PATENTED CLAIMS. From the Mining Gazette Much of the hazard attendant upon mining as a business, springs from the uncertain element surrounding possessory titles-only. Claim owners, as a rule, are content to go on year after year with annual assessments which are due until United States patents are granted and the money for the land is paid into the hands of a Receiver of the Land office, and vet their titles are liable to be imperiled by contiguous discoveries any day or hour up to the time that the money is paid and the patent issued. Discoveries of value are not infrequently made after twice the amount actually required to secure a patent for an adjacent claim has been expended thereon without important disclosures of productive ore bodies, and in that way many conflicts arise which culminate in expensive litigation that might be avoided, if mine owners would apply for and secure patents as soon as the preliminary work required by law is completed. It is not difficult to procure patents for mining claims, but vhen their value as mines has been established, and they are known to be worth fighting for, the percentage of risk from adverses is greatly increased. In other words, the feeling now existing in society will not sustain a man in givng false testimony unless there is money in sight and obtainable. Consequently it is not easy to secure a preponderance of testimony to sustain an adverse claim against an unproductive property. state of things alone should be sufficient incentive to claim owners to proceed promptly with the work of obtaining patents for claims on which all require-ments of the law have been fulfilled. For example: A—— owns a lode claim on which he has expended the full sum of \$500, and has m addition only \$300 or at most \$500, at his command for de-

velopment purposes, which, so far as human foresight can determine, will be insufficient to make his property productive or prove that it can be made so. ought he to do? 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

The Capital Question.

The following from the Denver Republican, gives some instructive information as to the manner of balloting on the capitol question:
"The last Legislature of Colorado

passed several acts which seem to be generally ignored in the discussion of the capital question. It may not be amiss to resurrect these acts at this time, just as they are to become applicable.

On page 41 of the pamphlet laws of lished by Alex. R. Chisolm, 60. Broadthe State for 1881 is found a bill to proway, is advertised in the News, and convide for submitting the question of the permanent location of the seat of govern ment to the qualified electors of the State. This act, after providing for the matter of notification to the people contains the following important provision:

Sec. 3. All persons voting on said question shall vote by separate ballot, whereon shall be placed the words, "For" (inserting here the name of the place) "as the seat of government." No person shall vote on this question who is not at the time a qualified elector of this State, and a majority of all the votes upon said question cast at said election shall be necessary to determine the location of

"By separate ballot" seems to be a new provision in elections in this State. In the older States, as in Pennsylvania and Ohio, for instance, all ballots are "separate." That is, national, State, county, judicial, municipal, and even ward (dis trict) tickets are voted separately. The same board of election receives them. they bear the same number, but are cast into separate boxes. The existing election boards will have to provide an additional box and see that each ballot "for (or against) the capital" is cast into it separately. That will fulfill the law. All tickets attached to the regular county tickets will be illegal and have to be cast

The law requires that every person voting "shall be a qualified elector." The same Legislature, by the act approved February 18, 1881, changed the status of the "qualified electors." The law will be found on page 113, and reads as follows: First-He shall be a citizen of the United States, or, not being a citizen of the United States, he shall have declared his intention, according to law, to become such citizen, not less than four

months before he offers to vote. 

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
