 IT IS THE POPULAR VOICE OF
 THE PEOPLE.
 Shall We Wait Another Two Years?

The people of Rico should be alive to the fact that it would be a measure of vast benefit to them, and consequently of paramount importance to divide Ouray county. It is a question that will admit of no luke-warmness; every man must be either for or against it. On what grounds people living at this end of the county would base opposition to the matter, we are at a loss to know. The sensible citizens of Ouray are not opposed to the measure, knowing that it is an untold hardship to their fellow citizens on this side of the county, to go fifty miles and more, sometimes over a rough mountain trail, to attend to the most trivial, yet with all absolutely necessary business. True a little expense will be entailed by the creation of the new county. A special election will doubtless have to be held, and county officers will have to be paid, and a jail built, and in the course of time, perhaps a court house, and other public buildings. Yet, withal, we believe it is a measure of public economy, as the cost and inconvenience of going to the county seat is more than the average citizen should reasonably be expected to bear.

From a purely political standpoint, it would be advisable to divide the county. As at present constituted, it is too large for the surveillance of the sheriff or other peace officer. Besides, the cost of transporting prisoners safely to the county jail, over a rough mountain trail, is more than either the people of Ouray or Rico should be willing to pay. From all points that the matter can be viewed it would be for the best interests of the people of this side of the county, to have the new county created. Direct taxes, for a while, may be more than is paid at present, but the indirect taxes paid in money, and time in transacting any business at the county seat at present is far more than will be entailed by the new county. Our people should be unanimous for the measure, and when it becomes known that we want the new county in dead earnest, the people of Ouray will offer no opposition.

Change the Mail Route.

Postmaster Prescott, has during the past week been circulating a petition for the establishment of a new mail route from the terminus of the Rio Grande railroad to Animas City, and from thence here. This is very commendable on the part of the postmaster, and we hope enough signatures of influence and solidity have been appended to it, to make it have weight with the department. Every person in Rico should be interested in the matter, for if it is not pushed to the notice of the department immediately, so that it can be acted upon, we will, doubtless, have to spend the greater part of the winter without mail communication with the outside world. We have no doubt but the Post Office authorities are willing that we should not be deprived of mails; and it is well known to every person here that if the present infamous arrangements are continued, we will not receive mail more than once a month, from December to May. The new route is, by all manner of means, the most practicable, and we see no good reason why our petition should not be granted. It will entail no more expense, and perhaps not so much, as the present route, being far an easier way of transit. Last spring and early summer we advocated this route and have since seen no reason to change our opinion. We understand the people of Silverton have forwarded to the department a like petition, and we hope that our united prayers will be granted.

A Case in Point.

Silverton was without mail for eleven days and then only received the letter mail, which was brought by a private carrier, who was paid \$100 for the trip by the citizens. Brewster, the man who sub-contracts from Gilmer, Salisbury & Co., threw up the contract on the first appearance of the storm and left the people in the lurch and the mail on the range. Is it possible that the so-called mail contracts are contracts only with the government and are not binding on the part of the contractor? Can it be that we are thus left at the mercy of men who can halt or forward the mails by the exercise of their majestic will, and by so doing incur no severer penalty than the stoppage of their pay for work that has not been performed? It would seem that some person should be made to suffer for

blockading the mail for weeks at a time, with no shadow of an excuse other than that they feel so inclined. Whenever the people venture to demand an explanation, the august contractor rises from before a comfortable fire, draws back his skirts to prevent contact with the inquisitive stranger, and with a malignant and overwhelming scowl, answers: "I don't have to." In these four words lies the secret. There is no compulsion and so long as such is the case just so long will we be dictated to and in a measure ruled by mail contractors.

The Smeiter's Progress.

The roaster will be completed to-night at 12 o'clock and the stack will be finished by to-morrow night. Fires will be built on Monday for the purpose of drying out. The flume has been finished from Silver creek and the supply of water is more than sufficient for all uses. The task of roasting ores will commence in three or four days in order to keep a good supply of roasted ore in advance of the smelting process. The smelter will blow in in eight days, from which time everything will be running in full blast. This will be the first smelter that has ever been erected and put in operation in one season in the limits of the San Juan country, and this fact is a feather in Rico's cap of which we may well and justly be proud. There are but few mining camps which will justify, and but few mining companies which will undertake the expenditure of such an immense amount of capital as has been paid out for the erection of the Grand View smelter. The machinery was shipped at the high rate of 12 cents a pound freight from Alamosa to Rico. This, too, when a delay of one month would have decreased the price per pound more than half.

The dastardly Meachem, who has devoted the greater part of his life to the task of vilifying the army, when in danger of being corralled by the people of Ouray, went and sought protection from that body. We remember seeing a statement once from Meachem, that all the vice and disease of the Indians was given by the army; that the army was composed of a pack of drunkards and ruffians who were so inferior to the Indians that a comparison was odious. The gallant Stille, and the chivalrous O'Conner must feel themselves in a nice position, protecting a scoundrel, who is too mean for anything but their contempt.

ARTICLE I.—NAME.

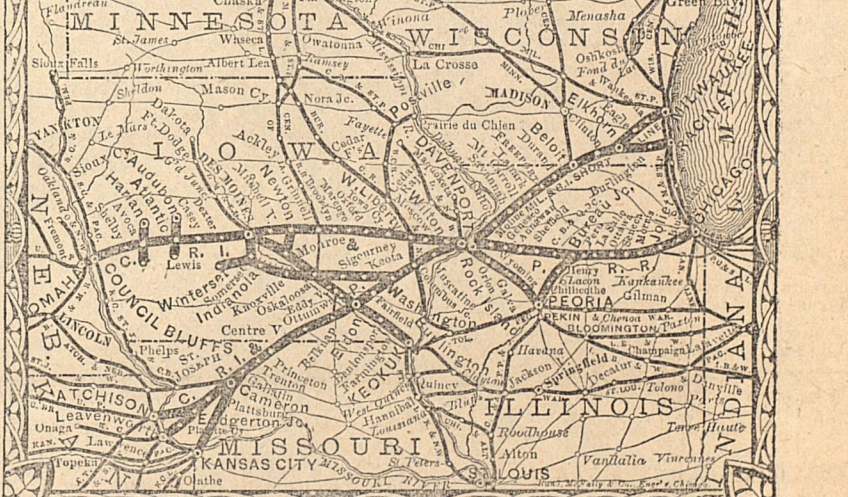
