Local people honored at district FFA event

Iowa Park held much of the limelight Monday in Vernon during the annual Wichita District meeting of the Future Farmers of America.

Besides two adults being presented two awards, two students were ranked high in voting and the chapter was recognized with an award.

The Honorary Lone Star Farmer Degree was presented to Virgil Woodfin, superintendent of the Texas A&M Experiment Station here, and Richard Davis, Iowa Park Vocational Agriculture teacher. The degree is the highest recognition which can be bestowed on an adult on the state level.

Ray Dillard, IPHS senior, is president of the District. He served as master of ceremonies during the banquet.

Becky Powell, Iowa Park Chapter Sweetheart, was voted runner up in the District Sweetheart contest in which 16 candidates

were entered, Cathy Morrison of Byers was named Sweetheart.

Five members of the local chapter received the Lone Star Farmer Degree. They were Jeff Blaker, Duncan Spruiell, Tim Hunter, Joe Williamson and Steve Holder. Besides the Vernon chapter, which had six, no other chapter had more than two receiving the degree.

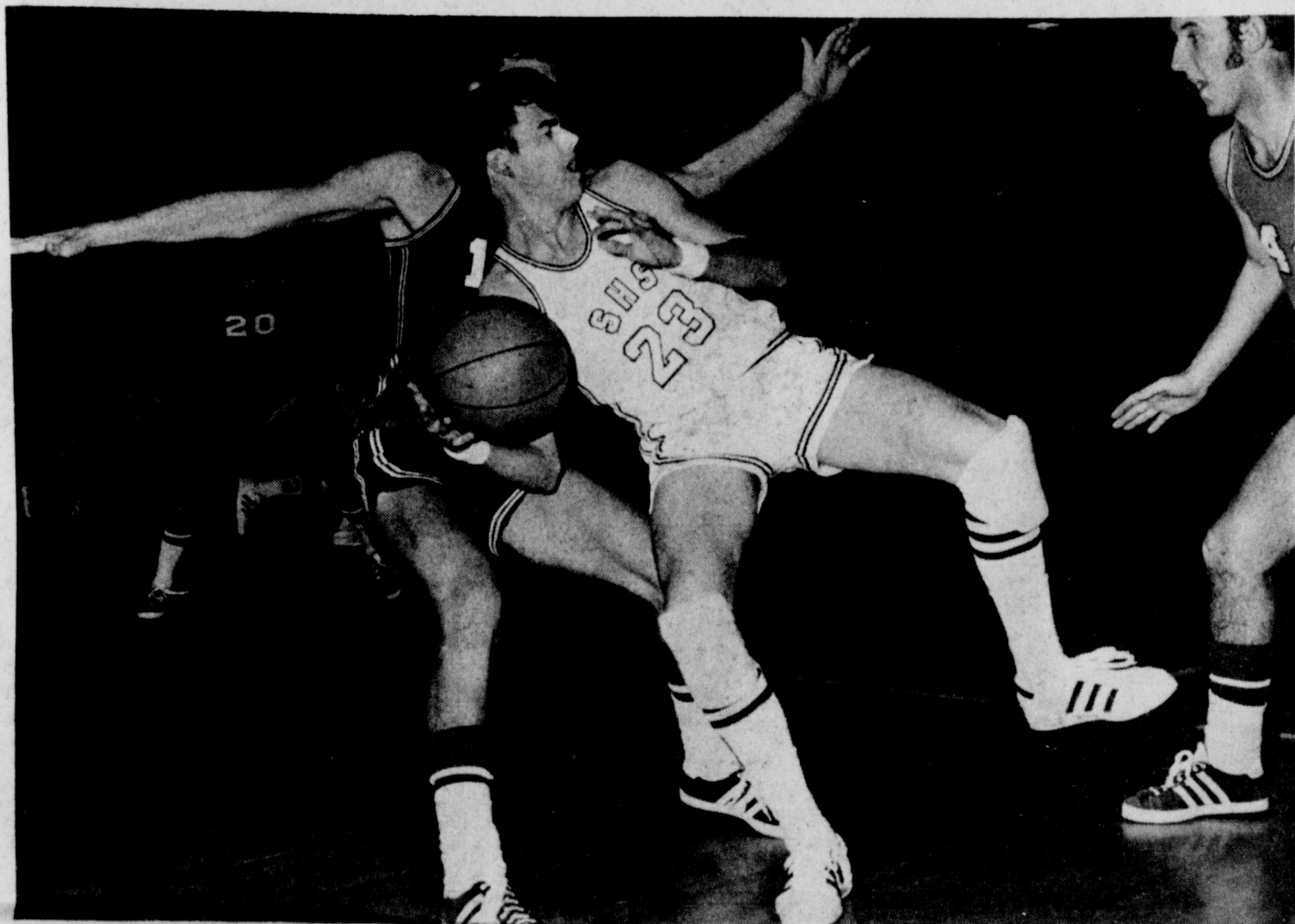
Iowa Park was one of eight chapters receiving the gold chapter award. Others recognized were Midway, Northside, Quanah, Vernon, Bellvue, Chillicothe, Electra and Henrietta.

