**GRUVER MARCHING BAND District Co-Champs**

Gruver High School's Greyhound Marching Band saved their very best effort of the year for the U.L.L. State Marching Contest in Austin. Performing the show that has thrilled football fans throughout this season, the Greyhound Band demonstrated their own energetic blend of aggressive playing, precision marching, and creative showmanship.

In preliminary competition, Gruver High School was one of six bands to receive a second division rating from the five member judging panel. Judging was done on a point scale of 1-100, with a score of 90-100 being a first division, 80-90 a second division, 70-80 a third division, etc. Judges scores were averaged, with the high and low scores dropped, and the five bands scoring highest advanced to the final competition at the University of Texas, Memorial Stadium. Bands receiving a first division rating in the preliminary competition were Rankin High School, Nueces Canyon High School, and Iraan High School. Other bands receiving a second division rating in the preliminary competition were Falls City High School, Asherton High School, Booker High School, Crawford High School, and Ir a County High School.

Judges for the preliminary competition were Keith Bearden-Texas Tech University, James Copenhaver - University of South Carolina, James Keene - University of Illinois, Jerrold Longwell - Hurst - Eules - Bedford ISD, Larry Volman - Morrow High School, Atlanta Georgia.

The results of the final competition were as follows: 1st - Asherton High School; 2nd - Rankin High School; 3rd - Iraan High School; 4th - Falls City High School; 5th - Nueces Canyon High School.

In spite of the disappointment of not making the finals, Greyhound Band members were able to enjoy the performances of the bands chosen over them, and gained extra incentive to return next year with even higher standards and greater desire to be the State Champions.

**Outstanding Conservation Farmer DWIGHT GILLISPIE**

Dwight Gillispie lives near the Morse community. He owns 320 acres of land a few miles northeast of Morse. Dwight also operates several hundred additional acres of land in Hutchinson and Hansford County with his father, Jack Gillispie of Gruver.

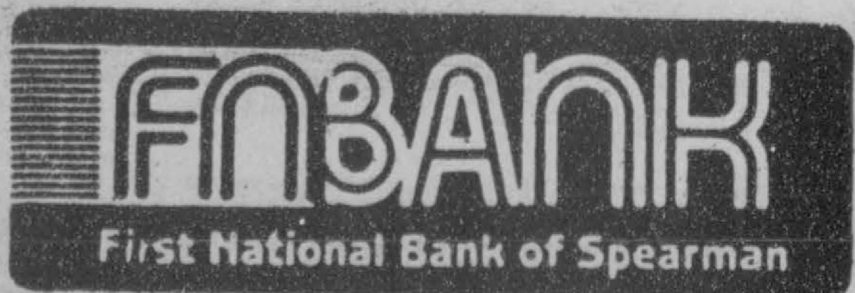
Several years ago technical assistance was requested through the Conservation Soil and Water Conservation District from the Soil Conservation Service personnel at Spearman to correct some severe soil erosion problems. In 1982 Dwight entered into a Great Plains Conservation Program contract, which provides cost-share assistance for installation of conservation practices.

Under the program, assistance has been provided for shaping and seeding of 20 acres of grassed waterways to protect the farm from erosive rainfall runoff from adjoining farmland. These waterways also serve as a stable outlet for the 3,963 feet of diversion terraces and 1,344 feet of parallel terrace which protect the sloping cropland on this farm from erosion by rainfall as well as irrigation tailwater.

Dwight's cropping system usually consists of irrigated grain sorghum and wheat with a portion of the farm planted to dryland wheat. He does an excellent job of managing crop residues to prevent wind and water erosion as well as conserve soil moisture.

## A new law

Under a new law signed by  
President Reagan, appointment to  
Federal jobs will be denied to men  
who have not registered with  
Selective Service. The new law,  
effective immediately, applies to  
students seeking temporary summer  
employment, as well as men search-  
ing for permanent employment with a  
Federal agency or department.

