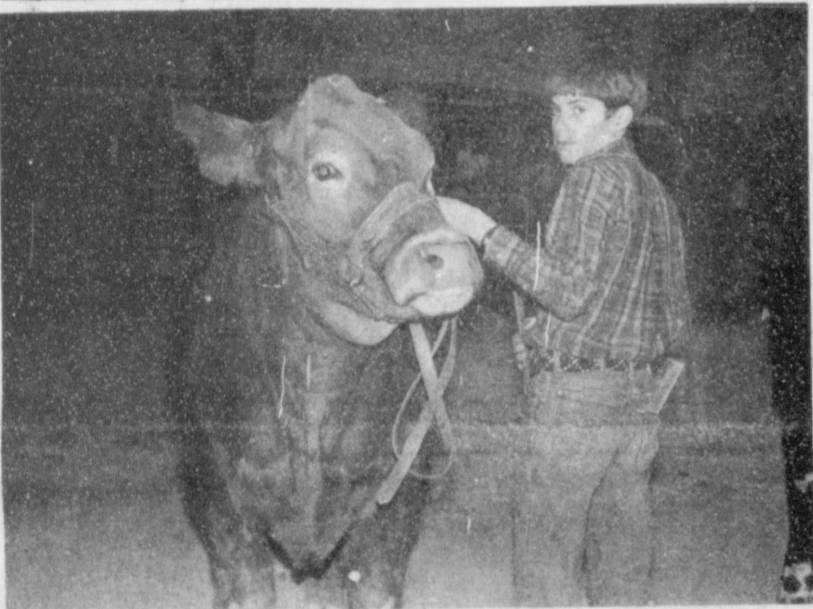

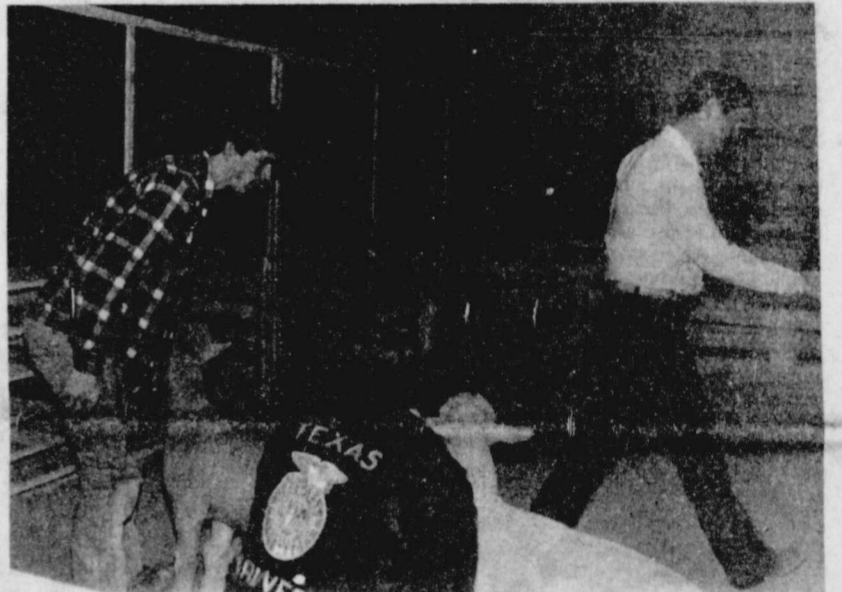

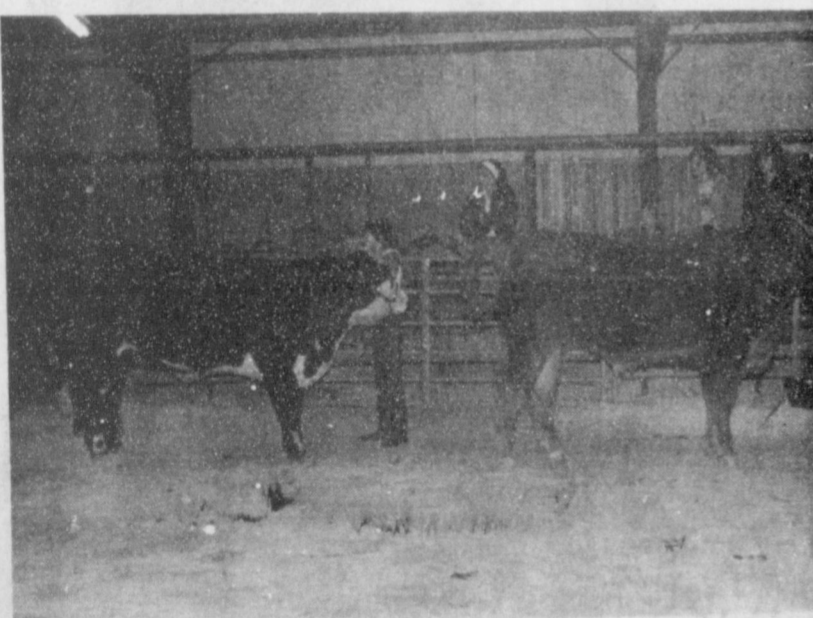
Klint Venneman, who placed 1st in Showmanship, is pictured with his steer.



