LOWER ANIMAS. DIED. Lieutenant Ladley, of 22d U. S. Infantry, died on Jan. 11, at Farmington, N. M.

Letter from Gov. Pitkin. STATE OF COLORADO, EXECUTIVE DEPARTMENT, DENVER, DEC. 28, 1879.

A. E. LONG, Esq., Ouray, Colorado. My Dear Sir:— I have sent Capt. Raymond, at Rico, a copy of the militia law, showing that I cannot give authority to muster the Rico company into the State service until I receive the petition provided for by law.

As soon as that is received I will order some one to muster the company in. The law says I must refer it to an officer, so I suppose I must send some one over from Ouray, or Gen'l Sheetz, from Animas City.

The company need not wait to be mustered in. The guns for them are at Ouray, and they could have had them at any time during the past two months, and can get them any day.

I directed Capt. Parsell to ship them to Rico, and he reported that they were not willing to receive them on the terms which the law prescribed, viz: that is to give the bond.

But in these times we cannot stand much on ceremony. If they need the guns, then please have Capt. Parsell ship them any day, and the state will pay the expense of transportation.

CARBONATES AND NEWS SQUIBS IN GENERAL.

Rico hopes to ship bullion by June 1st. JAN. 25 silver closed at \$1.14 per ounce.

DELLA B.—This mine, situated on Mount Elliott, near Rico, and owned by Messrs. McJunkin, Holden and Lyons, gives a top rock assay of 11 ounces silver per ton. The Della is a new discovery.

HAWKEYE STATE.—This mine located on Mount Elliott, about three miles north of Rico, is owned by Messrs. J. McJunkin, J. R. Holden, and W. A. Lyons, and is being worked for development. An average assay gave 98 ounces silver per ton.

JOHN C. FITMAN, Attorney and Counselor, at Trinidad, Colorado, writes us that he will probably locate in Rico next summer. Mr. Fitman has had many years of practice and experience. He at one time printed a paper in Trinidad, called the Trinidadian.

CENSUS Superintendent Walker has made all arrangements for a complete, economical survey of the mines of the United States which produce precious metal, with a view to present in the report of the coming census full and accurate statistics of the gold and silver product. The scientific investigation of the subject is in the hands of Clarence King.

A BILL has been introduced in the House to establish a mint of the United States in New York City. The bill provides for a Superintendent of Mint at a salary of \$4,500 a year, and also for numerous other officers, whose salaries aggregate \$39,000 a year. It appropriates \$1,000,000 to secure suitable buildings, and \$2,000,000 for the necessary machinery and apparatus.

RAPLEE.—The Raplee lode, situated on Expectation Mountain, is a new discovery, and we would judge a valuable property, as top rock gave an assay of 19 1/2 ounces silver per ton. A vein of about four feet of yellow and black carbonates is now reached, and the work for development goes on. Messrs. A. L. Raplee and Wm. Dwyer, the owners, think they have in this lode a valuable property.

M. S. BUTLER.—This famous carbonate body is situated on Mount Elliott, about three and a half miles north of Rico, near the Dolores river. The property has a considerable amount of development upon it, and is being worked. An average assay gives 41 ounces silver per ton. The owners, Messrs. McJunkin, Holden and Lyons, feel confident that in the Butler they have a valuable property.

It is currently reported that a large amount of mail matter for Rico, lies at the Parrott City postoffice. If this is true it would be well for those who have it in hand to see that this mail is in some way, (most convenient to themselves) transported to Rico. We cannot tolerate this damnable mail torment so close at home. We will watch, and act as a committee of one to report upon the matter.

THE NEWS will not knowingly endorse mines or anything pertaining to the business of mining which does not present an honest look, nor will the paper denounce as fraud, any person or property, without first having obtained full information regarding such subject. It would seem to us, better to get at facts, as there are but few "wild-cat" schemers among hundreds of legitimate mining projectors, comparatively speaking.

DENVER has profited greatly from the wonderful "finds" at Leadville and Silver Cliff.—R. M. M. Review. Rico and the Dolores Carbonate Camp will not only benefit Denver, but the state at large, when the camp has fairly opened. Rico's present is a mere dot comparative to her near future. Pioneer Mining District has more and better mines, with more development than had either Leadville or Silver Cliff at the same age.

NEARLY all the gold and a large portion of the silver produced in the United States during the last year was coined at the mints or used in domestic manufactures, arts and ornamentation. The surplus was exported to non-producing countries. From all information it is safely assumed that the annual consumption in the United States of precious metals in all forms for manufacturing purposes now averages \$7,000,000 of gold and \$5,000,000 of silver.

THE General Land office has recently decided that all affidavits required by law in support of applications for mineral patents must be made by the applicants themselves. Under this ruling a number of applications and affidavits filed in the local land districts by agents of non-resident owners of mines have been rejected. The Acting Commissioner of the General Land Office, however, has, at the instance of Senator Hill, of Colorado, issued an order that no more cancellations of this sort shall be made until Congress takes action upon the pending bill, which provides that such applications and affidavits in case of non-residents shall be valid if sworn to by their local agents, cognizant of the facts.—R. M. Review.

