OUR DEAD PRESIDENT.

At last the sad tidings of the death of our President has been heralded north, east, west and south and the hearts of Attest America from St. Johns bay to the gulf of California and from Cedar Keys to the Willamette river are bowed with grief that is as bitter as it is unanimous. There are many who believed that the President would not die and continued hoping against hope until death has first there are others who never thought that the wound would not prove a fatal one, and were in a measure prepared for Sept. 20th, in the front parlor of his resthe end, but even to those the blow seems a sudden and irreparable one-and it is the Judges of the Supreme Court an irreparable loss. Garfield's struggle with death was a long and bravely contested one, but the grim destroyer battled only too successfully with all the artifices of science and medical skill, and after two months and a half of pain and suffering the victim was gradually brought to his dying hour. The thought that President Garfield is dead is a sad one in every point of view, -national, moral or social. His family thinks not of the nation's grief; his mother's thought is now, as before, "Oh! why have they shot my boy?" His wife only thinks of her hus band and his children of their dead parent. Theirs is a sorrow which does not think or care whether Arthur is his successor or not and the calamity to the nation does not trouble their grief-stricken hearts. We pity them more than the .Union. The nation can stand and will in time practically forget, but they will mourn until death unites them all in the misty beyond.

The Nation's Sorrow.

The remains of the late president were removed to Washington on Wednesday last, the train leaving Elberton at 10 a. m., and reaching Washington at 4, p. m. Detachments from the U.S. A. were in attendance. The remains lay in state in the rotunda of the capitol yesterday and day before and religious services were observed in the rotunda at 3 o'clock vesterday afternoon. At 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon the remains were transferred to the funeral car and will reach Cleveland at 2 p. m. to-day over the Pennsylvania railroad. The remains will lie in state in Cleveland until 2 o'clock Monday afternoon when they will be interred in

James A. Garfield, of Mentor, was born in Orange, Cuyahoga county, Ohio, November 19, 1831; graduated at William's College, Massachusetts, in 1856; was president of a literary institution for several years; studied and practiced law; was a member of the state senate of Ohio in 1059-60; entered the Union army in 1861 as colonel of the Forty-second Ohio Volunteers; was promoted to the rank of brigadier-general, January 10, 1862; was appointed chief of the staff of the Army of the Cumberland, and was promoted to the rank of major general, September 20, 1863; was elected to the Thirty-eighth. Thirty-ninth, Fortieth, Forty-first, Forty second, Forty-third, Forty-fourth, Fortyfifth and Forty-sixth Congresses as a Republican to the lower house, representing the counties of Ashtabula, Geauga, Lake, Mahoning, and Trumbull. He then became United States Senator, which position he resigned to become the president of the United States. He was a member and at one time a minister of the Christian church. At the time of his death he was about fifty years of age.

A party of sixteen prospectors went into the eastern portion of the state with the avowed intention of whipping out the Southern Utes, and all but two of them were surprised and massacred. The In. dians who are now on their way to Leavenworth, are supposed to have been among the number engaged in the massacre. A demand was made for them, and the Unthe M. S. 