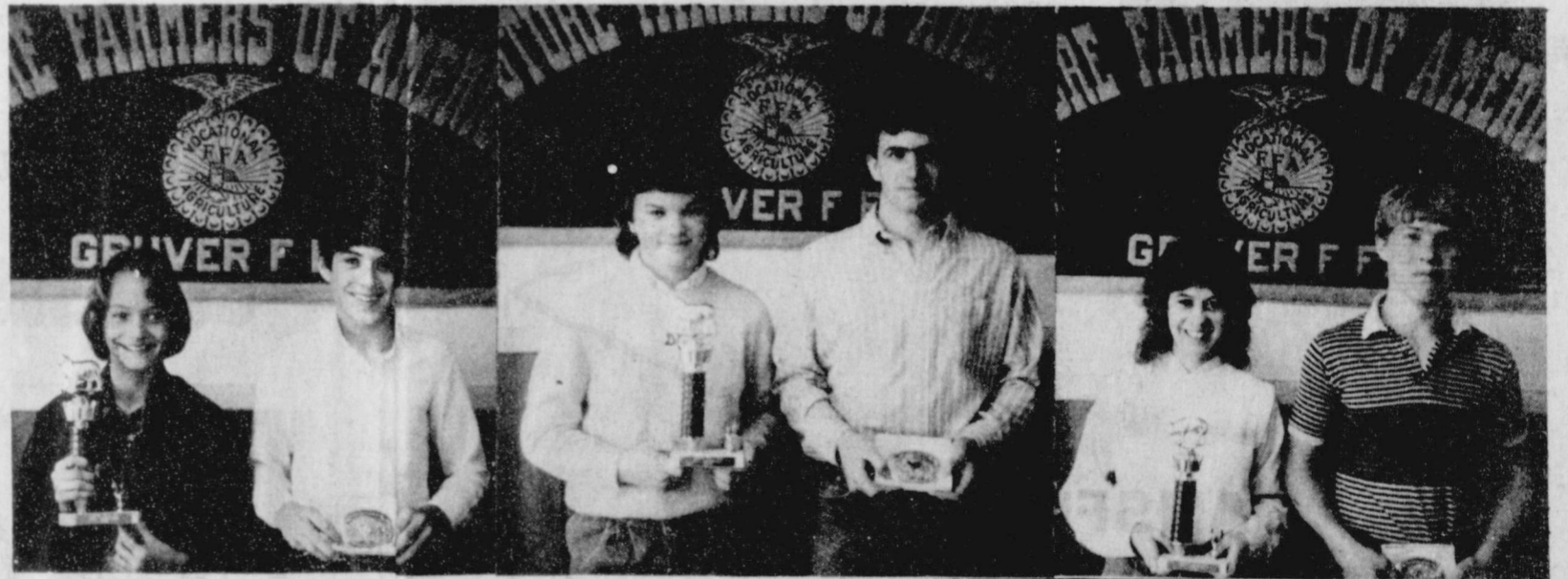
Davonna Cator, center, placed 2nd in Showmanship with her sheep.

## Older Worker Week in Texas FFA & 4-H members at Stock Show

AUSTIN- To recognize the importance of meaningful employment for senior Texans, Governor Mark White designated March 11 through March 16 as "Older Worker Week in Texas".

The programs place workers with senior centers, schools, libraries, and municipalities to furnish services that might not otherwise be available.

"We are extremely proud of Governor White's recognition of the state's Older Workers," said Mike Moeller, president of Texas Farmers Union, which sponsors the two largest Older Worker programs in Texas - Green Thumb and the Senior Texans Employment Program.

"We at Farmers Union take very special pride in our affiliation with STEP and Green Thumb. These programs provide older workers throughout Texas with the opportunity to continue to give of their experience and capabilities.