Davis was also named co-adviser with Clint House of Midway to the slate of district officers for the coming year.

Vernon Vocational Agriculture teacher, and Bob Bunting, manager of the J.A.C Electric Cooperative also received the Honorary Lone Star Farmer Degree.

Special awards went to Ed Bingham, publisher of the ElectraStar News, winner of the area newspaper award, and to Weldon Snodgrass of Electra, who received the school administrator award.

Harold Beam, superintendent of Vernon schools, gave the welcome to the 325 FFA members, parents and guests attending the banquet.

Pioneer Bowl opportunity to see top-flight game

Iowa Park football fans will soon have the rare opportunity to take a 15-minute drive and watch a real college bowl game.

The Pioneer Bowl, formerly known as the Pecan Bowl, has relocated in Wichita Falls and its first game will be played Dec. 11 in Memorial Stadium.

The nation's third and fourth ranked College Division teams, Eastern Michigan University and Louisiana Tech, will square off at 1 p.m. with the aim of the winner to eventually be named Number One of the nation.

A full slate of activities are scheduled to go along with the game, including a queen's contest, a huge parade and a banquet sponsored by the Association of Christian Athletes.

Representing Iowa Park in the queen's contest will be Miss Becky Powell. The IPHS senior was named Homecoming Queen this fall, and only Monday night was voted runner up in the Sweetheart Contest of the Wichita District of Future Farmers of America.

The Bulldogs of Tech bring a potent high scoring offense to the game, relying on the break-away running of Charles "Quick-Six" McDaniel and the arm of quarterback Ken Lantrip. Lantrip, a senior, played behind Terry Bradshaw as a sophomore, and has so far broken virtually every record in the game for 34 completions and 492 yards.

Eastern Michigan hopes to stop the speedy Tech offense with its rock ribbed defensive unit, led by All-American Dave Pureifory. The Huron defense, led by Pureifory allowed only one touchdown in their last five games. The Northern powerhouse also boasts a tremendous ground game spearheaded by fullback Tim Pack-rall and a giant offensive line.

The Pioneer Bowl is in its first year in Wichita Falls and is sponsored jointly by the NCAA and the Wichita Falls Board of Commerce and Industry. It will be televised by ABC-TV but will be blacked out in the Lawton-Wichita Falls area.

The Pioneer Bowl-Christmas parade will help kick off the festivities Friday afternoon at 4 p.m. A dozen floats, area beauties and marching bands will usher in the Christmas season and the game.

To meet the needs and desires of the growing College Division membership, the NCAA in 1969 expanded its regional football program from four to six games annually. The College Division was divided into Division I and Division II, with the former composed mostly of larger, state-supported institutions and the latter made

up of smaller, privately-endowed colleges.

Four regional games are conducted in Division I and two games are played in Division II. A total of 333 institutions strive for the 12 bowl positions each fall.

The Pioneer Bowl is one of six bowl games under the program to be televised each year.

TICKETS ON SALE HERE

A block of 50 reserved seat tickets for the Pioneer Bowl are on sale at the office of the Iowa Park Leader. They will remain here until noon Saturday, with the unsold portion returned to Wichita Falls.

Tickets for the game are \$4 per person.

Fans are urged by bowl officials to be dressed in Iowa Park green and have a banner proclaiming the merits of Iowa Park, as ABC-TV cameras will be scanning the stands for such groups.

Building permits up in November

Building permits issued by the city hall in November amounted to almost 10 times the value of those issued in October, but indications are that the year's total value will amount to less than a half million.

Permits for three new homes raised the month's total to \$40,405, as compared with October's low of \$4,338. For the year permits have been issued for \$397,634, which is considerably lower than the \$708,695 figure reported for the same period in 1970.

CHIEF OF POLICE DIXON

Passes time with creative whittling

When Raymond Dixon, Chief of Police, as a young lad on a plantation in Thomasville, Ala. was whittling away the hours by whittling, he probably never dreamed that one day he would be a police officer in Texas and that his ability to cut and shape wood with a knife would give his tired body and exhausted nerves an opportunity to unbend and also to regain their re-

silience for the next day's routine tasks.

To be a good law enforcement officer and to perform the duties of his office efficiently is one of the motivating purposes of Dixon's life, and he realizes that he needs an outside interest to relieve the pressure of incessant on-the-job strain. His knack for whittling and building has been the answer. He has pursued this hobby for some time and just recently finished building a scale model re-

production of that plantation house and other buildings on the premises.