Commenting on this new require-  
ment, Selective Service Director,  
Thomas K. Turnage stated, "I am  
pleased and very reassured by the  
continuing Congressional support of  
the registration requirement. Not only  
does this law encourage compliance  
with the law among eligible young  
men, it also increases public  
awareness of the requirement. As  
always, our primary intent is to  
register men not prosecute them."

Offered by Senator Strom Thur-  
mond (R-SC), and known as the  
Thurmond Amendment to the De-  
fense Authorization Bill, the amend-  
ment was co-sponsored by Senators  
mattlingly, Nickles, Denton, East,  
Gramm, Helms, Humphrey, Warner,  
Johnson, Wilson, Hollings, Symms  
and Murkowski. Rep. Sonny Mont-  
gomery (D-MS) had introduced  
similar language in the House of  
Representatives.

Men of registration age must be  
registered to receive Federal student  
aid and job training benefits.  
Additionally, registration is a require-  
ment in some states for various  
employment opportunities, such as  
law enforcement agencies and per-  
mission to practice law.

Men born in 1960 and later years  
are required to register with Selective  
Service within 30 days of their 18th  
birthday. Registration takes only five  
minutes at any post office. Failure to  
register is a felony, punishable by a  
fine of up to \$250,000 and/or up to 5  
years imprisonment.

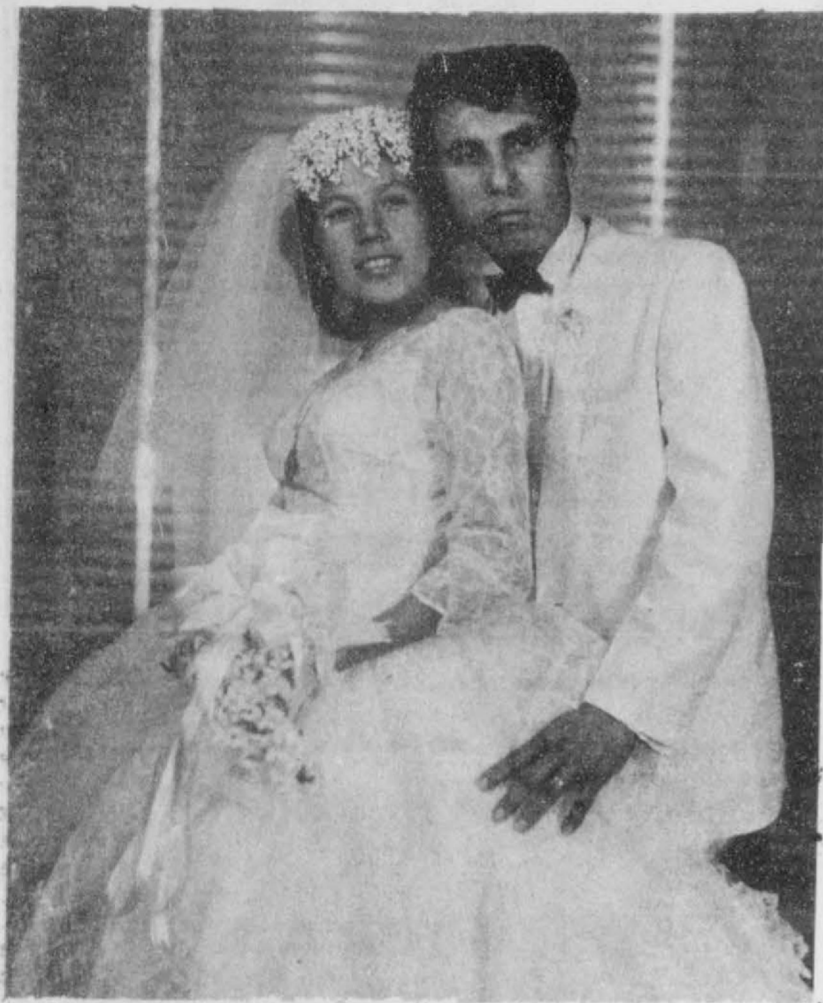

### The real Kilroy identified

"Kilroy was here," World War II's most enduring graffiti, was first penned by a shipyard worker who was just trying to prove he was doing his job, says Margaret Kilroy, 81, widow of James J. Kilroy, who died in 1962.

