A Salty Old War.

A dispatch says the immediate proba bility of another Lincoln County war, this time in Texas, has induced the Government to instruct the Marshal of that locality to occupy a neutral position and DISEASE CURED let the county and state governments settle with a party of Mexicans who have invaded the salt deposits. The invaders number about fifty, are armed and determined to get possession of the lakes in Lincoln county, which contain valuable salt deposits. In 1870, Zimpleman, in command of the cantonment, placed the scrip, issued to the soldiers, upon all the salt deposit, and deprived the Mexicans of the right of using the salt unless legal ized by the payment of a tax. These fields are within forty miles of Sierra Blanca, and are valuable to Mexicans and Americans alike. The Mexicans therefore resisted the tax, and disputed the right of the rangers to hold scrip to these deposits. A pitched battle was the result, and the dead and wounded was consider able on both sides. The Mexicans were defeated, however, and the disputants have remained at rest for these fifteen years. Now the old trouble has reopened, and the Mexicans are confident of retrieving their disasters and regaining possession of the lakes. They claim that Zimpleman's scrip does not cover all the land, and, as if intent upon carrying away all the alleged unowned portion, they have with them eighteen wagons and a long shoe. 



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

THERE is a new law as to fees of the Secretary of State for filing articles of incorporation. On last Saturday afternoon Messrs. Fisk, Abbott and Smith, says a Denver exchange, filed certificates of incorporation with the secretary of state for seven or eight cattle companies, comprising a capital stock of somewhere near \$20,000,000. This, it is claimed, was done to escape the payment of heavy fees which has to be done hereafter. All corporations, either domestic or foreign, organized for pecuniary gain are required to pay to the secretary of state \$10 for each certificate, provided the face value of the stock is not in excess of \$100,000. If exceeding that amount, the secretary is required to collect the sum of ten cents on each additional \$1,000. Had the incorporators waited to file their papers, it would have cost them \$2,000. The law was framed for the purpose of doing away with companies that have no existence except on paper.