The finished product seems to suggest his wistful and sentimental yearning for the house that was built by slaves owned by a man who has been dead 120 years. Dixon visited his 98-year-old grandfather, who has lived in the house 78 years and reared seven families in addition to his own eight children there, in the summer of 1971. Inspired to build a miniature representation of the place, he took measurements and retrieved as many old pictures from family albums and relatives as possible, and he started working in earnest on the project last July.

The original house is built four and one half feet from the ground, which was one of the air-conditioning methods a century ago. One of the first features of the scale model to catch the eye is the kitchen that was built separately from the rest of the house. Dixon explained that that was done to keep the heat from the other rooms. The food was carried across an attached porch to the "warming" room which was the dining and living room.

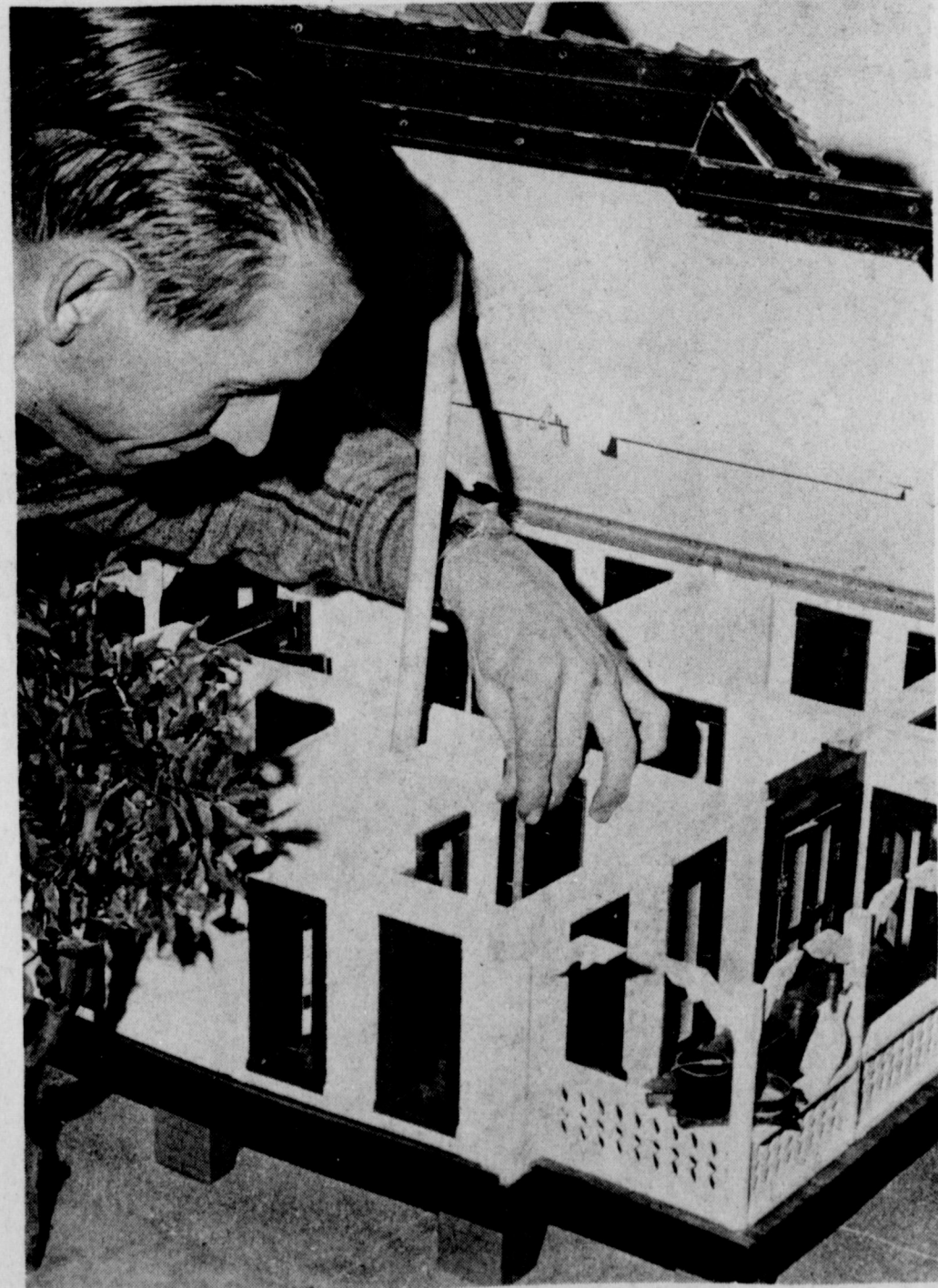
The old house has not been remodeled and still has four 20 ft. square rooms with 16 ft. ceilings, a long hallway, and two large porches where people can sit and relax or visit with neighbors after they finish the day's chores. It also has four fireplaces.

Dixon used pressed wood in reproducing the house and ice cream sticks painted white for the siding. He finished the exterior with green trim to correspond with the trim on the house he copied. He also put the seals together with wooden pegs, a mark of antiquity in the plantation dwelling. To achieve the ridges in the red tin roof, he pressed the Shim Stock Brass which he used for the covering through indented blocks of wood.

