



> If the order of arrangement is to be taken as indicative of the prominence of the various topics, it will be seen that the settlement of the affairs of the Philippines, Cuba and Puerto Rico is considered to be the matter first deserving of attention. Nellie V. advanced to 12½, this afternoon and Acacia exhibited a decided amount of strength, closing strong at 37¾. National declined a point on the second call to 14½, but Lexington gained fractionally to 17. Goldstone was a heavy trader on both calls, selling up to 2½, and Gold Hill was a good trader at 3½. Volcano was quite strong at 7¼, and New Haven, which has been selling at 8½, gained a point to 8½. Independence T. and M. was very firm at 49. There are rumors of a compromise again. Blanche, a pit ca., stock, was further depreciated, selling for only 9¾. Among the dividend-payers Portland was quite strong at \$3.10, Vindicator sold at \$1.50 and Isabella went at \$1.25, which is a cent below the price at which it sold on the morning call, but that means nothing.

The trading for the day was much heavier than usual, the shares exchanged reaching the splendid total of 1,094,202, representing a cash value amounting to \$121,563.75.


