Recent Land Office Rulings.

If a hearing has been had involving the mineral or non-mineral character of land, and a decision rendered on such hearing by the Secretary of the Interior, the same question upon the same land, or any part thereof, cannot again properly become a subject of a controversy. It is a judgment in rem, conclusive alike as to the parties to the controversy then pending as well as to subsequent claimants.

When the Secretary of the Interior decides a question of fact affecting the classification or character of a tract of public land, it ends all controversy as to the fact

Construing section 2322 U.S. revised tatutes with sections 2389 and 2392, it might be contended that the reservations in favor of townsites should only be of such rights of surface occupancy as accrued before the location of the mining claim. Where a claimant has located a placer claim that has within its limits a bona fide vein or lode, known to exist and not claimed by the placer claimant, a subsequent locator of said lode or vein is entitled to the same, with twenty-five feet of Confederate bonds and a New York firm surface ground on either side thereof and recently advertised for the same offering no entry of such a lode should be allowed, nor will patent issue for a width exceed ing twenty-five feet on either side of the

Where a claimant has located a placer claim, the entry upon said placer claim by another party for the discovery of a lode or vein, is an illegal act, and a location based upon such a discovery is ille gal, and all subsequent proceedings to patent a lode so discovered and located are invalid.

Such discovery of a lode claim gives no right to the discoverer, but affects the rights and duties of the placer claimant by making known the existence of the lode or vein within the placer.

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
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
