Easter Seals Aid Rehabilitation of Iowa Park Folk

Annual Easter Seal fund appeal to finance services offered at the North Texas Rehabilitation Center in Wichita Falls will be held the week of March 20. Announcement was made by Mrs. Bill Thomas of Wichita Falls, general chairman of the 1972 door to door appeal. A door to door campaign will be conducted in Iowa Park as part of an eight-county effort to raise the funds necessary to operate the Center.

Children and adults benefit by therapy at the Center and there have been 85 persons from here who have received one or more types of rehabilitation services.

Aids offered include physical, occupational and speech therapy, gross motor and language development training, hearing evaluation and training, visual-motor-perceptual training, parent and family counseling, relating to handicaps, and the loan of equipment.

Mrs. Thomas said that in the past year, 387 children and adults from the North Texas area received help at the Center. "We must continue to provide services needed by the handicapped," she said. "These people pin their hopes and aspirations on the success of this year's fund appeal.

The extent to which these hopes may be realized will depend on the extent of the concern and participation demonstrated by the residents of North Texas.

"Some of those who receive therapy can afford to pay; most cannot. Easter Seals make the difference."

She explained that many people think of the Center as only a place for children. "A great many children do receive therapy, but adults also receive needed help."

The Center has provided therapy for stroke victims as they relearned to talk and to walk. Therapists have helped adults injured in accidents and those who are afflicted with arthritis.

After 58 years, Uncle Will, as he is known to his many friends, has decided not to keep his office hours of "eight to five" daily and enjoy a leisurely retirement as he begins his second century of rich and active living.

He began his association with the Boone Telephone Co. in 1914 and during his first year he purchased stock and became a member of the board of directors.

Following the death of the president in 1918, Mr. Moore assumed the office of president and the active management of the company, at which time he resigned his post as first rural mail carrier in Boone county, to devote full time to the telephone industry.

Upon its sale to Allied Telephone Co. in 1971, Boone County Telephone Co. had about 7,000 telephones in service and was one of the largest independent telephone companies in Arkansas providing Long Distance service to 22 Northwest Arkansas towns. Mr. Moore continued to serve as consultant, going to the office daily.

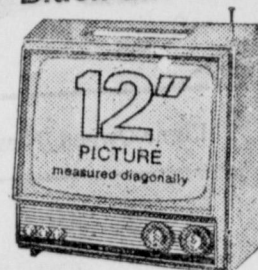

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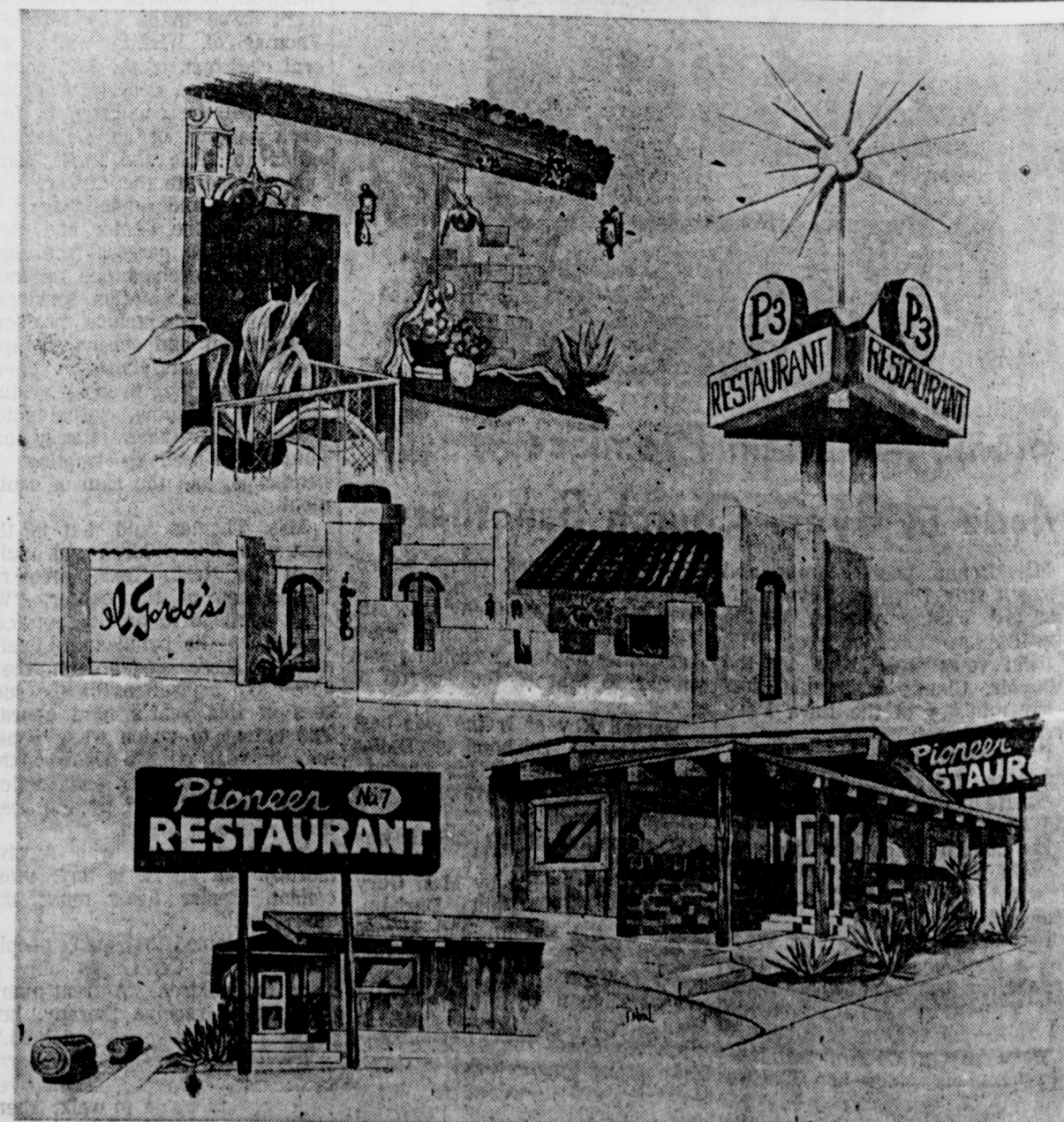

