of the Denver & Rio Grande Railway to Farmington, as it is shown by the NEWS of Nov. 15, that the first objective point, on their line directed West, is a point near the mouth of Rio Piedra, which stream empties in Rio San Juan

about forty-five miles northeasterly and above where Rio Las Animas empties into the San Juan, and where the town of Farmington is situated. The route via mouth of-and followup the Animas river, is the most practicable by which to reach the Gold, Silver and Carbonate Fields of the San Juan Mining Region. These valleys of Southern Colorado and North-

ern New Mexico, are important factors of the General Industry of the so called Southwest, and a source of supply for the demand for produce in the Mineral sections. The Post-office Department favored our peo-

ple with a semi-weekly mail route, with service, and the establishment of three post-offic es, and appointment of postmasters for the same, in the Lower Animas valley, about the first of last July-service not beginning until in August. The people had prayed for this three years before their prayer was heeded.

And yet, our good people, "their constitu-ents" of New Mexico government, have prayers for the "cut-off" and organization of a new county, etc., which have been sent in to head-quarters, from time to time-unhonored and unheeded.

We also, want our mail route, with service, extended to Fort Wingate, about one hundred and fifty miles southwest of Farmington, the present termini, thereby connecting with the nain Southern line of thoroughfare, on to the Pacific Coast. This would furnish Southern Colorado a quicker and more direct line of communication with the farther West, than

it now has. INDIANS. If the Utes and Navajoes could be held within the boundary lines of their respective res-ervations, only allowing them to travel some route fartherest from the settlements, when

absolutely necessary-if ever-and then, with written permit to do so, designating their number, and time of absence from their reservation, from date to date, given at the op-tion of their Agent, and attach a penalty and fine to any violation or variance from said order, we would be much less annoyed with Indians. 




