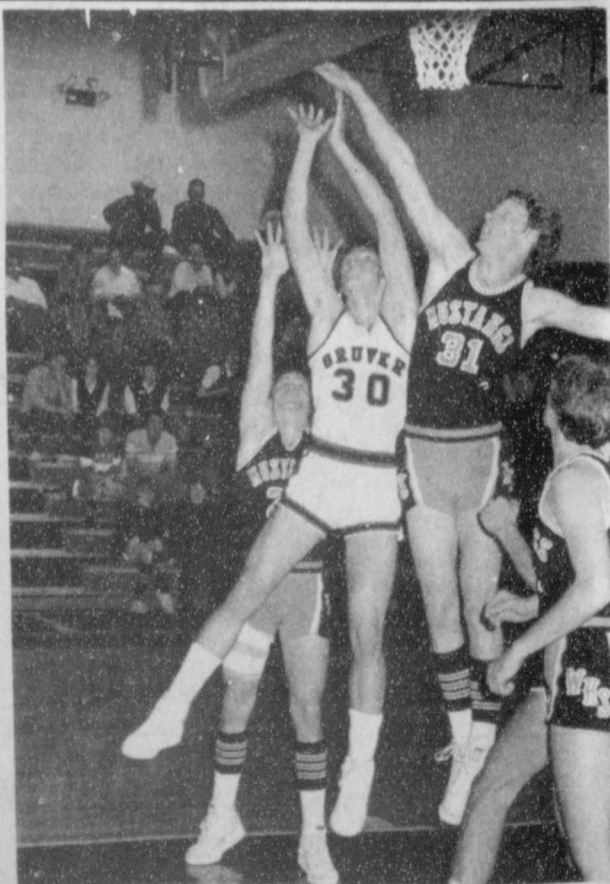

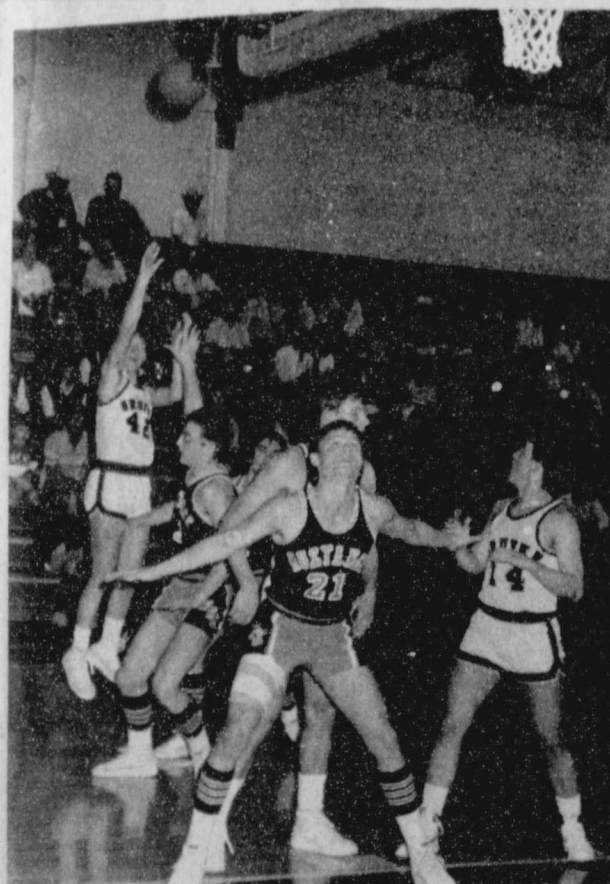

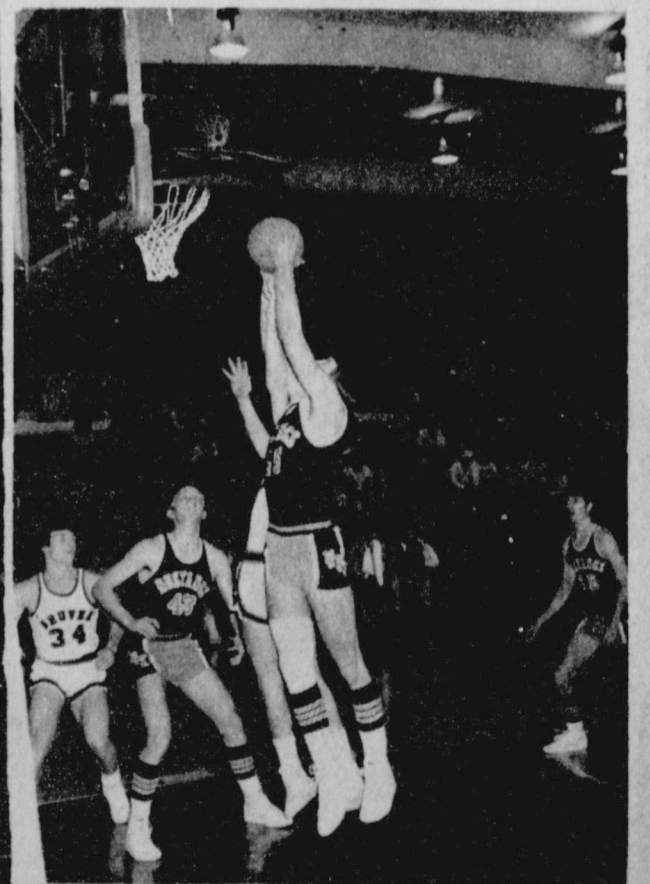

Five McGruff crime-stopper puppets and the crime prevention tapes (with McGruff's voice) were

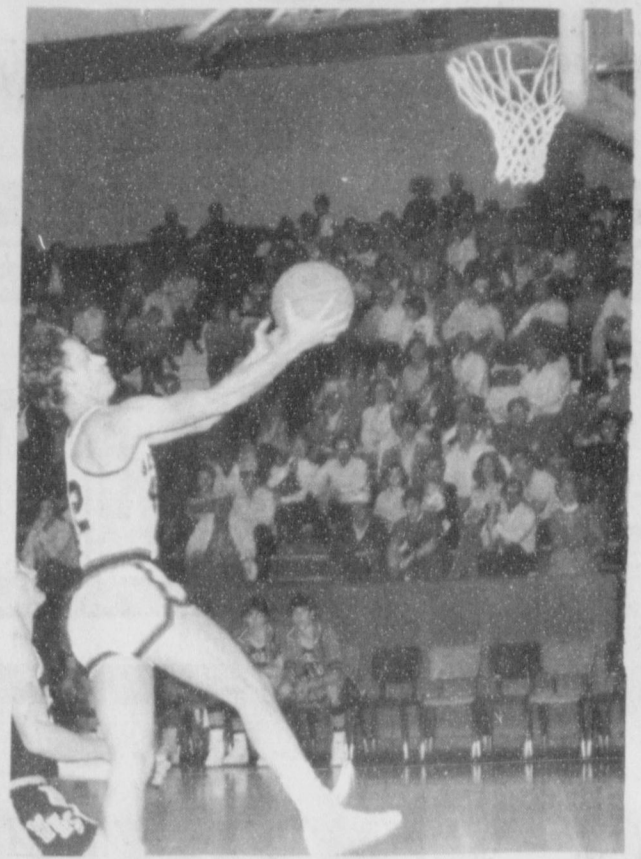
purchased.

The crime dog deals with twelve areas of crime for each grade, complete with many catchy tunes and lyrics to reinforce the dog's wise monologue. After completion of the twelve crime areas, the program supplements with twelve review sessions.

Some of the topics McGruff deals with in the K-4th grades are: Traffic Safety, Fire Safety, Respect for Authority, If You Get Lost, Emergencies, Rollerskate Safety, Bicycle Safety, Child Abuse, Vandalism, Gangs, Self-Discipline, Robbery/Burglary, Arson and Hitchhiking.

Gruver Elementary is the first school in the Panhandle to introduce the McGruff Crime Prevention Program, other than Western Plateau Elem. in Amarillo, which was chosen by Texas panhandle Lion's Clubs as a pilot school for the program. Gruver PTA president, Linda Venneman and special projects chairman, Jan Stedje attended the introductory meeting to the Texas panhandle, Nov. 8, given by McGruff's creator, Puppet Productions, Inc. from San Diego, Calif.

