Certain Colorado Silver Mines in Which Some Kansas City People Are Interested.

From the Kansas City Mail. The Wabash, on the west slope of Nigger Baby hill, is a large, well-defined contact vein, with limestone for foot wall and porphyry for hanging wall. DISRAELI DEAD.

London April 19.—Beaconsfield had a very serious relapse during the night, and died peacefully at five this morning. He was perfectly conscious to the last. Doctors Kidd and Quain and Lords Rowton and Barrington were present when Beaconsfield expired.

Benjamin Disraeli, Lord Beaconsfield, was born in London on the 21st of Deomber 1805 and was therefore at the time of his death almost 76 years of age. town. No one by the name you inquire He has lived a dual public life, that of the author and that of the statesman. He was educated by his father for the law. Disraeli first became known as a writer in ing he was burdened with numerous other literary star to wane. "Vivian Grey" was ably. To day the Sheriff ordered out the rich Heine. In succession came "The Iskander," both merited novels. These were followed by several political pamphlets, and these in turn by the novels "Henriette Temple," and "Venetia," which appeared, the first in 1836 and the second in 1837. In 1839 he published a tragedy, "Count Alarcos," in 1844 "Coningsby," in 1845 "Sibyl, or the two Nations;" in 1847 "Ixion in Heaven," and "Taylord or the New Crysted "in '59. 'Tancred, or the New Crusade," in '59, a biography of his father; '52 a memoir of Lord George Bentick. In 1870 came "Lothair," perhaps the last of Mr. Disraeli's great novels, while "Endymion," which was published late in 1880, was the last production from his pen of any length whatever. "Lothair" was a great success, 80,000 being sold in the United States alone. "Endymion" was also largely bought and almost universally

> Mr. Disraeli's early ambition was to take a leading place in politics. He outlined his own career in his "Vivian Grey" when only 21 years of age, and looking rant to Parliamentary honors. It was in the last race that he encountered Daniel O'Connell, an affair which came near re sulting in a duel between Disraeli and O'Connell's son. At last he entered Parliament, being elected as a Conservative from Maidstone. It was not until 1839 that he succeeded in attracting any attention to himself or creating any general interest in himself as a politician. that time on he continued to be known have left the city. - Chicago Times. as one of the keenest of debators and shrewdest of tacticians. In 1841 he was elected from Shrewsbury, and in 1847 from Buckinghamshire. His attacks upon Sir Robert Peel date about this time. Since his retirement as Prime Minister Lord Beaconsfield has not taken a very active part in politics. He has made a few short speeches in the House of Lords, but has neither done nor said anything to add to his already ripe reputation, which would attract any attention what-ever coming from a less elevated source. 'America will always remember Mr. Dis raeli with gratitude for his favorable opinion and encouraging words during the war of the Rebellion. TERRIBLE RAILROAD ACCIDENT.

A Car Dashed Two Hundred Feet Down a Precipice.

Eight Lives Lost, and Seven Seriously If Not Fatally Wounded.

The Denver & Rio Grande railroad which has never before scored a serious accident, has at last added its quota to the lengthening list of railroad disasters. The car struck first about sixty feet below the line of the road and then rolled over and over one hundred and forty feet farther.

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
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
