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Ten Circus Men Burned to Cinders. News of a horrible accident in Colorado on Thursday night of last week is brought in Denver papers. At 11 o'clock that night the train belonging to the Anglo-American circus, Miles Orton, proprietor, left Fort Collins for Golden, via the Greeley, Salt Lake & Pacific road.

THEY ALL WANT WEALTH.—Said the last Denver Mining Review: "We want money to develop our mines; we want money to sink shafts; we want money to run tunnels; we want money to build smelters and stamp mills; we want money with which to show up the richest country in the world.

AN exchange says: "The construction of the Canadian Pacific Railroad through British Columbia is one of the most difficult feats ever attempted. The average cost of construction between Emory and Boston Bar, a distance of twenty nine miles, is over \$80,000 per mile.

"We've got a beautiful town," said a Dakota man at the Palmer House yesterday. "Eighteen months ago it was a bare prairie. Now we have 2,000 population, forty stores, seventeen saloons—elegant, some of them—an opera house, four variety shows, eight beer gardens, a dime museum, three gambling houses, thirteen hotels, two breweries and the stock for another one all sold, a distillery, a paid police force and two steam fire engines."
