

Patent Notes.

Denver Mining Review. When the purchase at the local land office is completed, and the certificate is sued, the purchaser at once acquires a vested right, of which he cannot be subsequently deprived and the land ceases to be a part of the public domain. An entry made is equivalent to a patent issued. No patent can issue for a vein or lode without surface ground.

If the patent is broader than the law, it is to that extent nugatory.

A patent was issued to the Bullion Company, on the Comstock lode, Nevada, in which a reservation was inserted passenger traffic positively assured, it is reciting the fact that the surface ground described is the estimated area of the lode, and that only the actual surface lode was intended to be conveyed.