The interior walls of the scale model house are white to resemble the plastered walls strengthened with various kinds of animal hair to keep them from cracking in the house where he was born and reared. Dixon stated that those walls are still in good condition and have never been repainted. The floors in the small house resemble the hard wood floors in the house below the Mason Dixon Line.

The Chief has carefully and accurately reproduced the yard and buildings on the farm. Facsimiles of oak, pecan and cedar trees, vines, a flower garden, a wisteria arbor where the younger folk spent many Sunday afternoons "batting" the bumble bees, are a part of the landscape.

Included in the setting are scale models of the chicken house, smoke house, blacksmith shop and "outhouse". To achieve a log cabin look in the smokehouse Dixon used dowel rods. He used tongue depressors for the exterior of the blacksmith shop which is equipped on the inside with replicas of the forge, anvil, toolbox and work bench.

Three Hawks named to All-District team

Iowa Park, making its debut in Class AAA competition this year, landed three Hawks on the first team All-District selections and six others were named to the honorable mention list, it was reported last weekend by the District 4-AAA committee.

Jackie Perkins and Chuck Buikema, both All-District selections last year in AA, were named to the first offensive unit. On the defensive list was Jerry Burkhart.

Steve Webb and Jim Frazier were named to the offensive honorable mention roster, while four players, Neal Fansler, Jimmy Green, Jimmy Brown and Greg Frazier, were placed on the defensive honorable mention list.

There were 27 seniors and seven juniors on the 34-player first squads. Perkins, who was all-state last year also, is an

G. Frazier was the only Hawk on the honorable mention list who is a junior. Defending champion Brownwood landed 11 players on the first units, four of them repeaters from last year. Six were on the offensive unit and five on the defense.

Every school in the district had at least one player on a first team. They were as follows: Burk Burnett 5, 1 offensive, 4 defensive; Hirsch 4, 3 offensive, 1 defensive; Stephenville 2, 1 offensive, 1 defensive; Graham and Weatherford 1 each, both on offense.

He plans to build the furniture for the inside of the house and he has drawings of each piece in the home place that will enable him to reproduce the items with accuracy.

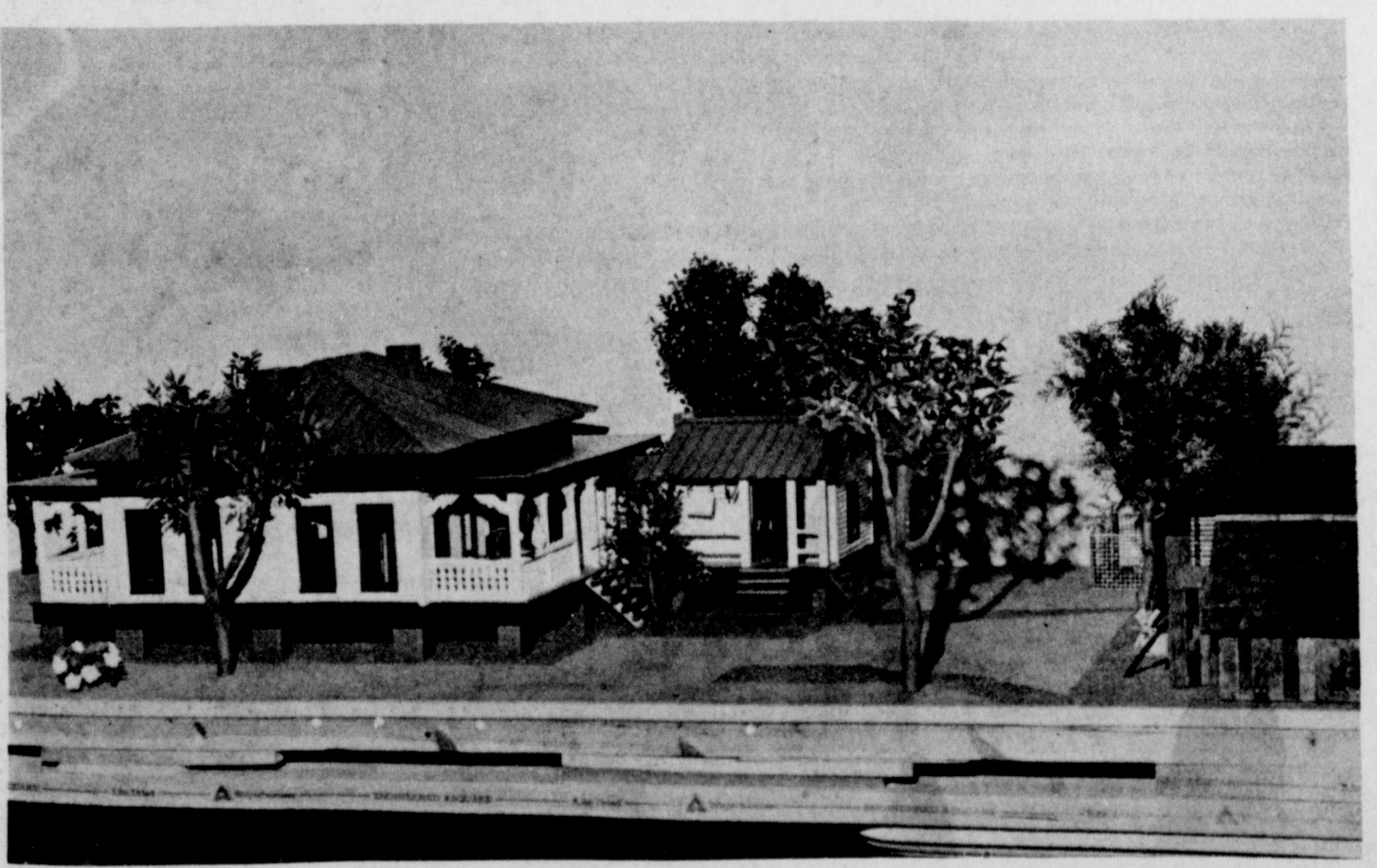
Dixon's talents in woodwork cover a wide