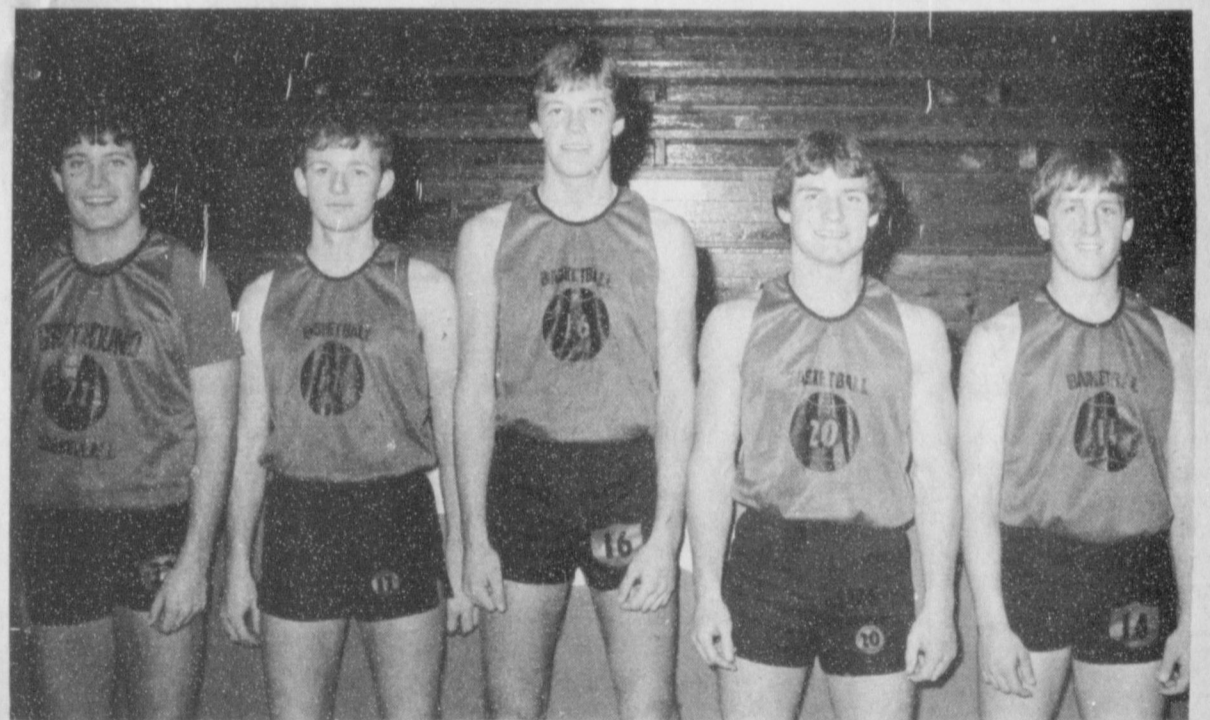

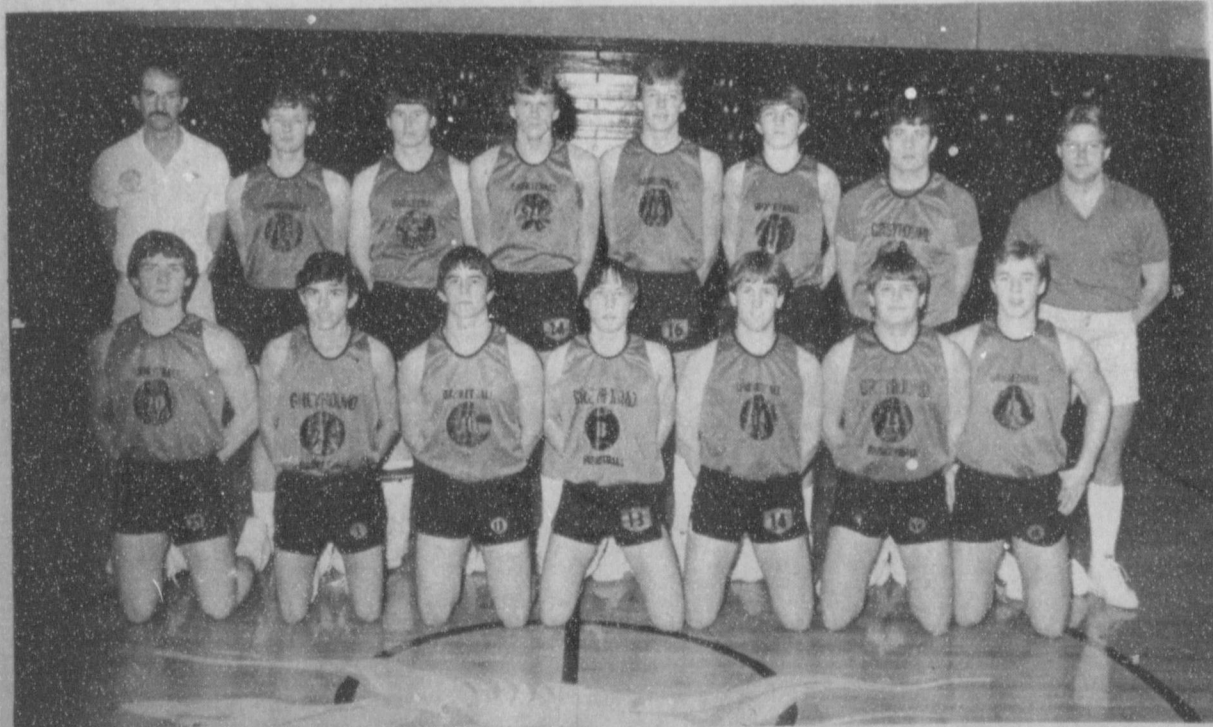

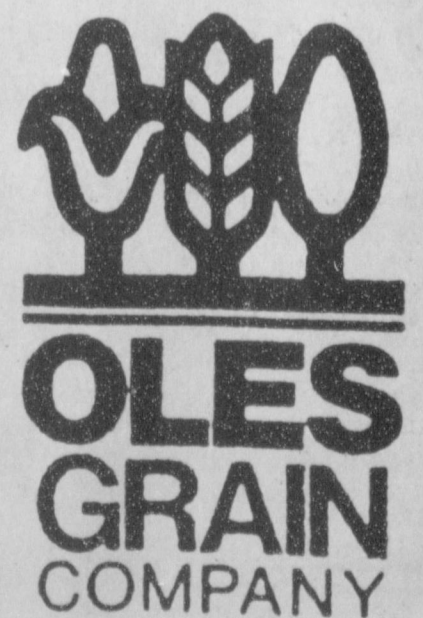

COLLEGE STATION -- County judges and commissioners from across Texas who will be meeting here for their annual conference, Feb. 26-28, will be putting a lot of emphasis on continuing education.

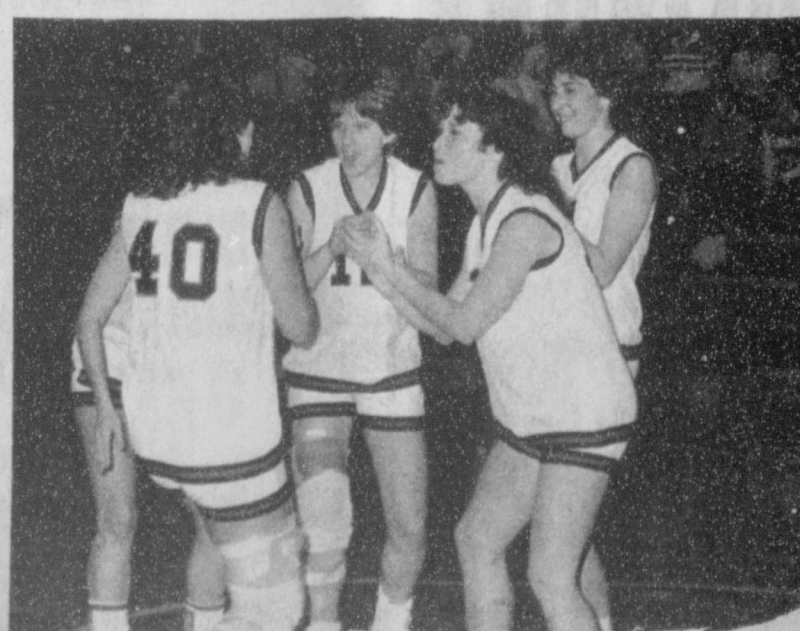
"Continuing Education -- The Key to the Courthouse" will be the theme of the 27th annual County Judges and Commissioners Conference, which will be held at the Ramada Inn.

Gov. Mark White has been invited to address the conference at 11:30 a.m. Thursday, Feb. 28. State Rep. Gary Thompson of the House Committee on County Affairs and will have some members of his committee on hand for an open forum and question-and-answer session.

The County Affairs Committee is studying a number of critical issues during the current legislative session, including optional ordinance-making authority, indigent health care and alternative sources of income.

## E.M.T. Course

An Emergency Medical Technician Course will be offered in Spearman beginning Feb. 28, 1985.

The purpose of the course is to teach Basic Life Saving Techniques to those who wish to serve their community with their local ambulance service, or for those who would just like to know what to do in an emergency situation before the ambulance does arrive.

Upon successful completion of the course, participants will receive accreditation from Frank Phillips College, as well as being registered with the Texas Department of Health as an Emergency Medical Technician.