"Both programs concentrate their resources in rural Texas where employment opportunities and services are so greatly needed," continued Moeller.

Green Thumb, operating in Texas since 1970, is funded through the Department of Labor and employs over 1,000 older workers in 111 rural counties.

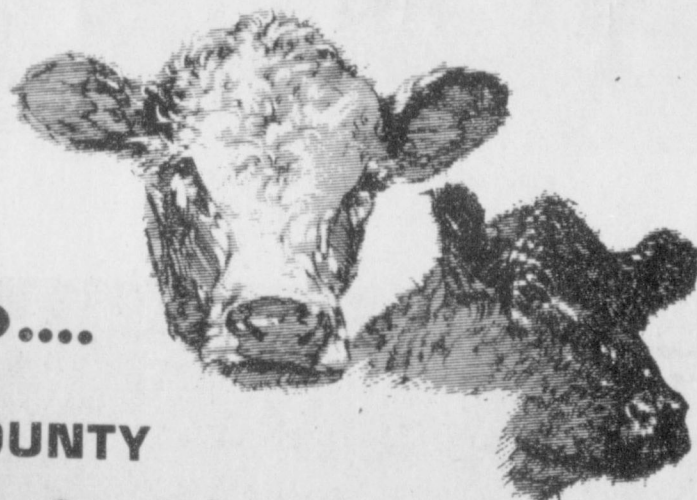

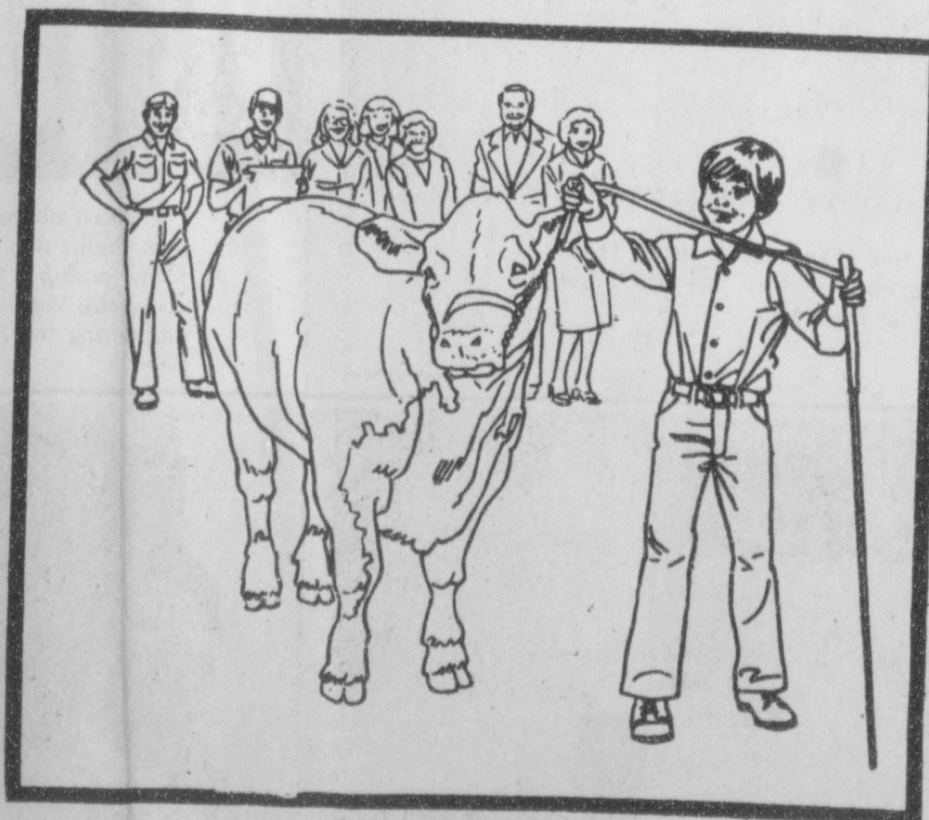

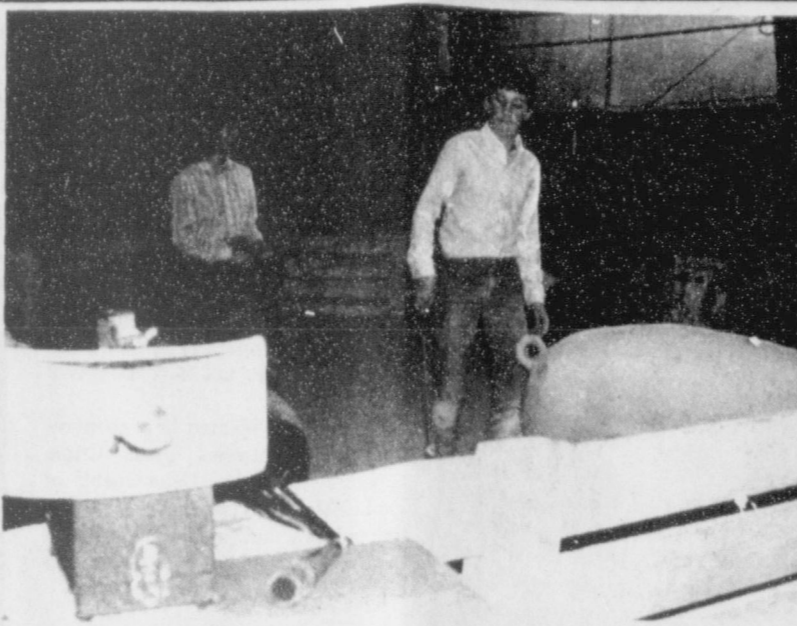

## Texas Most Wanted



**DALLAS, Texas** -- Cynthia Hynd McCray had dedicated her life to helping people...until the night of January 9, 1981.

Once described as a "good, very professional nurse" by police investigators, Ms. McCray is now a fugitive. She had eluded police since the January, 1981, murder of Buford Johnson, 42, of Dallas.

Police reports indicate that Johnson, a black male, died almost instantly from a gunshot wound in the face fired from pointblank range.

Detectives say Ms. McCray, who was a nurse at Children's Medical Center in Dallas at the time of the shooting, had been dating Johnson. On the evening of January 9, 1981, he had been at the Knight's Inn Tavern in the 500 block of Corinth Street in Dallas.

Apparently Johnson offered a woman at the bar a ride home. As the pair got into Johnson's vehicle, another car drove up.

A witness told investigators that Ms. McCray got out of the other vehicle and approached Johnson.

"There you are," she is reported to have said. "What are you doing?" When Johnson replied that he was going to take the other woman home, a shot was fired and Johnson slumped down in the front seat of the car.

Investigators were told that Ms. McCray then fled the scene in the other automobile. Law enforcement officials have been trying to catch up with her ever since.

This week Cynthia Hynd McCray has made the Texas Most Wanted list. A \$1,000 reward is being offered for information leading to her capture.

Ms. McCray is described as a white female, 38 years old, 5'5", 115 pounds, with brown hair and green eyes.

Investigators believe she still might be working as a nurse in the State of Texas, possibly under a slight variation of her real name. In the past, she has used several aliases, including Cynthia Louise Reales, Cynthia Louise Stone and Cynthia Louise Hynd.

