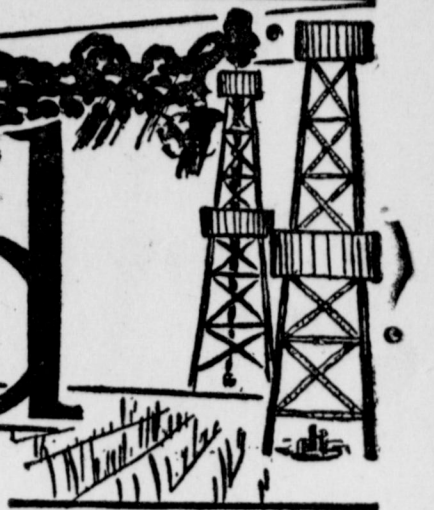

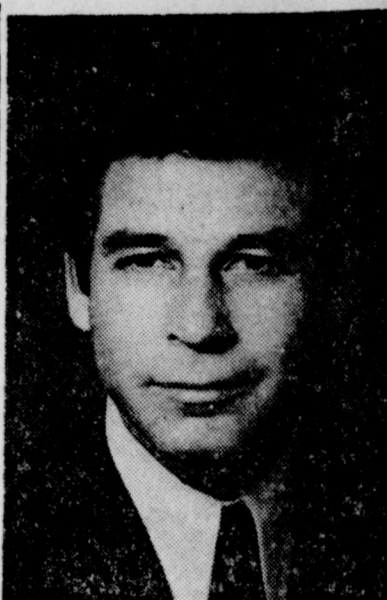

Leo Cook Files as Candidate for Representative

Leo Cook, 4108 Abbott, Wichita Falls, has announced his candidacy for State Representative to the House from District 53. Born in Wichita Falls, Cook attended schools there and in Bowie. He is a graduate of Midwestern university with teaching fields in business, mathematics and economics.

Cook is a veteran of the Marine Corps and is a member of Gardens Edge church of Christ. He is now teaching mathematics in the Wichita Falls public schools, a position he has held eight years.

His civic activities include coaching football for Wichita Falls Boys club and directing Wichita Falls Invitational Softball Tournaments for 12 years.

Leo and Miss Eva Nell Clements of Iowa Park were married in 1953. Their son Kevin is a student in Rider high school.

In announcing his candidacy, Leo stated:

"If we do not restore confidence in the honesty and integrity of the House, then the next meeting of the legislature will be an empty gesture. That burden is placed squarely in the hands of the people. They alone must decide who is guilty of destroying that trust."

"I pledge myself to help restore the image of honest and good government to the House by supporting several reforms needed. The composition of committees need to reflect the wishes of the House in place of the wishes of the Speaker alone. The power vested in the Speaker and each committee chairman produces a breeding ground for scandal. We must return government to the people, or democracy will die."

"Rising costs of state government should force us into priorities long overdue. The next session of the House will have to pass a tax bill, find new methods of financing schools, make a judgment on "no fault insurance," and many other important items that will affect taxpayers' income."

"We all have a challenge before us to stop the declining population of this area, then find ways to attract new people as well as to induce our young to stay in this area. New industry and recreational facilities would help. I will explore the possibility of a state-financed land program for those who want to purchase land in their own counties. Texas could make no better investment than to invest in its own people."

