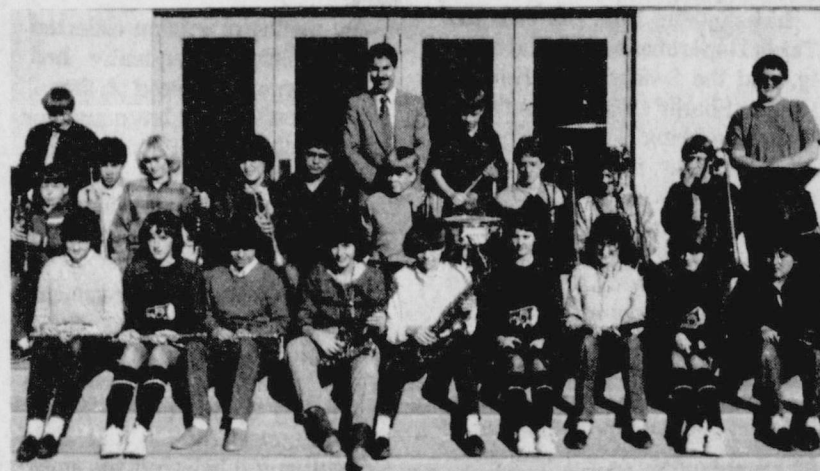

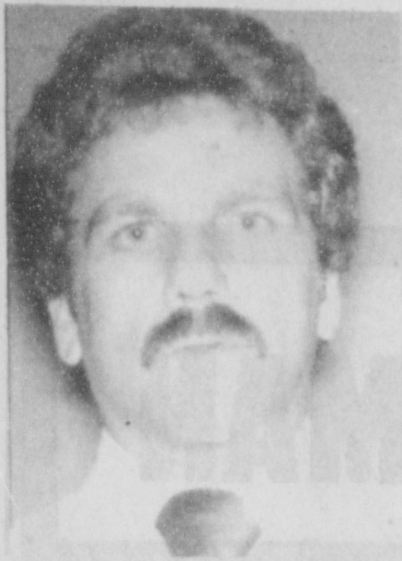

TEXAS MOST WANTED
Fugitive #3

COAHOMA, Texas -- The people around the West Texas town of Coahoma say Anthony Ginnetti was a super salesman.

Investigators from the FBI, the Texas Department of Public Safety, and the Swisher and Howard County Sheriff's Departments say the same thing. The only problem, they say, is that all Ginnetti sold was a "Bill of Goods".

Ginnetti, who also goes by the names of Terry Lee Ginnetti, Terry Lee Prero, Anthony Culpert, and Tony Argus, is wanted by the state and federal law enforcement officials on charges of defrauding the Coahoma State Bank out of \$260,000 and a private individual out of some \$150,000.

The dapper-looking 37-year-old fugitive began negotiating with the Coahoma State Bank in October, 1982, to secure an automobile "floor plan" for his Car City Auto Sales and Service business. The original agreement, say investigators, was for \$38,000 worth of automobile purchases. A total of \$20,000 was to be secured by a Certificate of Deposit held by the bank and the rest of the loan was to be secured by automobile titles held by the bank as collateral.

But detectives say that between October, 1982, and April, 1984,

Ginnetti was able to get the "floor plan" raised to \$80,000, with \$30,000 in CD's and the remainder in automobile titles.

During the same period of time, say investigators, Ginnetti was able to defraud the bank in the following manner:

--replacing all good automobile titles held by the bank with illegally acquired titles, thereby effectively reducing a portion of the collateral held by the bank.

--passing insufficient fund checks, which were honored by the bank.

--having the bank release liens on automobiles by telling them he had the vehicles sold and would return with the money. He would never deposit the money in the bank.

--by writing checks on collected funds which subsequently had "Stop Payment" placed on them.

--by purchasing a large number of automobiles or customer drafts which were honored by the bank, despite the fact there was not sufficient funds on deposit at the bank.

--forging signatures on vehicles held by the bank.

--forging his partner's signature to checks and drafts which were honored by the bank.

Investigators caution that while Ginnetti might have left the state, there is a possibility that he might still be somewhere in Texas operating in the same manner.

Ginnetti is described as white male, 5-9, 175 pounds, with blue eyes and blonde hair.