Anyone with information about Ms. McCray's whereabouts is asked to call Texas Crime Stoppers Advisory Council toll-free at 1-800-252-8477 or their local Crime Stoppers program. In all cases, callers do not have to reveal their identities.

Texas Most Wanted is a cooperative effort between Texas Crime Stoppers and the Department of Public Safety and is designed to enlist the public's aid in the capture of fugitives wanted for serious crimes committed in the state.

# Ideal Store is sold

In confirmation of the persisting rumors in Spearman, the Spearman Ideal Food Store has been sold. The Spearman supermarket is one of 44 Ideal and Humpty stores in Texas, Oklahoma, and Kansas to be sold by Allied Supermarkets Inc., the Detroit-based chain.

Allied's 20 Ideal supermarkets in the three states are being acquired by Nash-Finch Co., a Minneapolis-based wholesaler, or by independent retailers affiliated with Nash-Finch. It is thought attempts are being made to operate the Spearman store on an independent basis, although it is unknown whether local independent concerns can come up with the necessary revenue.

In any case, it is thought the new operation will not allow for union-scale wages nor perhaps even employment which leaves local store employees in a cloud of uncertainty.

Nash-Finch Co. has a regional operation in Liberal.

Allied's 24 Humpty supermarkets in Oklahoma are being acquired by independent retailers affiliated with Fleming Companies Inc., an Oklahoma-based wholesaler. Allied's 300,000 sq. ft. office, warehouse and distribution complex in Oklahoma City is being placed on the market for sale or lease, with Fleming temporarily renting the complex pending its disposition.

By mid-month, Allied intends to suspend business operations in the 44 stores and expects all of the dispositions by the end of the month.

The announcement was made by David K. Page, chairman and chief

executive officer of Allied, and in D. Makanoff, president and chief operating officer.

