In new camps where the character and value of the ore are yet to be determined, miners and paospectors are guided in their work to a considerable extent by the 1esults given by the assayer, and in cases of this kind not only mischief, but injustice, is perpetrated ignorantly or wilfully by false assaying. Labor and money may be expended on a worthless claim, and in the high districts, where the time for prospecting is timited, a season may be wasted; or, on the other hand, a good lode may be abandoned by the discoverer because the assayer failed to give him the actual value of the ore, a fact which