territory. He has made a birch-frame in intricate detail for a picture of his family, dog houses and gun stocks and many other items. He is presently making a muzzle-loading rifle stock out of bird's eye maple.

Before moving to Iowa Park, Dixon served in the U.S. Army between 1956-58 where he was a member of the Presidential

Armor Guard and walked the tomb of the Unknown Soldier in the National Cemetery at Arlington, Va.

Mrs. Dixon is an inhalation therapist at Bethania Hospital in Wichita Falls. The couple have two sons, Richard Lee, a seventh grade student, and David Ray, a third grade student. They are members of the First Baptist Church.

SOUR CREAM SOFTIES
 3 cups sifted all-purpose flour
 1 tsp. salt
 1/2 tsp. baking powder
 1/2 tsp. baking soda
 1/2 cup (1 stick) butter or margarine
 1 1/2 cups sugar
 2 eggs
 1 tsp. vanilla
 1 cup (8 oz. carton) dairy sour cream
 Cinnamon - sugar
 Measure flour, salt, baking powder and soda into a sifter. Cream butter or margarine with sugar until blended in a large bowl; beat in eggs and vanilla. Sift in flour mixture, adding alternately with sour cream and blending well to make a thick batter. Drop by rounded tablespoonfuls, 4 inches apart, on greased cookie sheets. Spread into 2 inch rounds and sprinkle with cinnamon-sugar. Bake at 400 degrees 12 minutes or until lightly golden around the edges. Remove from cookie sheets and cool completely in wire racks.

MEATLOAF
 1 to 1 1/2 lbs of ground chuck
 Diced onion (amount to suit taste)
 Diced green pepper (optional, and again, to suit taste)
 Salt
 Pepper
 1/4 to 1/2 can of tomato sauce (8 oz. size)
 1/2 cup cracker crumbs, or enough to hold mixture together
 Mix together and pat into a greased baking dish.

TOPPING
 3/4 cup brown sugar
 1 tsp. vinegar
 2 tsp. prepared mustard
 Add remaining tomato sauce and 1/2 cup water
 Mix together and pour over meat. Bake in 325 degree oven for 1 1/2 hours.

The table decorations featured an original centerpiece on an unusual log created by Mrs. Allen Brown and garlands of red and orange berries.

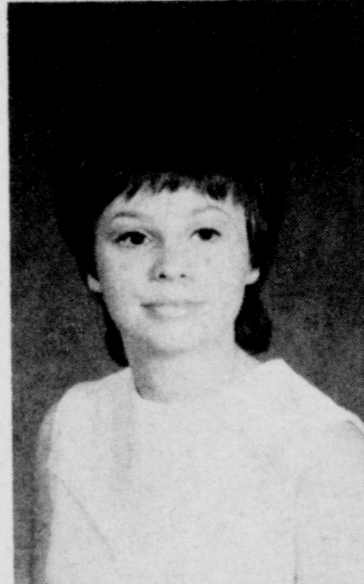
After dinner music was furnished by Joe Herring and the game period was directed by Hoyt Watson.