This week Texas Most Wanted is offering a \$1,000 reward for information leading to Ginnetti's capture. To be eligible for the reward citizens are asked to call Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. Callers do not have to

reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a weekly cooperative effort between Crime Stoppers and the Department of Public Safety and is designed to enlist the support of citizens in capturing dangerous fugitives.

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As of January 16, 1985, the Department of Public Safety reported that Ginnetti is wanted on the following warrants:

Swisher County #1796, dated 4-18-84; Howard County #3948 & #3949, dated 4-27-84; and FBI warrant dated 5-14-84, Unlawful Flight to Avoid Prosecution.

Southwestern Bell exceeds '84 projections

ST. LOUIS--Southwestern Bell Corporation has reported a net income for 1984 that exceeds the company's projections for its first year as an independent company. The corporation is one of seven regional holding companies formed by the divestiture of American Telephone and Telegraph on January 1, 1984.

The company reported net income of \$883.1 million, or \$9.04 per average common share on 97.7 million average shares outstanding. Return to average total shareholders' equity for 1984 was 13.14 percent. Return on average total capital was 10.67 percent.

Total revenues and sales for the year were \$7.2 billion, and total operating expenses and costs were \$5.3 billion.

In the Information Statement and Prospectus issued in November, 1983, Southwestern Bell Corporation projected net income of \$869.6 million or \$8.93 per average common share.

Zane E. Barnes, chairman and chief executive officer, attributed 1984's results to a game plan that strategically assessed the corporation's strengths and opportunities.

"We continue to emphasize our core business--the telephone company and its role in this rapidly changing telecommunications industry. Plus, we wanted to earn high service marks from our telephone customers and we did in 1984," Barnes said.

"At the same time, we are taking advantage of market opportunities outside of our regulated telephone business."

The chairman pointed to the quick start-up of its Mobile Systems subsidiary in the growing cellular mobile phone market, the launching of Silver Pages by its Publications unit and the activity of Southwestern Bell Telcom in marketing equipment in more than 20 states.

"The success factor in all our operation is listening to our customers' needs and responding with new services and technology," Barnes stressed.

"I'm also particularly proud of our employees whose careful control of costs along with our aggressive introduction of expense reducing technology was a major factor in achieving our positive earnings results," Barnes said.

For the quarter ended December 31, 1984, net income was \$223.6 million. Earnings per common share for the quarter were \$2.25 on 99.2 million average shares outstanding.

Total revenues and sales for the fourth quarter were \$1.9 billion, and total operating expenses and costs were \$1.4 billion.

Return on average total capital for the fourth quarter was 10.52 percent. Return to average total shareholders' equity is still below that required by investors.

Because Southwestern Bell Corporation began operations on January 1, 1984, following divestiture from AT&T and the former

Bell System, comparisons to 1983 results are not meaningful. The 1984 earnings figures are a composite of the results of all four of the corporation's current operating subsidiaries.

Southwestern Bell Corporation is a telecommunications holding company, headquartered in St. Louis, with approximately \$18 billion in total consolidated assets.

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company, the largest of the subsidiaries, provides basic telephone service to about eight million customers in Arkansas, Kansas, Missouri, Oklahoma and Texas.

Other subsidiaries are Southwestern Bell Telecommunications, which markets business and residential telecommunications equipment; Southwestern Bell Publications, which markets and publishes advertising directories, primarily Yellow Pages and the Silver Pages, a directory for senior citizens introduced in 1984; and Southwestern Bell Mobile Systems, which markets mobile communications services using cellular technology.

A.S.C.S. Conducts Signup for 1985 Commodity Programs

In an effort to control excess crop supplies and maintain a better balance between supply and demand, the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service, on October 15th, began accepting applications for the 1985 feed grain, wheat, cotton and rice acreage reduction programs. The sign up period ends March 1st.

Farmers who meet the acreage reduction requirements will be eligible to receive price support loans and target price protection, in addition to land diversion payments for wheat, upland cotton and rice, according to county ASCS official Keith Martin.

"By reducing planted acreage and production, farmers minimize the possibility of a return to excess supply situations and low prices, and also maintain a level of stocks in line with market demand," Keith said.