The name Kilroy tugged at the imaginations of millions, both in and out of uniform, binding members of the armed forces with those at home. Next to "I love you," the second most important words of the war may have been "Kilroy was here."

Mrs. Kilroy who lives in Halifax, Mass., outside of Boston, said her husband was hired by the Quincy shipyard two days before the bombing of Pearl Harbor on December 7, 1941.

From that time on, he printed "Kilroy was here" to attest to his presence and attention to duty.

Not until 1946 did Kilroy make an effort to identify himself as "the real Kilroy," his widow said.

He won a nationwide contest sponsored by the American Transit Authority that sought to explain the legend's origin.

## Assistance for needy families

The Texas Department of Human Services, the state agency which provides assistance to needy families and children and aged and disabled persons, will conduct a hearing in Lubbock to obtain public comment regarding program directions, budget

priorities, and expenditure of federal block grant funds including Title XX and Low-income Home Energy Assistance.

The hearing is scheduled for 9 A.M. to 12 Noon, December 3, 1985. It will be held at The Garden and Arts Center, 4215 University. Facilities are accessible to disabled persons and interpreters will be available for deaf or Spanish-speaking persons.

Conducting the hearing will be members of the department's advisory

committees and staff of the agency. Comments from individuals, representatives of interest groups, and recipients or providers of agency services will be recorded for consideration by department executives in establishing a program and funding plan for 1987 through 1989.

Almost one out of every nine Texans use one or more department services. During Fiscal year 1985, the agency provided services for 1.7 million people or about 10.6% of the population. Services include financial assistance, health care, day care, family planning, employment service, nursing home care, community care, licensing of child-care facilities, and protective services.

## "Project Self-Sufficiency"

The Secretary of Housing and Urban Development, Samuel R. Pierce, Jr., recently announced a pilot demonstration award to Panhandle Community Services for a program called "Project Self-Sufficiency".

The Project Self-Sufficiency demonstration is a coordinated approach to breaking the poverty/dependency cycle among low income single parents. The program focuses on the special needs of low income families by involving the cooperative efforts of local governments and local public and private resources.

Johnny Raymond, Executive Director of Panhandle Community Services, indicated that Project Self-Sufficiency combines housing assistance, which HUD allocates to the

communities, with child care, personal and career counseling, transportation, basic education, job training and placement provided by local public/private partnerships. Mr. Raymond also indicated, "that the application for the project had been co-sponsored by the County Judges serving in the Texas Panhandle. Their collective support and commitment to the program's goals had a great deal to do with the selection of Panhandle Community Services for the pilot project".

The \$8 million dollar budget authority from HUD to the housing department of Panhandle Community Services, is to provide decent and affordable housing that will offer stable living conditions for the

selected participants. HUD's stated purpose is an attempt for the local agency to leverage these monies for the overall program goals that involve far more than just housing.

There were more than 2,000 applications submitted for the grant; from that number 108 sites were selected for participation from across the nation. The largest single award in the nation was made to Panhandle Community Services. The agency serves the 26-counties of the Panhandle and will make a concerted effort over the next few months to solicit applications from motivated, single parents with dependent children who are interested in achieving Self-Sufficiency.

QUESTION: You have issued me a social security number under two different names. One of them shows my middle name and the other shows just my middle initial. Which name do I use when I apply for benefits?

ANSWER: Your situation is not unusual. All people who have changed their names, for example,

have had two or more cards issued to them. As in your case, there is no problem as long as the different cards show the same number. Therefore, you may use either version of your name when you apply for benefits.