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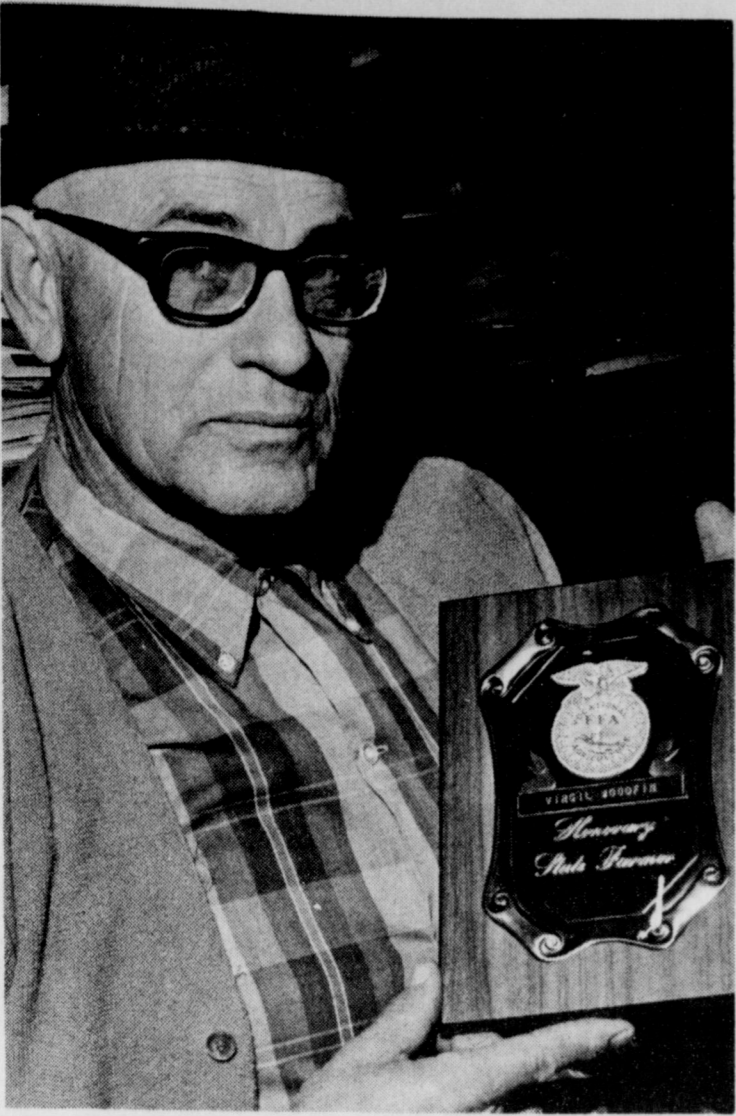

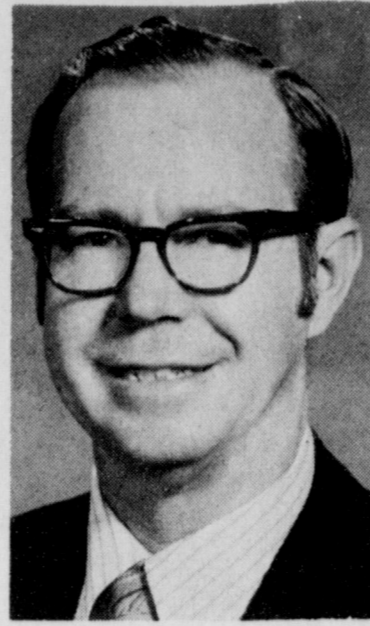

As a special feature of the Lottie Moon Week of Prayer and Offering for Foreign Missions, the Rev. and Mrs. Wendell R. (Jack) Hull, missionaries to Mwanza, Tanzania will be special guests at the First Baptist Church Sunday. He will fill the pulpit at both services and they will be special guests of the W.M.U. at a "Mission Tasting Bee" that afternoon between 2 and 4 o'clock.

Appointed by the Foreign Mission Board in 1959, Rev. and Mrs. Hull studied language for a year in Dar es Salaam, Tanzania, and then pioneered Southern Baptist mission work among the Kikuyu people in Kenya. In Nyeri, Kenya, they helped to establish more than 25 churches and missions and a Baptist high school. They returned to Tanzania in 1970.

A native of Wichita Falls, Rev. Hull was graduated from Baylor University at Waco and Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary at Fort Worth. He also studied at Howard Payne College at Brownwood and was pastor of the First Baptist Church at Lavaca, Ark. at the time of their appointment. He is evangelist and advisor for churches in Mwanza, Tanzania. He also has served as chairman of the Baptist Mission of East Africa, an organization of Southern Baptist missionaries, for two years.

The former Dorothy Edwards, Mrs. Hull was born in Charleston, Mo., and moved to Sedalia, Mo., during her childhood. She was graduated from Stephens College, Columbia, Mo., and Baylor University, Waco.

In Kenya, Mrs. Hull was advisor for women's organiza-

tions at 37 churches and missions, some as far as 95 miles from Nyeri. She also taught geography and music at a Baptist high school in Nyeri.

The Hulls have five children: Linda (Mrs. Rex Rachel), Ray, Elleta, Paul and Alice.

