The settlers reported that they had gone over into Utah on a raid. The people in that vicinity are firmly convinced, that these hostile Indians include many of the young men of the Southern Utes and not Pah Utes alone. They have now, however, all gone out of the state.

> In 1870, Colorado only had a popula tion of 39,864. She had no aspirations for state-hood. Not a railroad had enered her borders. Her assessed valuaion was only \$12,000,000, and her bullion yield per annum was only \$3,375,000. The pioneer railroad, ten years ago, hesi-tated long before crossing the desert to enter Colorado. Now the state is girdled v railroads, and railroad companies tunel under snow-clad mountains and blast heir way through her defiles and passes without regard to expense. The popula-tion has swelled to 200,000. She has an assessed valuation of \$74,000,000, and her bullion yield in 1880 was \$22,500,000, and for 1881 it is estimated at \$40,000,-000. Her cattle and sheep have swelled also from a few scattering herds in 1870

to enormous proportions in 1880. Each year she now ships east 100,000 head of beef cattle, and the statistics of 1880 show 1,500,000 sheep in the state.-Leadville Herald.

He thinks at one time the crater of the mountains was sixty miles long and from fifteen to twenty miles across, an erup-tion from which would destroy every living thing within a hundred miles.

### Tender Memory.

Col. D. C. Russell, formerly of San Juan, but now of New Mexico, pays the following pretty little tribute to the memory of N. H. Love:

In 1874 Newton Herbert Love was a Tennessee youth. He was my intimate personal friend, and was for years my law blaze. After supper, the party, which consisted of several men, piled up about four tons of the rock and fired it. The flames lit up the country for several the flames lit up the country for several thous-and yards around and continued to blaze with unusual brilliancy until near morn-he had become the intellectual peer of the ablest lawyers at an exceptionally able bar. He was no orator, but he was a thorough lawyer. By merit prominent in public matters, his extreme modesty, like the virgin blush of virtue, but disclosed the vestal deity that burned beneath it.

His death was caused by that laudable ambition which permitted no rest from labor. Had his strength not failed, there is no naming his future. No man made fewer mistakes. No man was readier to correct those few when shown them. Radically opposite to me in political faith, he consulted freely with me while himself the standard bearer of the democracy of his section; and oh! how sadly pleasant it is now to recall the stirring scenes of those campaigns.

To his legions of friends in Colorado his friend in New Mexico sends greet-ing, sad though that greeting be; and while the world were better had he lived, still with all my heart I say: Green be his memory like the grass upon his grave, D. C. R.