QUESTION: If I decide to take my social security retirement before I reach 65, how much money will I lose?

ANSWER: Your retirement benefit will be reduced 5/9 of one percent (or 1/180) for each month before you receive benefits before age 65. Thus, for example, if you begin receiving benefits 18 months be-

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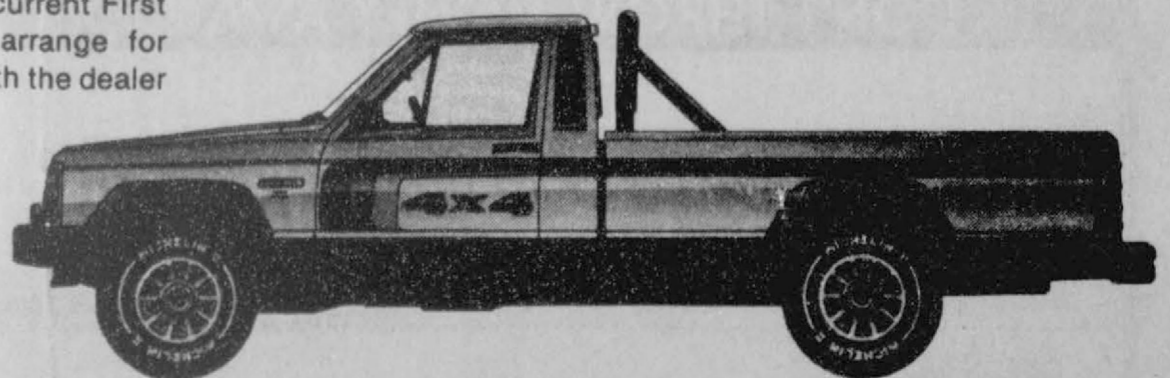
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## Robert W. Bryant is New President

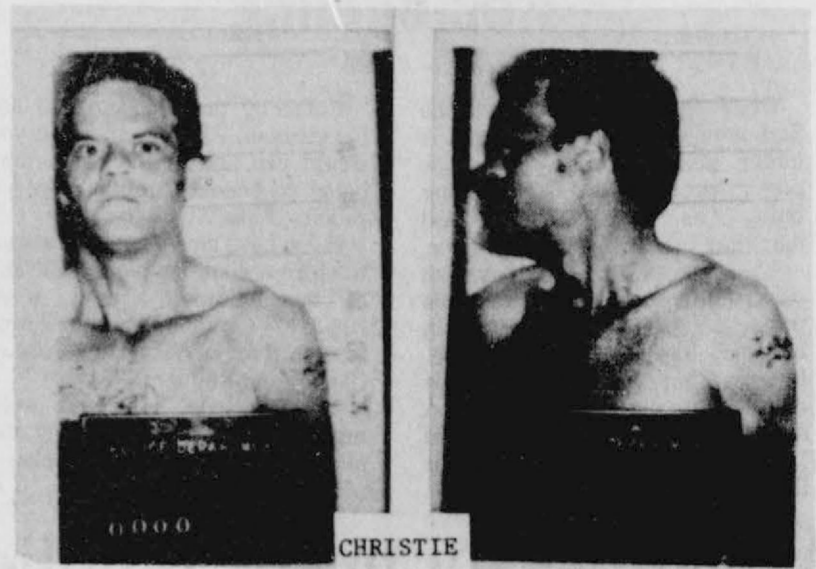
Alish LaRochelle, 4th grade, Mrs. Burgess

## MOST WANTED



CHRISTIE

SULPHUR SPRINGS, Texas -- John DeWayne Christie has a tattoo of a three-leaf clover on his left arm.

Despite the presence of the tattoo, the 32-year-old Christie is quickly running out of luck.

He is wanted on warrants in Hopkins County charging him with Aggravated Sexual Assault, Assault and Burglary of a Residence.