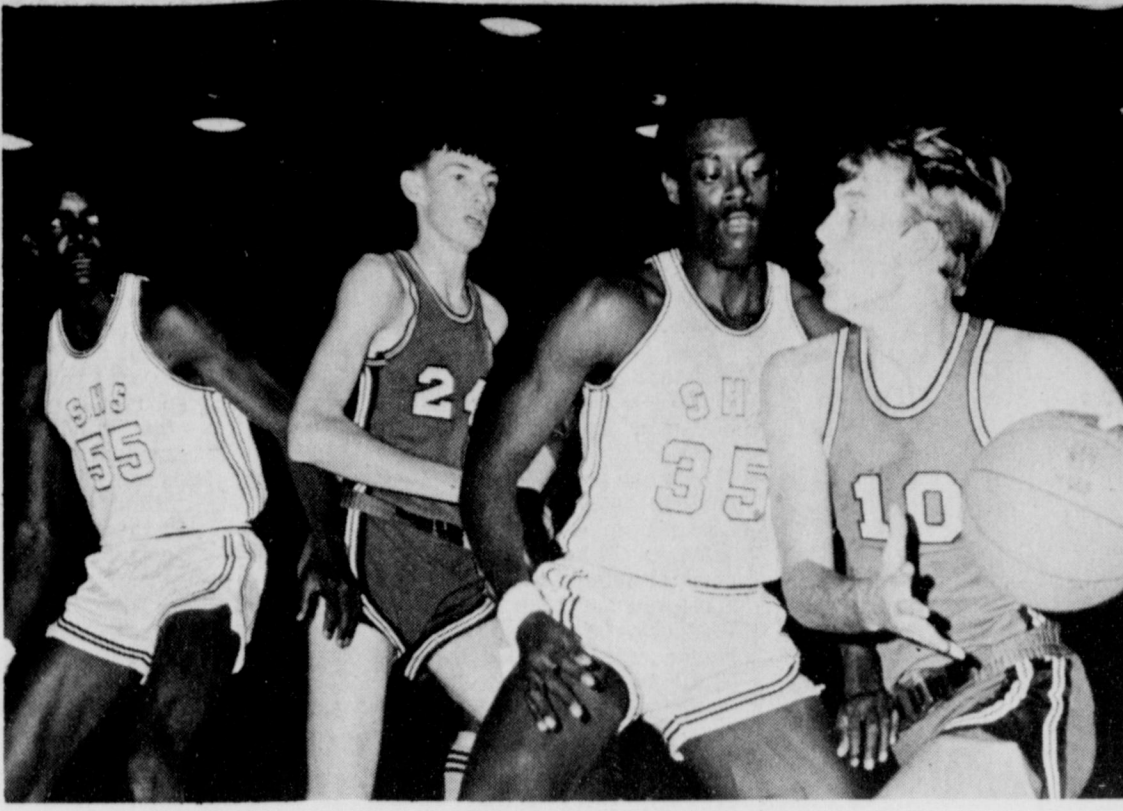

After dropping a pair of close contests to Seymour and Notre Dame last week, the Hawks got on the winning road Tuesday by thumping Nocona, 67-56. The Hawk junior varsity, undefeated in three outings thus far, is entered in a "B" team tournament on the same dates in Wichita Falls.

Seymour's tourney starts today and lasts through Saturday. Led by Robbie Bosley, David Laurence and Randy Alsop, the Hawks gunned down Nocona's Indians with a tremendous outpour of points in the final five minutes of the game, outscoring their hosts 22-5. Bosley was high for the game with 16 points, followed by Laurence and Alsop with 14 each. Eight of Alsop's points came in the final quarter. The Hawks played that game

without Greg Frazier, starting guard who has been ill all week and is a doubtful player at Seymour. After leading 18-14 at the end of the first quarter, the Hawks fell behind 32-33 at halftime, and still were behind 45-48 after three periods of play. They held the Indians to only 19 field goals while scoring 29. In the season opener Friday here against Seymour, the Hawks enjoyed a point-productive first half, but fell to the wayside in the final two periods when five players were benched on fouls. They led 32-36 at the half-time rest period, and then saw

the visitors surge ahead 51-41 after the third quarter, finally losing 57-78. Bosley was high for the Hawks with 14, followed by Laurence's 12. Former Valley View High athlete Garland Rapheht, now playing for Seymour, canned 14 points against the Hawks, all in the second half. The Knights of Notre Dame had to fight their way out of an overtime before finally sending the Hawks home with a 76-75 loss. The teams had finished regulation time with a 71-71 tie. Notre Dame had led throughout the first three quarters, 21-15, 40-37 and 58-54 before the Mean Green finally knotted the score late in the final moments. Always tough in basketball, Notre Dame was actually outscored from the floor, with the Hawks netting 36 field goals to the Knights' 33. The foul line made the big difference, with the Knights being charged with only nine personal fouls in the entire game, to Iowa Park's 20. It was a free shot in the waning

seconds of the overtime that decided the game. Big, 6-6, Laurence canned 27 points for the game to cop-scoring honors. Bosley had 16 and Alsop 12. Going into the tournament, Laurence and Bosley are battling for scoring honors. The big center is averaging 18 points per contest, and Bosley 15. The other top scorers are: Sam Morrison, 8; Jim Frazier, 7; Alsop, 11; and G. Frazier, 6. The Hawks are averaging 66 points per game thus far, while their opponents are averaging 70. The Hawks travel to Nocona Monday for a varsity game only, starting at 6:30 p.m., and then host Notre Dame Tuesday in a doubleheader.

