The quarrel arose in the first place ver an attachment for a debt of \$40. One party is known as the Coe party and holds the field at Farmington. The other is the Eskridge, Garrett and Stockton party, now residing at Durango. The latter party, or a part of them, were sworn in, as special constables to serve some writs in the cause referred to, which were resisted.

The Coe party drove the justice who drew up the writs out of the country and threatened to shoot the other boys on sight. At a dancing party at Hamlet's last December, they refused the Garrett. Eskridge crowd, numbers to dance. In the quarrel ensuing, both parties drew weapons, two men, named George Brown and Dyson Eskridge firing simultaneously, Brown of the Coe party and young Oscar Puett of the other party, or at least with them, being killed. Eskridge fled the country and has not been heard of Garrett who was also of the party, took refuge here. The Coe party formed a cape. A one armed man named Seth Welfoot, who never harmed any one and who, crippled as he is, had managed to get a farm and some stock, was brought before this tribunal, and given so many hours to quit the country and told that if he returned he would be hung, simply because he said that some of the men who killed Port Stockton, were as bad as he was.

At least forty refugees from that section are said to be in Durango, with many of whom we have talked, men who are neutral in this quarrel, and have left their homes because they did not propose to wear revolvers the rest of their lives and make themselves targets for bullets in other men's quarrels. Many of these men, have left farms, stock and other property behind them as well as their families. The vigilantes, so called, it seems have made it a practice of riding up and down the country, firing their guns and threat-ening people, and taking their stock, to replace their own when jaded, without their consent, and terrorizing the community generally. The people there are not afraid of the Garrett, Eskridge, Stockton crowd in Durango, but of the Farming-

ton crowd at home.

The boys who are here are quiet and peaceable citizens of Durango, whatever hey may or may not have been elsewhere. Stockton, so far as any one here knows, bas been guilty of no crime, unless attempting to save his brother from the toils of the law, at Cimarron, some years since, be a crime. Upon hearing of the killing of his brother who was no doubt a hard case, although a year or two since, the marshal of Animas City, he came on from Texas to look after his widow, who was wounded and in need and his brother's cattle. The other exiled boys went down to the vicinity of Farmington with him to round up their stock man named Nance and one named Barker (not Boxley, as is given in the News.) came upon their camp accitentally, and before they knew their numbers, according to the account of the boys here, commenced firing at them. The boys returned the fire, killing both Bar ker's horse and himself and giving chase His brother lives in Durango, and to Nance who however, made good his esthat the other party fired first, but neither account bears the slightest resemblance to the one given in the News, which represents the Durango boys as attacking the camp of the others, and going down there for the purpose of killing people, and represents them as a band of desperadoes, ranging over the country and says:

"Their arrival in Durango, was in broad day light, the band riding fearlessly through the city and stopping at various drinking saloons on the main tho-

roughfare, etc." This is simply ridiculous. The boys live here and have done so for months past, and are peaceable well-behaved citizens: so far as people here know. They claim that all the shooting has been done in self-defence, and that all they want is to be allowed to go down to Farmington. to round up their cattle. They found many of their cattle, wantonly killed and rotting on the range, and their cabins burned when they did go down.

They claim to be willing to submit to a trial by the proper authorities; but they will not allow themselves to be taken alive by their mortal enemies, these selftermed vigilantes to he hung without trial, neither will the citizens of Durango, permit them to be so taken. If the law takes them and proves them guilty of crimes that will be another matter.

There are a half-dozen men in the vicinity of Farmington, determined to hunt these boys to the death. The rest of the community have no part nor lot in the quarrel, and would prefer to keep out of it, but in many cases, have been compelled in order to save life and property, or at least under the belief that, otherwise they could not save them, to join the Farmington party, although having no sympathy with them.

There are doubtless some bad men in both parties. It is not likely that a feud could grow to such proportions, with blood shedding on both sides, without more or less of wrong doing on both sides. Evil passions have became inflamed and both parties have doubtless resorted leading east, for several days, at the same to extreme measures; but the account given in the News. is preposterous, gotten up either by the Farmington party, to mislead the public, and create a sympathy for them, or more likely by some irresponsible newspaper reporter, careless of the injury he might do, who has gathered the date, from New Mexican sources, and gotten every thing by the eyelids. A. B. DANIELS.

Crossed the River.

In one of the parlors of the residence of Governor Tabor, Mr. A. B. Daniels, the banker millionaire, expired from heart disease a few minutes before seven o'clock on the evening of April 9th. The sad affair came so sudden, and was so unexpected, that when the rumor was raised about Denver on that evening, it was not generally accepted. For some years past Mr. Daniels has been in illhealth, and had only recently returned from an extended tour in California, where he had gone in the hope of improving his health.

From the Denver News we take the following concerning the life of Mr. Daniels:

"The death of Mr. Daniels, while sudden, was not entirely unexpected, as he had been suffering from heart disease for a number of years.

The late A. B. Daniels was one of Colorado's Pioneers, one of the men who came to the site of Denver in 1859, when the gold discoveries set the world throbbing with excitement, and was gifted with a sufficient amount of discernment to know that the then wilderness would in a few brief years become a powerful star in the galaxy of states. He was about fifty-five years of age and a native of New York state, from whence he removed to Iowa about 1850. He remained in Iowa until 1859, when the Pike's Peak excitement broke out. Dr. Daniels sued a circular calling in the maturing six per cent bonds, about \$200,000,000 in amount, for payment July 13. Those were three children. Mrs. Daniels was laid to rest in Riverside about three years who so desire can have their bonds ex-tended at three and one-half per cent in-by her side. The remaining child is a son eight years of age. A brother and sister of the deceased man reside near the old home-stead. in New York.

During life. Mr. Daniels was exceedingly successful in his business ventures, and leaves a fortune of at least \$1,000,-000. At the time of his demise he was Some very fine specimens of gold ore vice-president of the Colorado National arrival here in 1859 he went into the business of retailing groceries on the corner of Fifteenth and Larimer streets, where the art of gold mining has been brought Hoffer's market now stands, the firm name being Daniels and Brown. The firm was so successful that in 1862 they removed to the corner of Fifteenth and Blake streets. When the great fire in 1863 came their building and stock was burned to the ground, and being uninsured, the loss was what may be termed a total one. Within a few days the firm went into business again on Blake street, directly opposite their former site. Fortune smiled upon them to such an extent that three years later Mr. Daniels withdrew from the very pleasant partnership and entered the banking business with the Kountze Brothers. At all times he has been foremost in the advancement of Colorado interests, and prior to the sale of the Den ver South Park and Pacific railway, was a director in that enterprise. He has always given freely to charity, and his untimely demise will not be mourned in Denver alone, but in every city, town and mining camp in Colorado."