ARMFIELD, from the Committee on Mines and Mining, reported the bill concerning locations of mineral lands. It provides that any person desirous of prospecting and exploring public domain in Colorado, for the discovery of gold and silver bearing ores, which do not outcrop or appear on the surface of the ground, may locate a mining claim 1500 feet in length and not exceeding 600 feet in width, by marking its boundaries with at least six substantial stakes, and shall commence work within ten days thereafter, to explore and define a mineral deposit which must be either by the sinking of a shaft or by open cut, crosscut or tunnel, and so long as the claimant shall work his claim with reasonable diligence the claim shall be valid.

OUR DEPENDENCE.

THE Dolores Carbonate Camp depends upon its ore and bullion product, and not upon the simple value of its most prominent and world-renowned mines. Were Rico's future prosperity dependent upon the present market value of the mines of Pioneer Mining District, (though that market value is flattering) we would not predict for the District, more than an ordinary mining camp. But, here on the Dolores, is found the true fissure of genuine black and yellow, soft and hard carbonate ores, of easy access to wood, water, and transportation. Among the hundreds of mines in Pioneer Mining District many of which are surveyed, there is not one, to our knowledge, which is not accessible to Rico and the numerous mill-site locations adjacent. The fact that there are but few mines in the District which could not be sold, each, for a good round sum, does not alone bespeak for the Carbonate Camp, a prosperous future, but, the immense piles of rich carbonate ore, lying on the "dumps" of the mines that are being worked in the district, insure prosperity and a population of several thousands for Rico by May 1st. No opening for "wild-cat" speculators, but plenty of room for honest, legitimate operation in Dolores Carbonates. Capital is needed, as the average miner is not able to develop his properties and treat his own ores.

FROZEN TO DEATH.

E. F. BRIGGS, a young man, who formerly resided at Leadville, but latterly in Rico, started about three weeks ago, for Animas City, at which place to consummate the sale of some Junction Creek mining property, owned by him. While crossing the range between Rico and Hermosa, he had his feet so badly frozen that he was unable to go farther without the aid of conveyance. Some kind person or persons took him from Hermosa to Animas City. When he had reached his destination, he was told that amputation would be necessary to save life. We are informed by a gentleman who knows that, by amputating the major portion of both feet, his life might have been saved, and he would have had "stubs" left which would have served and enabled him to walk.

It is stated that some feeling existed between the physicians there, in regard to the matter, which caused them to act other than as they should have done. When a man is lying in such condition as was Briggs, physicians should not stand upon a professional hobby but render aid and assistance. Mr. Briggs was a young man of good moral training, a generous noble spirited gentleman, and leaves many warm friends in Rico, who mourn the loss of their fellow comrade. Report of Surveyor Wannemaker.

Rico, Colo., Feb. 5, 1880.

On the 27th day of August, 1879, I commenced the survey of the Extension boundaries of Rico. Started a n w cor. 1, and run n 80 deg. w 2,200 ft., then s 10 deg. w 6,336 ft., the s 80 deg. e 2,200 ft., then n 10 deg. e 6,336 ft., to cor. 1. The four corners which were set are as per post about 5 feet, by 6 inches square. This survey was completed Sept. 3, 1879. I then drew one plot and sent to county judge. On Oct. 25th, drew two more plots, and sent one to the Secretary of State, at Denver, and the other to the county clerk. Jan. 14, 1880, completed the survey of the whole block 14. Jan. 16, completed survey of block 13. Jan. 17, completed survey of block 12. Jan. 20, completed the survey of lots 15 to 28, inclusive, in block 16. Jan. 21, completed survey of east half of block 7. Jan. 22, completed survey of lots 1 to 10 and 27 to 40 in block 17. Jan. 31, completed survey of the west half of block 10. Feb. 1, completed survey of block 11. The corners to every lot are marked by a spruce peg 11 inches long, driven down to the ground, with a tack in the top, to mark the corner more precisely.

ORDINANCES.

(NO. 1.) AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING TOWN PROPERTY IN RICO.

At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the town of Rico, called by the mayor, Jan. 9, 1880, the following ordinances were passed relative to the filing of town lots, for record, with the Town Recorder: Be it enacted by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico: SECTION 1. All lots located before Jan. 9, 1880, being and lying in blocks No. 1 one, 2 two, 3 three, 4 four, 5 five, and 6 six, shall be filed for record within 30 thirty days from Jan. 14th, 1880.

(NO. 2.) AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING TOWN PROPERTY IN RICO.