Cost will be \$30 registration fee plus approximately \$18 for text. All interested persons must pre-register by no later than Feb. 19, 1985. Class space is limited, so please register as soon as possible.

**CABINET SWEEP** — Reorganize the bathroom medicine cabinet to make it more efficient. Place a cutting board across the washbowl beneath and place all contents on it. As you replace cabinet contents, discard medications past their prime or no longer used. List numbers of prescriptions that need refilling and tend to these replacements quickly. Glue small magnets to inside cupboard doors to hold such items as nail file, scissors, thermometer cases. Finally, glue double faced tape to shelf edges so that bottles will not slide off.

# E.M.T. course will be taught here

Michele Mackie Davis will be co-instructing a "Special Skills-Emergency Medical Technician Course" beginning this month. The course will be taught in Spearman and Stinnett by Davis and Charlie Boyd, Stinnett Paramedic.

Michele is a Spearman High School graduate and resides in Spearman with her husband, Mike, and two children, Misha and Matthew.

Michele became an EMT in 1979. She completed her EMT instructor training in 1980 and began teaching courses for Frank Phillips College at this time. In 1981 Michele became a certified Paramedic and has practiced as such since that time.

Lynn Archer, Spearman resident and Director of Continuing Education at Frank Phillips College said, "We in Spearman are very fortunate to have such a rare bird as Michele Davis. Michele is regarded as one of the most skilled instructors in our region which includes the entire Texas and Oklahoma panhandles."

In the fall of 1984, Michele completed instructor training for EMT-Special Skills. This course was provided by Panhandle Emergency Medical Services, Incorporated of Amarillo for a select few instructors. Each person en-

rolled in the course had to be nominated and an in-depth screening process took place before any students were accepted into the course. Michele represented Spearman and Frank Phillips College at that course along with other instructors from Frank Phillips College, Amarillo College, and Clarendon Junior College.

Michele will continue to serve our area by instructing students for Frank Phillips College in CPR (Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation), ECA (Emergency Care Attendant), EMT (Emergency Medical Technician), EMT-Special Skills, and various other first aide courses.

Michele was made a member of the Frank Phillips College Continuing Education Advisory Board in 1984, on which she currently serves.

Mrs. Archer stated, "Michele is an extremely dedicated instructor. Her courses always reflect the highest quality in both academics and skills. ## "D" Stamps Available

An adequate supply of "D" stamps and other nondenominated items is available at the Gruver post office to help customers make a smooth transition after the February 17 postal rate change.

Postmaster Pinkerton says that the nondenominated "D" stamps in sheet, coil, and booklet formats represent the new 22-cent first-class rate. There are also nondenominated postal cards and plenty of two-cent stamps that, when added to 20-cent stamps, make up the new first-class letter rate.

"Nobody likes to see higher postal rates, but this increase is moderate and justified," Postmaster Pinkerton said. "Since the

last increase in November 1981, the cost of living in the United States, as measured by the Consumer Price Index, has gone up almost 13 percent. The 22-cent stamp is only a 10 percent rise."

"The nondenominated items are available because we estimate that stamp inventories in post offices at present will fall short of public demand and, we want to avoid customer inconvenience," she said.

Commemorative stamps, beginning with the Jerome Kern stamp, and other 22-cent stamps, are expected to replace the "D" stamps by the end of March, the Postmaster said.

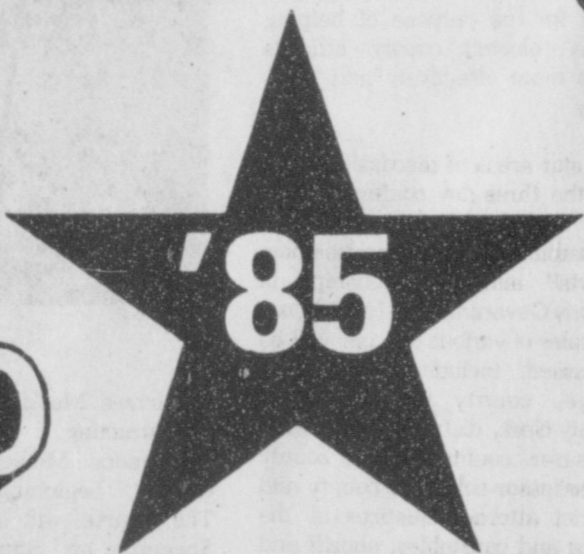

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# Dr. McClellan to terminate practice by May, 1985

Administration present were: Albert LaRoche, Hosp. Adm.; Ray Wasil, Manor Adm.; and Randy Abernathy, Y.D.P.

