

Calling of the annual school trustee election, reports of principals, decision to enter the UIL baseball program, and highlights of the administrators' meeting in Austin last week featured the meeting of the Iowa Park school board Tuesday evening.

Bob Dawson stated that 705 are enrelled in high school now and he estimates 824 will be enrolled two years from now. Three additional classrooms will be needed a year from now. The physical education classes are crowded.

The vocational classes are mova minimum, according to Dean Miller and Harold Cowley. At midterm there are only 15, about half the usual number, and the reduction seems to be linked to interest in vocational classes.