The charges stem from an incident on September 1, 1985, when an intruder raped a 14-year-old girl, then tried to rape the girl's mother.

However, the offender, who was armed with a butcher knife, ran into more than he bargained when he tried to attack the mother. She bit the intruder on the neck and forced him to flee the house.

This is not the first time that Christie has been in trouble with the law in connection with sexual assult charges, investigators say. He has two prior convictions for sexually-related offenses and served time in the Texas Department of Corrections for Indecency with a Child.

Christie is a white male, 6-0, 176 pounds, with brown hair and brown eyes. Detectives say he recently cut his hair short.

In addition to the three-leaf clover tattoo, Christie also has several other tattoos on his body, including one of a butterfly on his chest.

Although Christi was living in Greenville at the time of the offense, detectives believe he has fled the state.

This week Christie has been added to the Texas Most Wanted list.

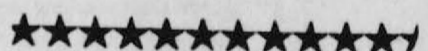

In the past seven years, more than 20,000 major crimes have been solved and \$150 million worth of stolen property and narcotics have been recovered through tips to Texas Crime Stoppers programs. The programs have paid out \$2.2 million worth of rewards during this time.

## Belnorth begins production

BelNorth Petroleum Corporation, a subsidiary of HNG/InterNorth, announced it has begun production from its two new East Cameron Block 65 platforms located about 35 miles southeast of Cameron, Louisiana.

Presently, three wells are producing approximately 20 million cubic feet of natural gas and 250 barrels of foil a day. Two other wells are scheduled to come on line in February 1986 following installation of a third platform. This will boost production to nearly 50 million cubic feet of natural gas per day.

Florida Gas Transmission Company, a subsidiary of HNG/InterNorth, has contracted to purchase the gas.

BelNorth is the operator and holds 16.7 percent interest in the block. Other participants in the block include: Elf Aquitaine, Inc., Pan Canadian Petroleum Company, Ranger Oil Company, Felmon Oil Corporation, and Case-Ponerooy Oil Corporation.

On October 8 HNG/InterNorth announced that it is consolidating its two exploration and production subsidiaries: BelNorth Petroleum Corporation and HNG Oil Company.

Average daily gas and oil sales for the combined companies during the first half of 1985 were 301 million cubic feet per day and 11,466 barrels perday. The net present value of future reserves for the combined companies at the end of 1984 exceeded \$1.7 billion. In terms of net reserves, combined HNG/InterNorth operations will be the fourth largest independent oil and gas operation in this country.

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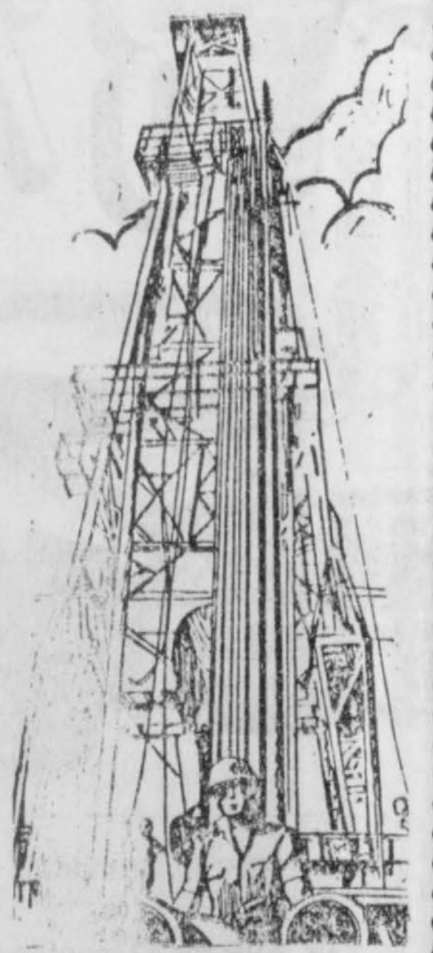
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