Just How Good Is Newspaper Advertising?

National Retailer tells ad men newspapers are irreplaceable

The proper handling of a retail advertising account starts with knowing that the "backbone of our advertising effort is still our newspaper advertising, the nation's foremost advertising agency executives were informed this week by William R. Johnson, sales promotion manager, J. C. Penney Company.

Johnson, in an address Thursday (May 13) at the 1971 American Association of Advertising Agencies annual meeting at the Greenbrier in West Virginia, told the agency heads there is no getting around newspapers as the retailer's basic medium for advertising.

"Some advertising people, especially in agencies," he said, "believe this is because we (retailers) are too flexible in terms of media, and are inclined to think too traditionally. Just try to tell this to our store managers who know what it takes to attract customers to the stores.

"Our store managers know that their newspaper ads produce sales dollars. They are perfectly willing, even eager, to use radio and television in carefully selected lines, but don't try to cut back on their newspaper budget. Broadcast is something you do with new money when increased advertising dollars are available to you."

Johnson said the effectiveness of newspaper advertising for a retailer is not hard to understand. "All you have to do," he said, "is notice how your wife reads her paper. She reads it like a shopping news. Sure she reads the news, the editorials, but if she wants to outfit her kids with shoes for school, she looks through the retail ads in the paper to find out who's selling what kind of shoes, at how much... or how much they've been reduced in price.

"Sometimes she even tears out the ad and carries it into the store. Every Penney store manager has seen this happen hundreds of times. He has yet to see a woman come into the store carrying a television commercial. And he cannot imagine a woman sitting in front of a television set all day waiting for a children's shoe commercial. Can you?"

Johnson said "retail advertising has to work. It has to produce sales. So does national advertising have to work, but the difference is we find out, almost immediately. We know the next day if it produces. And so do our clients.

"When a store manager runs a children's shoe ad in Sunday's newspaper, he expects to see a crowded shoe department. The next day!"

As far as newspaper advertising is concerned, Johnson said ads are still being prepared by Penney's own Central Office advertising service department, which creates and produces 5,000 different newspaper ads each year. He said annual newspaper lineage per its 1,700 stores runs from 8,000 lines in smaller outlets to over 2 million in the largest.

Diphtheria/Tetanus - Minimum of 3 doses with the last dose within 10 years. Booster dose only after initial series.

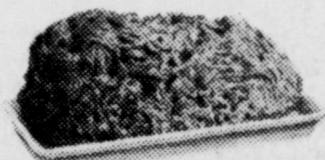

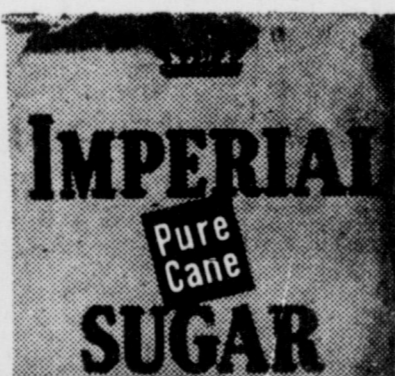

EDITORIAL

Aiming For Trouble

Some would-be hunters are creating a hazardous situation in the immediate vicinity of Iowa Park, and real problems could arise if they don't start observing legal shooting areas.

Numerous complaints and reports of damages have been noted recently, and most of them are in the general area of the small pond on the Van Horn farm west of town. Firearms have been the cause of hundreds of dollars in damages, and even serious injury and death of livestock.

The would-be hunters, apparently frustrated with not finding wild animals to shoot, have been taking target practice on everything in sight in the lake area. Bullet holes are found in almost every can, fence post, highline post, insulator and what-have-you that is in view from the dirt road which runs along the south side of the railroad track.

The railroad company has been put to unusual expense for the past few months, replacing insulators on the highline poles.

For instance, repairmen were called out Friday afternoon, and then again Sunday, to make repairs.

The marksmen, when shooting the insulators, break the transmission wires. These lines are necessary for railroad communications, and when their signals can't get through, the trains are halted until repairs are made. Thus, one five-cent bullet can create hundreds of dollars expense.

Some livestock in that area have been killed, or seriously injured, by thoughtless "hunters". These shootings have evidently been done on purpose, also.

There are proper places for the shooting of firearms. A close watch is now being made to apprehend those who do not observe the legal shooting areas. A faction in this nation is already working hard to eliminate the ownership of firearms, and this type of thing only adds fuel to their argument. They don't need our help here.