Medical Staff present: Dave Muthali, M.D.

The meeting was called to order by Jack Oakes.

The minutes of January 10, 1985 were read and approved in a motion made by Dwight Hutchinson and seconded by John Trindle.

The monthly financial statement was presented for the Board's consideration. Leslie Barkley made a motion to approve the bills for payment. John Trindle seconded and the motion was passed by all present.

**Jason Frye Suit:** Three letters from John L. Hutchinson as to activity on the Jason Frye lawsuit was submitted for the Board's information with no action being taken at this time.

A list of specific delinquent accounts for purpose of lawsuits for collection was submitted to the Board. Dwight Hutchinson made a motion that the list be accepted as submitted. Seconded by Jerry Hunt and passed by all Board members present.

The following action was presented to the Board from the Medical Staff minutes of their last meeting. It reads as follows:

The administrator presented to the Medical Staff the proposed amendment for the bylaws for the purpose of malpractice insurance requirements for staff members which reads as follows:

Each member of the medical staff shall be required to present a current certificate of insurance, from an insurance company licensed or approved to do business in the state of Texas, to verify malpractice liability coverage with a minimum of at least \$200,000/

600,000 limits of coverage per claim or medical incident.

All voting members of the medical staff voted in favor of the proposed amendment on February 12, 1985 and recommended that this proposal be forwarded to the Board of Directors for their approval.

John Trindle made a motion that the amendment to the Medical Staff Bylaws be accepted as submitted. Dwight Hutchinson seconded and passed by all present.

Next an Employee Annuities Program was submitted to the Board, via letter from Mr. Bob Barnett, Representing Great American Reserve Insurance Company. As no cost would be incurred by the District and the program would be on an individual need basis, Mr. Leslie Barkley made a motion to accept the program as submitted, seconded by John Trindle, passed by all present with the exception of Dwight Hutchinson, who abstained.

A specific need for the replacement of the current Hy Cel Counter-300 was presented to the Board. Due to the fact that the machine is now no longer made and parts are hard to come by, with the current machine needing substantial repairs, the Board instructed the hospital administrator to replace it with a CC-180 Hematology Analyzer. That financing of said machine to be arranged and that repayment be finished by 15 of January 1986. Dwight Hutchinson made a motion that the preceding information be accepted and voted on as accepted. Seconded by Leslie Barkley and passed by all present.

An update on the emergency generator system for the hospital was discussed. The feasibility of tying into Hansford Manor's system versus a new generator will be looked into with a specific cost report to be presented to the Board at a later date.

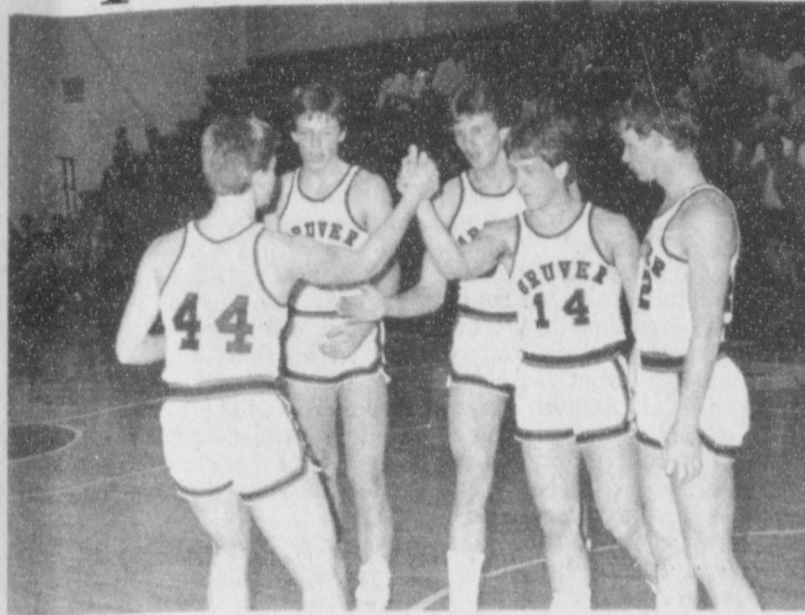
Next, the Board was formally advised that Dr. David McClellan would be terminating his practice of medicine in Hansford County as of the last part of May, 1985.