In a statement issued from Allied corporate headquarters in Detroit, P. 3e and Makanoff said: "The transactions and related provisions should result in a book loss of more than \$2 million. Net cash proceeds of over \$22 million will be generated and Allied's cash reserves will increase to over 7 million. If current union negotiations in Michigan produce acceptable labor costs and working conditions, we intend to spend some of this cash to improve and expand our Great Scott! Supermarket chain and our Abner A. Wolf wholesale business in Michigan. Other investment opportunities will be explored as well.

"We regret having to withdraw from the Oklahoma, Kansas and Texas market where our company has been a factor for so many years. However, recent losses in competitive conditions in the areas made it prudent to redeploy those assets into other areas of our business and into potential business opportunities. Most of the stores being sold will continue to serve their communities through independent store operators. We are hopeful that a number of our valued employees will secure positions with the buyers of the stores."

Upon completion of these transactions, Allied will operate 9 Great Scott! Supermarkets in Michigan, one K-Mart Food store in South Dakota, six Family Drug stores in Michigan, the Abner A. Wolf Company and eight Abner A. Wolf Cash & Carry wholesale outlets.

Panhandle Transit, a rural transportation program providing door-to-door transportation to the 26 counties of the Texas Panhandle is now in operation, according to Ms. Nancy Harvey, Special Projects Director for the Texas Panhandle Community Action Corporation. It is being contracted through the State Department of Highways and Public Transportation with funding through the Urban Mass Transit Administration, and will operate as a non-profit transit system through T.P.C.A.C.

Routine service will be open to the general public and especially suitable for senior citizens and handicapped persons, and will have flexible schedules in order to meet passenger needs.

Regular service will include trips for medical, shopping or essential business purposes, and to visit senior citizens centers and nutrition sites.

A Panhandle Transit vehicle will pick up and return passengers to their

homes. Various purchase-of-service contracts will make possible a cost free service to persons who are eligible for other programs such as: A.F.D.C., Food Stamps, S.S.I., Medicare, J.T.P.A., Head Start, housing and butter and cheese.

All other passengers will be charged 50 cents for a one-way, in-town service; and 25 cents per mile, one way, outside of the city limits.

Drivers have been professionally trained in defensive driving, passenger assistance techniques, first-aid, and C.P.R. Drivers will assist passengers in and out of the vehicle, and with packages and groceries.

Scheduling for Hansford and Moore counties must be made 24 hours in advance through Moore County Community Action.

She was a member of the First Christian Church and the Senior Citizens.