The 1985 commodity programs call for a 35 percent reduction in rice, a 30 percent reduction in wheat and upland cotton, and a 10 percent reduction in feed grain and extra long staple cotton acres. As a part of that reduction, program participants will receive payments for diverting 10 percent of their wheat and upland cotton

acres, or for diverting 15 percent of their rice acres. Keith said farmers may request at signup, one half of the land diversion payment and one half of the projected 1985 deficiency payment for upland cotton, feed grains, wheat and rice.

Cropland idled by the programs is placed in an acreage conservation reserve and planted to certain grasses, legumes, small grains or maintained in other cover to prevent soil and water erosion. "The contract also requires that farmers maintain these acres through normal control measures for insects, weeds and rodents." The ASCS official said harvesting ACR land is prohibited, and grazing is prohibited during the five principal growing months of June thru October.

To apply for the 1985 acreage reduction programs, or obtain further program details, farmers may contact the Hansford County ASCS office between 8 am, and 5 pm, Monday through Friday.

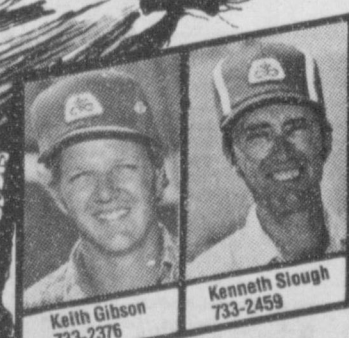

VOLUNTEER PROGRAM VITAL TO OPERATION OF RONALD HOUSE

"Our volunteer program is what keeps the Ronald House running smoothly. We couldn't do it without the help of the many wonderful volunteers!" That's how Ronald House resident manager Sharon Dodd summed up the importance of the more than 60 men, women and teenagers who offer their time and talents in service to the Ronald McDonald House of Amarillo.

Volunteers staff the facility on a daily or weekly basis, assisting in a myriad of duties. The volunteers may be asked to register guests, assist in cleaning and caretaking of the house and grounds, perform office work, drive residents to and from medical facilities in the Ronald House van, or, most importantly, offer their friendship and encouragement to each family, giving them the emotional support so necessary during times of need.

Needs of the residents change on a regular basis, said Mrs. Dodd, so a volunteer's duties may change just as regularly. She said that the volunteer staff is always ready and eager to give whatever is necessary of their time and services.

"We have a wealth of talent among our volunteers," noted Mrs. Dodd. And, indeed, their creativity is evident in the seasonal decorations that adorn the common rooms, in the tantalizing aromas wafting from the kitchen, in the vegetable and flower gardens, and in the needlework pillows offered to young hospital patients.

The volunteer program also reaches out beyond the Ronald House facility with a variety of programs designed to extend the goodwill and concern of the organization. Many of the programs bring a little more joy and happiness to the children in the pediatrics units at the hospitals.

There's a weekly visit from the "Candy Man" — a volunteer bringing sweet treats to the children who are allowed to receive them. Or the "Three Pigs" — three volunteer ladies exuding charm and cheerfulness to the young patients — and dressed in costumes fit for fairy tales. And for all the tots needing an extra dose of security — once a week a group of volunteers skilled in needlework loss in to the hospital rooms a variety of hand-sewn pillows especially made for cuddling.

"We'd never be able to list all the truly thoughtful ways the volunteers help out around here,"

stated Mrs. Dodd. "We just know that we'd be lost without them!" Mrs. Dodd works closely with the chairperson of each shift of volunteers to organize and operate the volunteer program. Scheduling of volunteer shifts and duties is cooperatively handled by Tommie Barkley, morning chairperson, Cindy Van Zandt, afternoon chairperson, and Kaedean Williams and Doug Snow, evening and weekend chairpersons.

According to Mrs. Dodd, the first request for volunteers last July brought an overwhelming response. And, she said, the volunteer staff has expanded since that time. However, she continued, as the facility has grown more functional and more involved, so have its needs. So more volunteers are needed, and most especially during the afternoon hours. Mrs. Dodd said that anyone interested in being a Ronald House volunteer is invited to call the Ronald House for further information.

And, according to the volunteers, the organization is really worth their time and efforts: ". . . it's a lot of work . . . a lot of fun . . . and it's such a wonderful feeling to know that your help has really made a difference in the lives of these families!"

SPS Offers Scholarships