#### FAMILY INFLUENCE ON THE SWEET TOOTH

Do your children seem to "live" on candy, cookies, pop-sicles, sugared cereal and cola? Like many parents, you may be worried that too much refined sugar is leading to tooth decay and reducing the nutritional quality of your children's diets.

You may be able to do something about the problem, especially if your children are still young. But it could require changing some of your habits and attitudes as well as theirs.

Children come by their desire for sweets honestly. Studies have shown that infants are born with a preference for sweetened liquids over plain liquids. This preference will continue, especially if children have continued positive experiences with sweets.

As parents we create many of these positive experiences by offering sweets to comfort or reward our child, to express affection and to celebrate special occasions. We sometimes use sweets to compensate when we're busy or tired, or to keep the children distracted or quiet.

But that doesn't mean we need to give up birthday cakes, or put carrots in the Christmas stockings. In fact, some recent research from Cornell University shows that giving children sweets in "positive contexts," is not the only reason for their attraction to sugared foods.

Far more important, according to the research study, is how often children actually eat sweets. And this is determined mostly by the parents' own consumption of sweets, and how much television the family watches.

What and how parents eat has a powerful effect on children. Children learn to be sweet-eaters from their parents, just as they learn many other food preferences, such as liking meat or disliking vegetables.

The researchers also suggest that children who watch more

television tend to eat sweet foods more often because they are bombarded with commercials for highly sweetened foods, especially during Saturday morning cartoons. Because they watch at least some of the shows their children see, parents may become more familiar with the foods advertised and more receptive toward eating the foods themselves and serving them to their children.

So if you really want to change some of the sweet-eating habits of your young children, you will probably need to cut back yourself. You may also need to talk with them about the differences in the variety of foods we eat for good health in "real life" and what they see in the make-believe world of television.

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## Coach Crofford ends 32 years of coaching

Varsity Lynx Basketball Coach F. G. Crofford announced his retirement, which will take effect at the end of the 1984-85 school term.

Coach Crofford was born and raised on a farm near Clarendon, Texas. He took part in all sports during his junior high and high school years.

Coach Crofford attended Clarendon Jr. College for 1/2 a year before entering the army during World War II. He served under General Patton in Europe and was in several major battles. He was wounded twice in combat. General Patton visited the wounded at the hospital during one of his stays.

After serving two years, Coach Crofford returned home, where he married Bonnie Drake. He went back to Clarendon Jr. College where he was a starter on the College Basketball Team. After finishing Clarendon Jr. College, he went to West Texas State University, where he received his B.S. Degree in 1951 in Physical Education. He also received his Masters Degree in Education at W.T.S.U.

Coach Crofford and his wife, Bonnie, are both teachers. They have twin daughters, who are also teachers. One daughter, Sharon Mills and her family live in Amarillo, the other daughter, Karen Floyd and her family live in Canadian. The Croffords have three granddaughters and two grandsons.

Coach Crofford taught one year in Sunray as Head Coach for football and boys basketball. He also was Head Coach for football

and boys and girls basketball at Pettit, Texas for one year. He was Assistant Coach for football and basketball for one year at Whiteface.

He coached at Claude from 1956 through 1967, during which time he was coach for all grades of football and boys and girls basketball and track. During these years of coaching, his teams went to State 5 times.

He was Head Coach for the girls basketball team in Friona for 8 years. He was the girls basketball Head Coach at Gruver for six years before coming to Spearman, where he has served as Head Coach for the boys basketball team for four years, including this year.

He has had a total of 32 years of coaching, including this year; 31 as Head Coach and one year as Assistant Coach.

During his years of coaching, he has had 701 combined wins,

excluding this year; 317 combined losses, excluding this year; has won 12 District titles; 5 Regional titles; won State in 1962; was State Runner-up in 1960 and 1961; was 3rd in State one year; and 4th in State one year.

He has coached the girls All-Star team three times and has coached four All-American players.

He has been Director, Vice President, and President of the Girls Coaches Association.

He has worked in several Basketball Camps in Texas, Oklahoma, Iowa and Nebraska, as well as his own camps.

Last Summer, Coach Crofford was selected by the National Federation Interscholastic Coaches Association to receive a Distinguished Service Award in boys basketball.

The Spearman School System will surely miss Coach Crofford upon his retirement. We wish him the very best in his future endeavors.