Save the Big Thicket
 Texas Federation of Women's Clubs members have given Texas a new battle cry: "Save the Big Thicket!" And Gov. Preston Smith has signed a proclamation making this "Big Thicket Week." Mrs. Homer Blalock of the 23 Study club has been made chairman of the movement in this area.
 What is the Big Thicket? It is a vast expanse of dense forest in five counties of Texas not far from Houston, Beaumont and Port Arthur.
 Why save it for posterity, for tourism, for a scientific laboratory? Because there is nothing like it in Texas, nor even in the USA. It has a uniqueness all its own — trees found nowhere else with some of them large enough to provide material for a 4-room house. Four of the five meat-eating plants in America are to be found here. Scientists estimate the presence of 100 species of fungus and algae not yet classified and 1000 not even named. And 300 species of birds.
 Why be disturbed? There used to be 3 1/2 million acres, now only 200,000, and it is being chopped away at 50 acres per day by the lumber companies. One hundred acres a day are being cleared by poisoning trees, using bulldozers and other modern machinery.

SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT NEWS
 Before the encroachment of land users, most of North America was covered by forest, grassland or desert vegetation. On each vegetative type was wildlife best adapted to it.
 The white man changed land patterns on a large. Wild lands were converted to agricultural use and each change influenced the composition of wildlife on the land. Buffalo, deer, bear and elk began to decrease in number. The quail, dove, rabbits and other species were able to adapt.
 Human occupants determine the place wildlife may occupy, as well as the number it will support by controlling the management of the land. Bill Lewis, soil conservationist at Iowa Park, says, "Farm and ranch operators are wildlife managers whether they realize it or not."
 "A co-ordinated program of soil and water and plant conservation will normally improve the habitat and increase the food supply for wildlife. Cropland and grassland and woodlands, properly treated, will produce wildlife as a second crop. Many pieces of property can produce wildlife as the primary crop.
 Pollinating insects, fish and most birds and animals help the farmer. Game species offer income from hunting leases. Management of ponds to produce fish furnishes recreation, food and income from fishing rights.


School Week

ORDINANCE NO. (66) (212); (65) (176A); (55) 173

An Ordinance Regulating Solicitors, Peddlers, Hawkers, Itinerant Merchants or Transient Vendors of Merchandise Who Go in or upon Private Residences Within the City of Iowa Park, Texas, Without Having Been Requested or Invited to Do So, for the Purpose of Soliciting Orders or the Sale of Goods or Merchandise; Providing for a Permit and License Fee; Providing Penalties for the Violation Hereof; Repealing All Ordinances in Conflict Herewith; Declaring an Emergency.

Section 3. Such permit shall be dated and signed by the City Sec-

retary, and issued upon the payment of the fee herein required, and shall specify the term of such permit, not to exceed one year after date of issuance. Each person engaging in the business covered by this ordinance shall be required to have a permit, which he shall carry with him and display upon request. The fee for such permit shall be as follows: For permits with a term of one day to six months, \$30.00 per day; for permits with a term from six months to one year, the fee shall be \$500.00 plus one dollar for each day over six months; for permits with a term of one year, the fee shall be \$850.00.

Section 6. Be it further ordained

that any person violating the provisions of this ordinance shall upon the conviction thereof be fined not less than \$25.00, nor more than \$200.00.

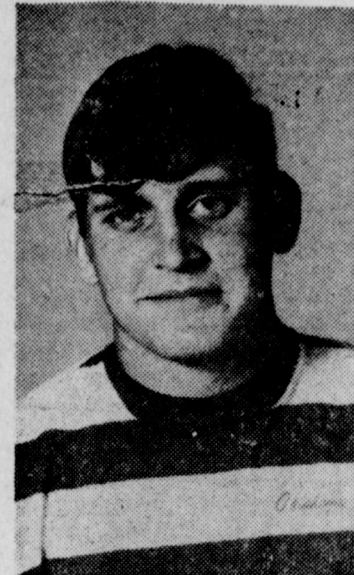
