Senator H. M. Teller is tendered the position of Secretary of the Interior, and whether or not he will accept, is simply a matter of newspaper speculation and political gossip.

If the people of Rico wish to send the Honorable Thos. M. Bowen to fill such vacancy, they will follow in the steps of the citizens of other cities and towns, and inform Governor Pitkin of their desires by petition, as early as possible.

RICO MUST BE REPRESENTED At the National Mining Exposition of Denver.

As yet but very little interest has been manifested in Rico regarding the display of Rico ores at the National Mining Exposition, and the importance of it once taking active steps to secure space in the buildings and make other arrangements for having Rico mines properly represented does not seem to be comprehended by our mining men.

We have gleaned considerable information from a letter written by Mr. S. T. Armstrong, the Secretary of the Exposition and will again publish it, although appearing in a previous issue (March 11th).

The National Mining and Industrial Exposition may be set down as one of the established institutions of our state and will be opened for the first annual exposition about the first of next August.

The mineral and mining department will be under the management and direction of an eminent mining expert and geologist. This department will be perpetuated as a museum, and will be accessible to the public throughout the year and every year, so that all the varieties of minerals and the various methods of treating or reducing them may be intelligently examined at any time by the capitalist or the miner.

It is designed in this connection to exhibit a record of every mine, giving its history in all the essential and necessary details to afford an investigator the exact or most approximate truth. Mines and mining districts will be encouraged by every guarantee which can be reasonably given to improve their exhibits from time to time, as their development shall warrant.

The location of the Exposition buildings is peculiarly favored in all important particulars and the main building, which is designed after the National Museum at Washington, and will be situated in the center of a plat of forty acres, which will afford abundant room for concessions to such districts as may want to erect their own buildings.

Other states and territories are moving in this matter and we hope to see Colorado represented by such an exhibit from all her camps as will fully justify the claim we make, that she is naturally the richest and greatest mining state in the union.

It is expected most confidently to bring to Colorado this year, 200,000 visitors and it is impossible to do too much towards instructing these strangers about our resources.

The first steps concerning the manner in which our mines are to be represented and specimens collected and forwarded, properly come under the province of the Rico Mining Exchange and we offer the humble suggestion that the directors of that institution at once take the matter under earnest consideration.

be agitated and the people in general be made cognizant of the great benefits to be derived. They cannot be overestimated. It is expected that the Exposition will be open about July 1st, and it would be a splendid idea to send some representative man to Denver who could attend to the Rico department, arrange the ores, select a choice cabinet for rare specimens and remain during the first 90 or 100 days of the opening to see that inquiring visitors are properly informed.

We take the following items from the Rocky Mountain Record concerning the recent incorporation of two Rico companies:

March 13.—The Rico Mining Exchange was incorporated by Julius Thompson, J. W. Winkfield, A. H. Munde, F. R. Lewis, S. W. McCormick, F. W. Raymond, Chas. A. Jones, Richard Pohl and F. C. Bishop, with a capital of \$5,000 in 300 shares of \$25 each, for the purpose of facilitating the transfer of mining properties in Pioneer mining district, Dolores, San Juan, La Plata, Ouray and Gunnison counties, and aiding in the development of the same, and the transaction of a general mining brokerage business. Their office is in Rico.

March 18.—The Blanchette and Great Western Consolidated Mining company was incorporated by E. C. Patchell, H. B. Mattox, J. L. Roudsush, Dale O. Cowan, J. D. McKeever, W. P. Roudsush, E. P. Snydam, James Yeast and H. Blanchard, for the purpose of carrying on mining operations in Dolores and Ouray counties. Their capital stock is \$500,000 to be divided into 5,000 shares of \$100 each. The office is in Rico, Dolores county.

MINING AND MILL MENTION.

Work on the Spanking Jack will be commenced about April 1st.

At the Nora Lilley, Grand View and Wabash, the usual forces keep pegging away day and night.

Ed. Davis has been working a gang of men on the Trident for the Trident company and reports a good strike.

At the Grand View smelter a few men are at work cleaning up, preparatory to commencing active work.

W. A. Konecman took a number of men from town on Monday and has employed them on properties at the Trout Lakes.

W. L. Hull, the superintendent of the Johnny Bull, has been at the mine this week making arrangements to put as large a force of men at work as possible.

About twenty men are busy laying the foundation for new buildings at Waring's works and teams are engaged in hauling material to place in the hands of the stonemasons. Judging from indications, no time will be lost in getting the buildings ready to receive the machinery. Trow Hayes is superintending the work and Mike McCool has the contract.

The Minnie lode is a promising Expectation mountain location, with little development—an incline shaft 25 feet in depth. From this lode the first assay was 2 1/2 ounces gold and 58 ounces silver, giving a total of \$114.56. The second assay returned 10 1/2 ounces gold and 205 ounces silver, being a total in dollars and cents of \$51.60. Mineral is now being saved by the owners, who are O. H. Taylor, J. W. Lyons, D. D. Woodruff and T. C. Johnston.

His many warm and true friends throughout San Juan and Colorado will regret to learn that J. L. McNeil will soon retire permanently from all his banking ventures, notably the Bank of San Juan, of Alamosa, and Bank of Durango. C. M. Williams of Durango, will take his place in the Durango institution. Mr. McNeil has been engaged in the banking business in San Juan for many years and counts more friends than hairs on his noble head.

The Denver Republican of yesterday contains a serious charge against the management of the Deaf and Dumb Asylum at Colorado Springs, in arranging for a marriage between two of the mutes in order, as is alleged, to hide the disgrace of the really guilty parties.