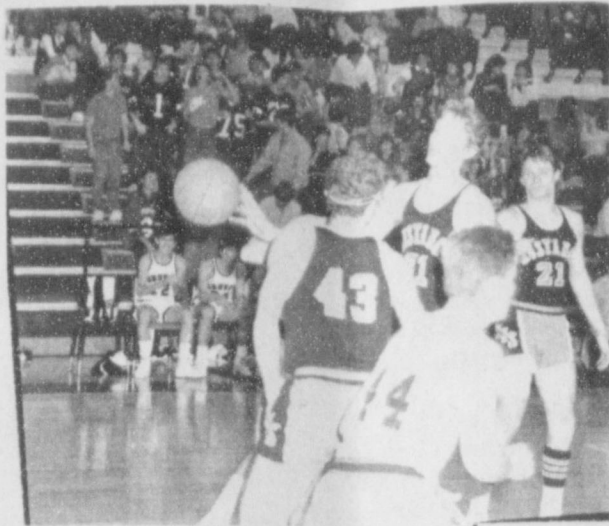
When the Historical Commission was engaged in printing Volume II, there were many people who wanted to buy Volume I Hansford County History, where are those people?

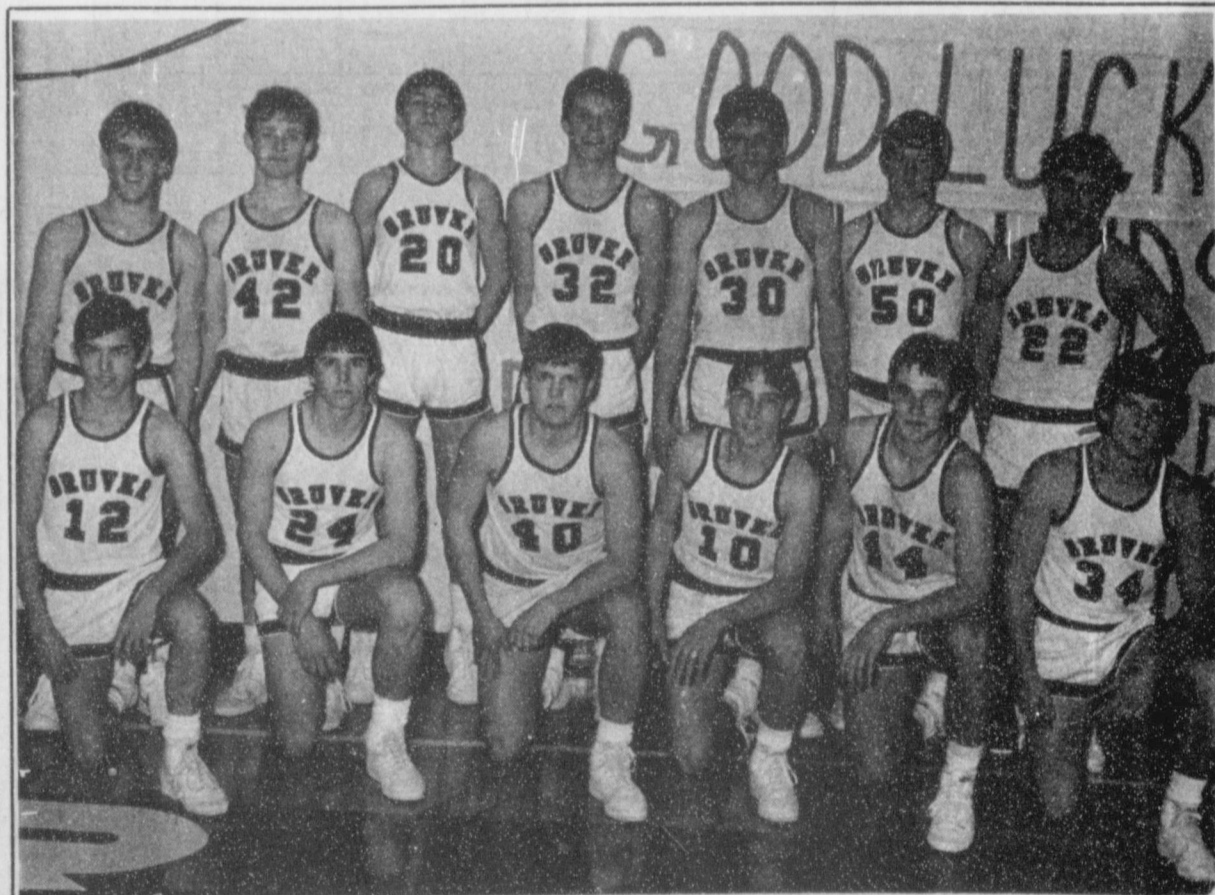
