his sisters learned Hebrew, Greek and Latin in order to help him with his studies.

Dr. Matheson became a brilliant preacher, an author of distinction and a scholar of note. He served as pastor of a popular seaside resort for 18 years, and many families came there year after year to benefit from his preaching.

Later he served a membership of nearly 2,000 in Edinburgh until the last few years of his life. It is interesting that he was regarded as extremely punctilious in his pastoral duties, being accompanied on his calls by a sister who lived with him.

Regarding the writing of the words to "O Love that wilt not let me go," Dr. Matheson wrote, "I was suffering from extreme mental distress and the hymn was the fruit of pain." He also wrote that it was the quickest bit of work he ever did in his life and that it was completed in five minutes with no retouching except the changing of one word. He had the feeling of "having it dictated to me by some inward voice rather than of working it out myself."

St. Margaret, the tune to which we sing this hymn, was written especially for the words by Dr. A. L. Peace, also of Scotland, and an organist of note.

All choirs of Our Town are invited to acquaint themselves with this hymn and to use it in their services during September.

O Love that wilt not let me go,
I rest my weary soul in Thee;
I give Thee back the life I owe,
That in Thine ocean depths its flow
May richer, fuller be!

O Light that followest all my way,
I yield my flickering torch to Thee;
My heart restores its borrowed ray,
That in Thy sunshine's blaze its day
May brighter, fairer be.

O Joy that seekest me through pain,
I cannot close my heart to Thee;
I trace the rainbow thru the rain,
And feel the promise is not vain
That morn shall tearless be.
O Cross that liftest up my head,
I dare not ask to fly from Thee;
I lay in dust life's glory dead,
And from the ground there blossoms red
Life that shall endless be.

SHADE TREES NEED A LITTLE HELP

Shade trees sapped by another summer of sparse rainfall need a little help from their owners.

An ailing tree's condition can be improved greatly with water and fertilizer, says B. T. Haws, county agent. To accomplish this, build a circular dike around the trees to hold water four inches deep in the basin. The diameter of the basin, size of the tree's shade canopy. A dike six feet in diameter is suggested for small trees and shrubs.

Spread a commercial fertilizer on the soil within the dike. The formula and application rate depend upon the inherent fertility of the soil. As a starter, one pound of 16-20-0 to every 100 square feet of surface is recommended.

Fill the basin to a depth of four inches and allow to soak in. During the hot dry part of the year repeat waterings at seven to 10 day intervals, but discontinue during the seasons.

Fertilize every 30 days during the growing season and withhold fertilizer as the tree goes into dormancy. Water every time fertilizer is applied.

eligible seed. Fertilizers that may
be approved are 0-20-2, 0-30-0 and
13-39-0.

Those working with the district
believe this practice offers co-
operators a good opportunity to
make good use of diverted acreage
and also to use a legume in their
cropping system.

Grazing and haying are permit-
ted, but not harvesting for grain or
seed.

Buford Whiteside of Electra,
farming two miles north of Iowa
Park has completed terracing the
west side of his farm, Precinct 3
did the construction.

J. L. Pennington of Electra, farm-
ing at Sunshine Hill, has completed
1.2 miles of terraces for cropland.
