





The other rewards which are offered bring the amount up to an aggregate of \$3,000, and twenty Navajo Indians, under the direction of Billy Katzenbach and Rud Haberland, are now in pursuit. Should they be in the territory or within one hundred miles of the San Mateo range of mountains, there is but little doubt that they will be captured.
