They do not hide away from arrest. On the other hand their operations are as open as the day, and they defy any govermental authority. It is safe to assert that the state of Colorado can be controlled by its authorities if a determined effort is made with a sincere purpose to enforce the law. It is asserted, and his action in the matter would seem to justify the as-sertion, that his desire for reelection overrides all other considerations, and he is very chary of exciting such a body of voters as these men control. north—a region covering the area of the state of Massachusetts, intersected by va-rious mountain ranges, and traversed by many rivers. At present 5,000 men are employed on these extensions, and about three miles of track are laid daily. In April, 1880, 337 miles of road were

operated. On the first of this month 895 miles were in operation; so that during and always given perfect satisfaction. miles were in operation; so that during the last sixteen months 458 miles of road have been completed. These roads are being built in a mountainous country, and will tap sections of the state rich in min-eral resources. Eight hundred and fifty miles more road are now under contract, and construction is being pushed as far as the Utsh border. The extension to Gun-nison City will be completed on Monday next. The other extensions to mining eamps are being pressed forward to com-

pletion before the early snows. The increse of miles of road operated, and the great development of the indus tries of the state, have caused a proportionate increase in earnings. In 1880 the gross earnings for the seven months ending July 31, were \$143,996,040; for the same time in 1881, \$310,404,287. 


