The Conclusiveness of Patents.

The question of the conclusiveness of patents lately so much discussed in the courts, is one of special interest to miners. In the litigation known as the Leadville Town Lot case, an important principal is laid down by Judge Love, of the Colorado court, on a motion for a new trial.

Judge Love says: "Here is a patent that may be a valid patent or it may not be a valid patent; it calls for 164 acres of land, and is, of course, founded upon a placer location. Now then, whether or not the officer who issued the patent had authority by law to do it, depends upon the fact whether the location was made before or after the year 1870; but the presumption is that it was rightfully issued; that it was issued upon a location prior to 1870. Now the question is, can you overcome that presumption? Can you show, by the records upon which the officer acted, that, in point of fact, the location upon which the patent was issued, was subsequent to 1870? Upon the whole I think it can. It was necessary that the fact should be before the officer, before he could pass upon it properly, before he could say whether he had legal authority to do it or not.