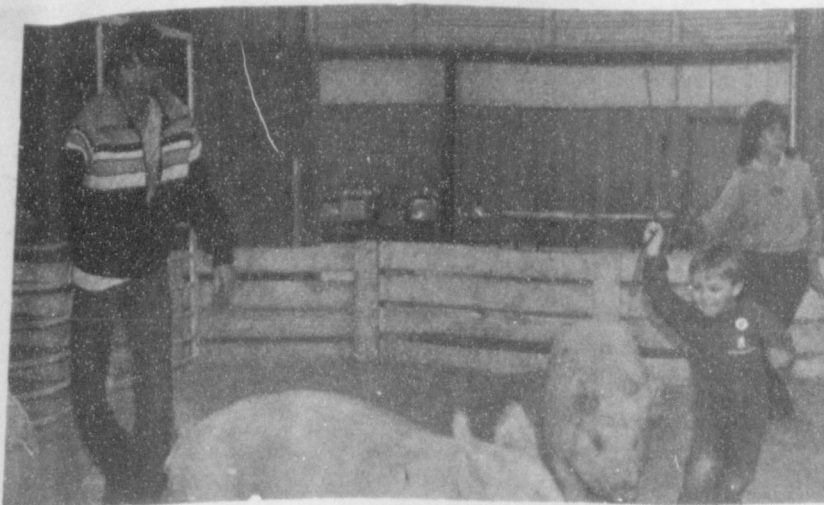

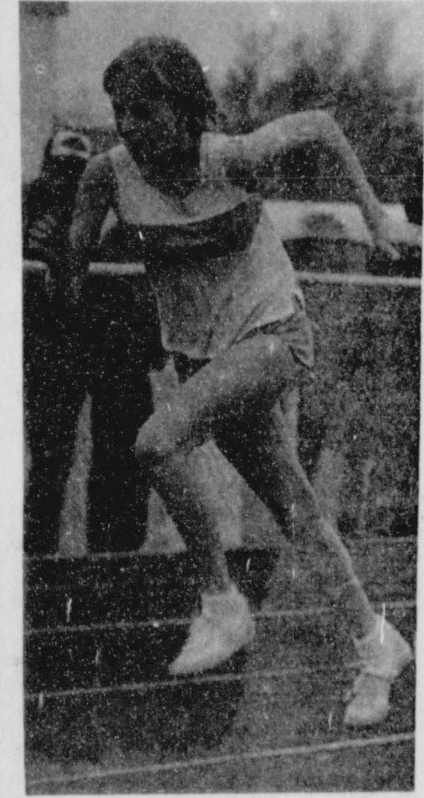

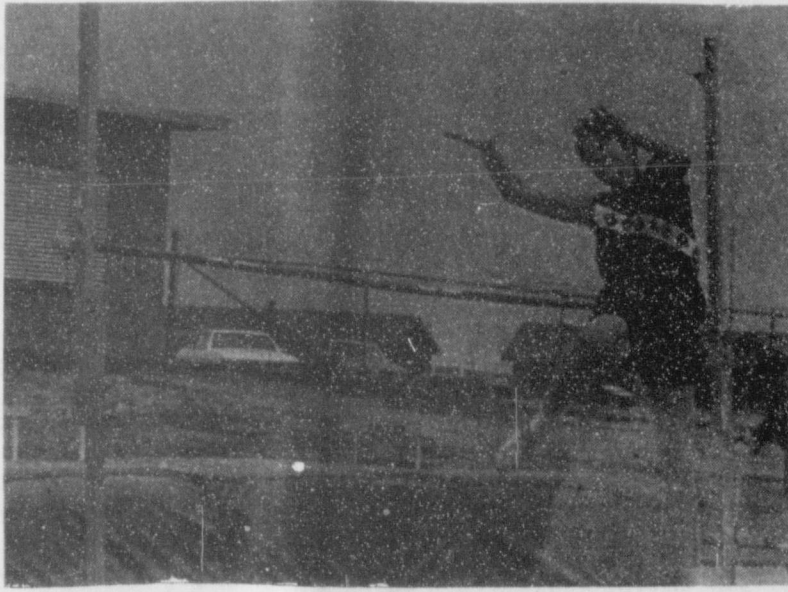

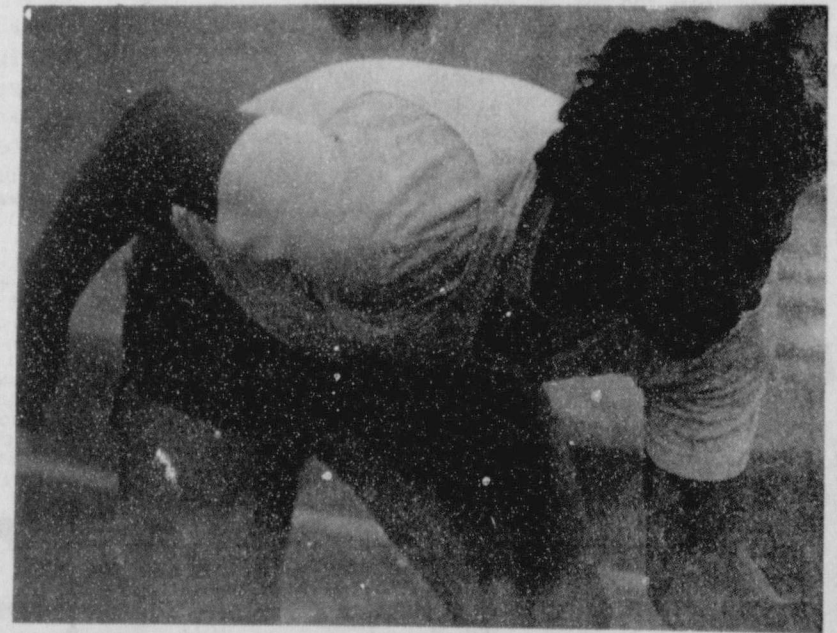

They appointed John Trindle, Alton Ellsworth and Leslie Barkley to a two year term on Hansford Hospital Board.

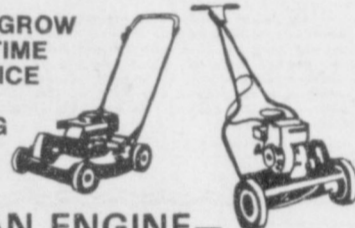
They agreed to furnish money to the City of Gruver for a trash pit for
