The Blanco (Texas) Vindicator says:—

Brick Pomeroy, the leader of American Nihilism, rejoices over the fate of the murdered Czar.

Correct! One of the great ideas that brought liberty in this country was this "Resistance to tyrants is obedience to God."

The Czar of Russia was a tyrant. He held the lives of his people in his hands, and sacrificed life, hope, honor, happiness, humanity, justice—all in his spasmodic gripes. He condemned without a trial. He murdered innocent men and women, closed his ears to the cry of mercy. He has filled more lives with anguish than there were hairs on his head. His cruelties were beyond recounting. He has robbed entire families and homes, and sent those innocent of crime to the mines of Siberia to be worked to death. He died a better death than he merited. He ought to have been sent to a Siberian mine to live underground, working under the lash twenty hours per day till nature gave out, as he banished his betters to such a fate.

"Rejoices over the fate of the Czar." Correct. It was the will of God—said his successor. Why not rejoice when the will of God is done? If it was not the will of God then it was the blossoming of justice. ORDINANCE NO. 36.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico,

SECTION 1. That the office of town Attorney for the town of Rico is hereby created to be filled by appointment by the Board of Trustees and that the incumbent shall hold his office for one year or during the pleasure of the Board.

SEC. 2. That it shall be the duty of town Attorney to prosecute on behalf of the town all cases for violation of town Ordinances.

SEC. 3. That there shall be taxed as a part of the costs in all cases for violation of town ordinances and Attorney's fee of five dollars (\$5.00) against each person connected thereunder, to be collected as other costs in the case.

SEC. 4. That the compensation for the services of the town Attorney shall be five dollars (\$5.00) in each case for the violation of town ordinances where a conviction is had to be paid to the town attorney, only upon collection thereof.