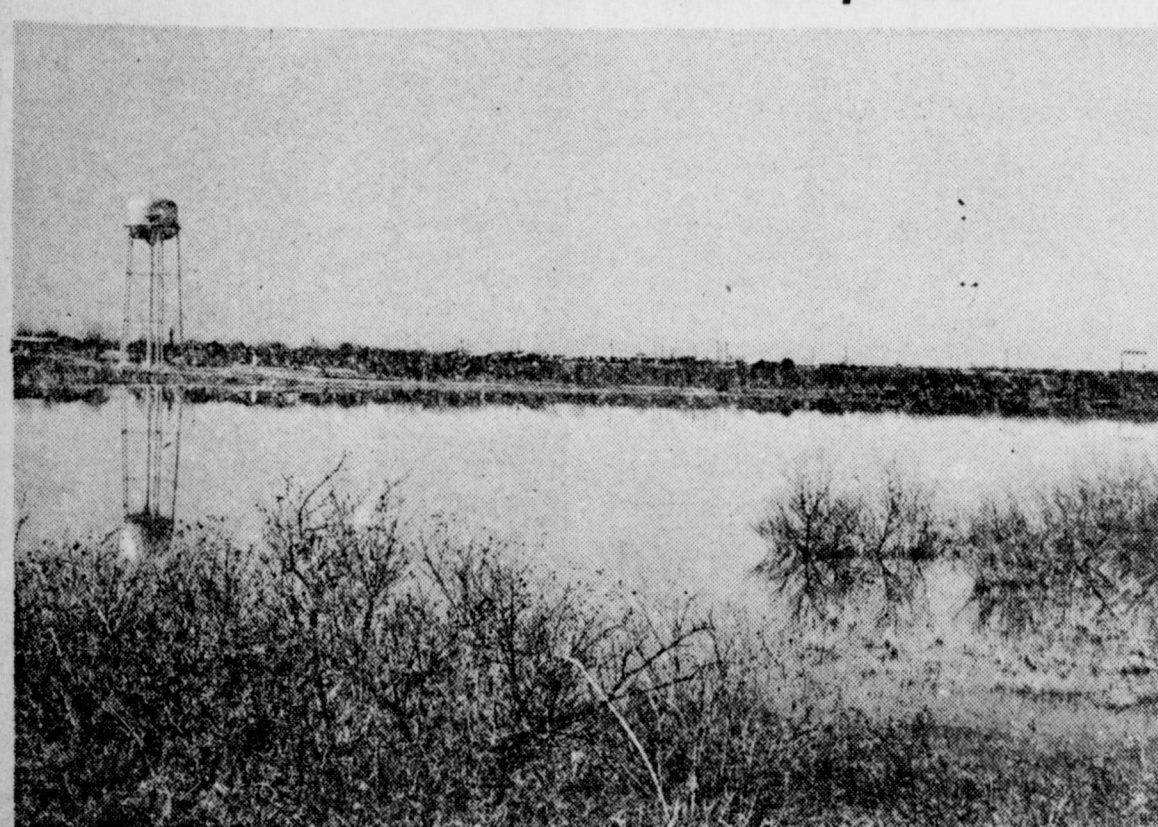

Whereas, Dr. and Mrs. Clark's value to the City of Iowa Park and its citizens cannot be measured, now therefore

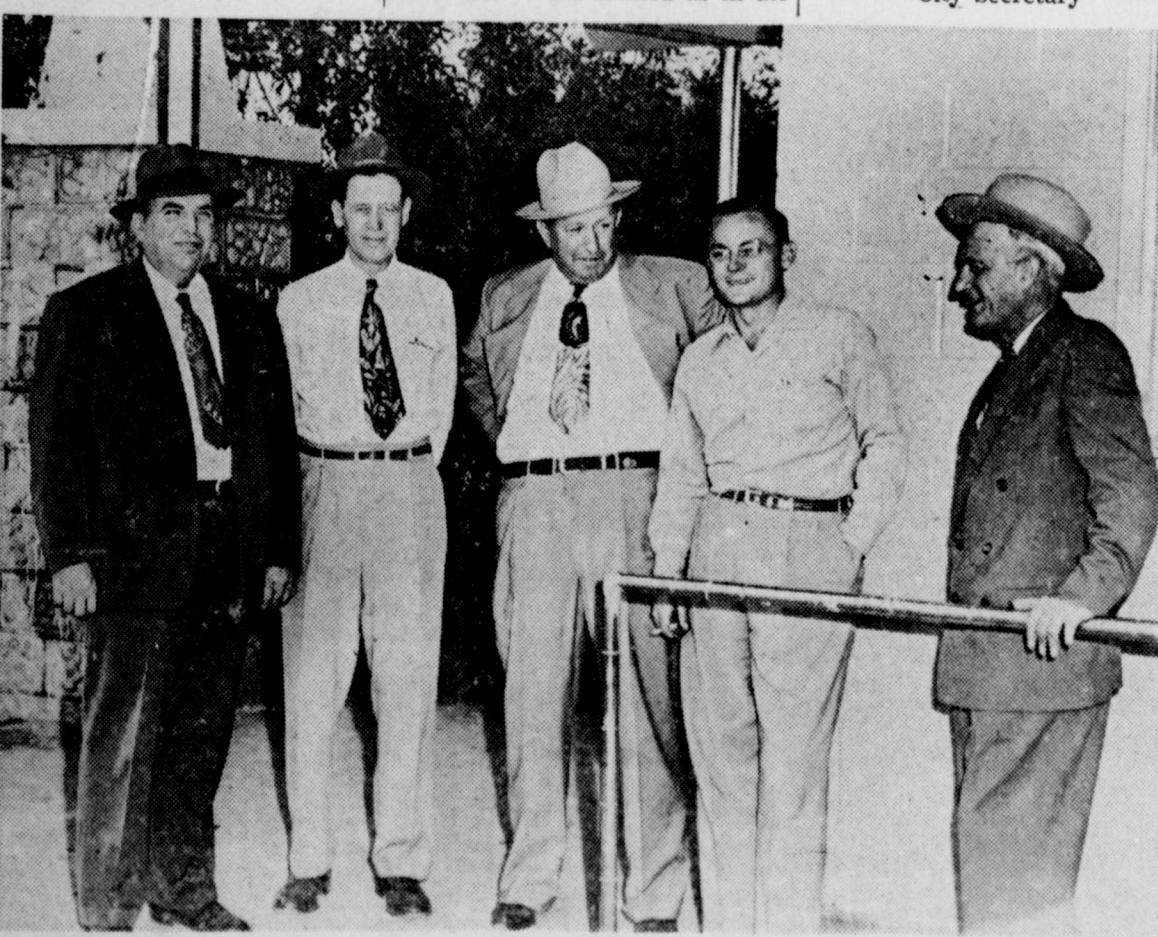
Be it further resolved that from this time on into the future the park area on the west side of Lake Gordon shall be known as "Oscar Park."

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS



The use of parallel terraces is spreading rapidly in Wichita Soil and Water Conservation District. They are specially designed to fit high speed, power farming methods.

Besides preventing soil erosion and making farming easier, parallel terraces have other advantages. For example, they keep silt out of streams and lakes. A terraced hillside is more profitable than an ugly erosion scarred field.

Farmers who installed parallel terraces during 1971 were George Streit, Albert Brockriede and sons and Lee Roy Palmer, all in Punikin Center area. Donald and Richard Hill replaced their standard system of terraces with the new parallel type on their farm north of Iowa Park.

Other county farmers who have installed parallel terrace systems in previous years are Wilburn Glass, M. R. Hanks and Elmer Klunkerman of Clara; Jack Wal-

ser and Dewey Dovel of Electra, Gene Robertson and Mrs. Essie Hiley of Burk Burnett; Clarence Mahler of Iowa Park; R. E. Pace and L. D. Smith of Wichita Falls. 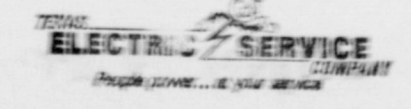