At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the town of Rico, called by the mayor, Jan. 9, 1880, the following ordinances were passed relative to the filing of town lots, for record, with the Town Recorder: Be it enacted by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico: SECTION 1. All lots located before Jan. 9, 1880, being and lying in blocks No. 1 one, 2 two, 3 three, 4 four, 5 five, and 6 six, shall be filed for record within 30 thirty days from the completion of the survey of the blocks in which they are situated, be filed for record, with the Town Recorder. SECTION 2. All lots located after Jan. 9, 1880, if in blocks surveyed at time of location, shall within 30 thirty days after location, be filed for record, with the town recorder, but if in blocks not surveyed at the time of location, they shall within 30 thirty days after the completion of the survey of the block in which they are situated, be filed for record, with the town recorder. SECTION 3. All lots not filed for record within 30 thirty days, as specified in the three foregoing sections, the fees for recording shall increase at the rate of 100 one hundred percent per month, until such lots are filed for record. F. W. RAYMOND, Mayor. D. MCGRAW, Clerk.

(NO. 3.) AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING FEES FOR RECORDING AND TRANSFERRING.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico:— That the amount charged for recording shall be \$2.00 (two dollars) for each and every town lot in the town of Rico, Colorado. And that

for each and every transfer of Rico town property, \$1.00 (one dollar) shall be charged. F. W. RAYMOND, Mayor. D. MCGRAW, Clerk.

(NO. 4.) ORDINANCE CONCERNING LOCATION OF RICO TOWN LOTS.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico, SECTION 1. Any lots located after January 14th, 1880, and the thirty (30) days having expired, without twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars worth of permanent improvements having been put upon the ground, such lots shall be open to re-location, if other parties, only, and first locator shall be barred from re-location of such lot or lots. SEC. 2. All lots located after January 20th, 1880, must be located by the person claiming such lots. And no person shall put another's name upon a stake, claiming any lot or lots in the Town. F. W. RAYMOND, Mayor. D. MCGRAW, Clerk.

AMENDMENT TO ORDINANCE NO. 1. Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico,

That the word "block" in sections two (2) and three (3), of Ordinance No. 1, be stricken out, and the words "part of block" be substituted for same. F. W. RAYMOND, Mayor. D. MCGRAW, Clerk.

(NO. 4.) ORDINANCE CONCERNING VALUE AND NATURE OF IMPROVEMENTS.

At a special meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico, called by the mayor (23rd day of Jan., 1880), the following ordinances were passed: Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico, Each and every lot in the town of Rico, shall have a separate twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars worth of improvements in the town. (Unless permanent improvements are put upon two lots such improvements covering a major portion of each lot, in such case the value of such improvements shall be not less than one hundred (\$100.00) dollars.) (NO. 5.) ORDINANCE CONCERNING THE CUTTING OF TREES.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico, Any person or persons cutting or destroying any standing trees in any of the streets or alleys of the town of Rico, without permission from the street commissioners, shall for each and every offense, be fined not less than ten (\$10.00) dollars or more than fifty (\$50.00) dollars, or imprisoned in the town jail not less than five (5) or more than twenty (20) days. (NO. 6.) ORDINANCE CONCERNING MISDEMEANORS.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico, Any person or persons disturbing the peace in the town of Rico, by hallooing, using profane or indecent language, or displaying of fire arms, within the town limits, shall for each and every offense, be fined not less than five (\$5.00) dollars or more than ten (\$10.00) dollars, or imprisoned in the town jail not less than five (5) or more than ten (10) days. (NO. 7.) ORDINANCE CONCERNING UNCLAIMED GROUND OR LOTS.

Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico, All unclaimed ground within the exterior boundaries of the Town of Rico, shall become the property of the town, and all persons obtaining lots must obtain them from the Town Trustees. F. W. RAYMOND, Mayor. D. MCGRAW, Clerk.

(NO. 8.) AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING FIRE FLUES, ETC.

At a regular meeting of the Board of Trustees of the town of Rico, Jan. 29th, 1880, the following ordinance was passed, concerning the condition of chimneys, fire flues, stove-pipes, etc. Be it ordained by the Board of Trustees of the Town of Rico, SECTION 1. All chimneys, flues, fireplaces and stove pipes in the town of Rico, shall have a sufficient amount of brick, adobe, mud, tin, iron, or non-combustible material between said chimneys, flues, droppings, or stovepipes, and any logs, lumber, or any combustible material, to prevent said combustible material from lighting. SEC. 2. All stove pipe that protrudes through the roof, or side of any house in the town of Rico, shall protrude no less than two (2) feet, and shall be guarded with tin, iron, or some non-combustible material, where it passes through the roof or side of said house. SEC. 3. All chimneys, flues, fireplaces and stovepipes in the town of Rico, shall be subject to the inspection of the fire-warden, and said fire-warden shall, if he deems it necessary, or complains having been made, inspect any or all chimneys, flues, fire-places and stovepipes in the town of Rico. Any person or persons having been warned by the fire warden, that their chimney, flue, fire-place, or stovepipe is in an unsafe condition, and shall neglect to place the same in a safe condition within 24 hours shall be fined not less than \$10.00 or more than \$50.00, or imprisoned in the town jail not less than five (5) or more than twenty (20) days. (NO. 9.) AN ORDINANCE CONCERNING PROPERTY BELONGING TO THE TOWN OF RICO.
