

Scholarship to Kelon Morley

Kelon Morley of GRUVER has been named a 1985-86 recipient of the American Petroleum Institute Scholar ship at South Plains College.

Morley was recently recognized with 26 other API Scholarship recipi ents during a pecial luncheon. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Don Morley of Gruver and is chemical engineering major at SPC.

Members of the South Plains Chapter of the American Petroleum Institute were on hand to help recognize students and also present Dr. Marvin Baker, SPC president, with a scholarship donation of \$18,000 to help fund additional scholarships for the 1986-87 school year. The presentation was made by Charles Miller of Levelland, co-chairman of the chapter's scholarship committee.

The South Plains Chapter of the API has been providing scholarship and educational funds for South Plains College since 1970. Their contributions now total well over \$120,000 during the past 15 years.

"We are very proud of these young people and the recognition they have received as recipients of the API Scholarship," said Dr. Baker. "We are also greatly appreciative of the South Plains API members who work so hard to make these scholarships available for our young people."

A new law

Under a new law signed by President Reagan, appointment to Federal jobs will be denied to men who have not registered with Selective Service. The new law, effective immediately, applies to students seeking temporary summer employment, as well as men searching for permanent employment with a Federal agency or department.

Commenting on this new requirement, Selective Service Director, Thomas K. Turnage stated, "I am pleased and very reassured by the continuing Congressional support of the registration requirement. Not only does this law encourage compliance with the law among eligible young men, it also increases public awareness of the requirement. As always, our primary intent is to register men not prosecute them."

Offered by Senator Strom Thurmond (R-SC), and known as the Thurmond Amendment to the Defense Authorization Bill, the amendment was co-sponsored by Senators mattingly, Nickles, Denton, East, Gramm, Helms, Humphrey, Warner, Johnson, Wilson, Hollings, Symms and Murkowski. Rep. Sonny Montgomery (D-MS) had introduced similar language in the House of Representatives.

Men of registration age must be registered to receive Federal student aid and job training benefits. Additionally, registration is a requirement in some states for various employment opportunities, such as law enforcement agencies and permission to practice law.

Men born in 1960 and later years are required to register with Selective Service within 30 days of their 18th birthday. Registration takes only five minutes at any post office. Failure to register is a felony, punishable by a fine of up to \$250,000 and/or up to 5 years imprisonment.



SULPHUR SPRINGS, Texas --John DeWayne Christie has a tattoo of a three-leaf clover on his left arm.

Despite the presence of the tattoo, the 32-year-old Christie is quickly running out of luck.

He is wanted on warrants in Hopkins County charging him with Aggravated Sexual Assualt, Assault and Burglary of a Residence.

The charges stem from an incident on September 1, 1985, when an intruder raped a 14-year-old girl, then tried to rape the girl's mother.

However, the offender, who was armed with a butcher knife, ran into more than he bargained when he tried to attack the mother. She bit the intruder on the neck and forced him to flee the house.

This is not the first time that Christie has been in trouble with the law in connection with sexual assulat charges, investigators say. He has two prior convictions for sexually-related offenses and served time in the Texas Department of Corrections for Indecency with a Child.

Christie is a white male, 6-0, 176 pounds, with brown hair and brown eves. Detectives say he recently cut

his hair short. In addition to the three-leaf clover tattoo, Christie also has several other tattoos on his body, including one of a butterfly on his

When interviewed by investigators, Campuzano said he had left Munzon outside Poor Richard's and had driven home.

been drinking. Munzon left in one vehicle, with Campuzano following behind in a pickup truck. As they reached the dirt road where Munzon's body was found, Campuzano allegedly flashed the truck's lights on and off.

When Munzon got out of the vehicle he had been in, and eyewitness said two shots were heard and the victim fell to the ground.

On November 22, 1983, a warrant was issued for Campuzano's arrest. But since that date, he has not been found.

Campuzano, who also spells his last name Campusano, is 5-3, 130 pounds, with brown graying hair and brown eyes. He usually wears
