HIGH POINTS OF INTEREST IN 1964

While straightening the files of 1964 and beginning a new year we discovered that the year 1964 was quite eventful. In a brief resume we will mention a few of the happenings of the past year.

As was 1963, the year 1964 proved to be very dry causing all dryland crops to be failures. The year brought irrigation to the county with 300 permits let during the year. Several new families have moved to the county and in the approaching year there will be many more. The cattle market zoomed downward during 1964 and the year closed with the market still quite low. With a look to 1965 in the farming category we will probably see more experimental crops since water is available through irrigation. Sugar beets, a few garden products and maybe more cotton will be grown in the county. Prospects are good that the area will not see the drought of 1964 but will have much more moisture.

The first of January last year was very cold. The gas line into Gruver broke January 12th leaving the town without gas throughout the early morning hours while the thermometer lowered to near zero. As the first of February rolled around in 1964 the town of Gruver became isolated as February 3, 1964 was the beginning of a snow which lasted for two days and a night to leave the county blanketed with 20 inches of wet snow, which proved to be the only moisture for the winter as well as the spring.

The Gruver Clinic was opened February 11th as Dr. Lowman Gober began practice. The town had awaited the finding of a doctor to occupy the clinic for some three years. Only one month later Dr. Gober added to his staff a technician, Archie Johnston.

The Gruver Library also saw growth throughout the past year as they held a Benefit Tea which included a painting exhibit March 21st and raised over \$300 to add to their fund.

Hansford County celebrated its 75th anniversary last year as the County Celebration rolled around in April. Miss Judy Bayless, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Theodore Bayless of Gruver was named Miss Hansford County. Miss Karen Clawson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Clawson of Gruver and Miss Paulede Hester, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ed Hester of Spearman took the runner-up positions.

On April 18th the Gruver State Bank was burglarized, though only forty-five dollars was all that was stolen, a large amount of damage was done to the vault door.

Mr. and Mrs. Arthur Evans received a twenty year service award for their work with the U. S. Department of Commerce Weather Bureau.

George Bush, candidate for the Senatorial race in Texas, visited in Gruver and was hosted at a tea in his honor on May 19th in the Buddy Etling home. Jerry Gumfory represented the Gruver Legion Post at Boys State in Austin the first part of June.

Reverend Bill Butts and his family moved to Gruver from Fort Worth and became pastor of the First Baptist Church of Gruver in July and in September Reverend Paul DeWolfe and his family moved to Gruver from Amarillo and became pastor of the Assembly of God Church.

The city purchased a fogging machine to rid the town of the terrific fly and mosquito problem last July.

A new addition was added to Gruver last year as the portion of land bordered on the north by Farm Highway 289 in north Gruver was opened by Buddy and Bill Etling. The new addition is called the Etling addition.

The Gruver Independent suffered a great shock on August 14th as death came to its Founder and Publisher, Bob Bailey. Bob was only a young man of 31 and left behind a wife and small son.

The Gruver schools opened the last part of August in their new ultra-modern High School Building and the football teams had access to a modern field house. New cafeteria fixtures in the remodeled Junior High Building and a new band hall were also opened for access of the students and faculty as the year progressed. As Homecoming approached the New School had their openhouse October 24th.

Politics was the subject in the fall and the county showed its trend to the Republican party as the final results were tallied.

About \$1,000 dollars in damage and the loss of some \$50 in merchandise was the result of the burglary which occurred at the School November 17th. Not a month later burglars broke into the Agriculture Building doing a good amount of damage.

As we look at the sports events of the season we find that the 1964 Girls Basketball team took honors throughout the District and continued by capturing the Bi-District Championship. They represented the area in Regional and won their first game but fell in the final game of the tourney. Three girls represented Gruver on the All-District basketball team of 1964 and were LaNetta Blankenship, Wanda Hardesty and Anita States. Sam Tipton was named to the boys All-District team. In football for 1964 the Greyhounds finished their season with a 3-1 district record and found second place in district competition. Their season closed with ten wins and three losses. Frank Silva and Tommy Gumfory were named to the All-District Football Team.

In the beginning of the basket ball season for 1965 the Gruver girls have taken first place in the Sunray Tournament and third place in the Gruver Tourney. The Gruver boys captured first place in the Gruver Tourney and took second place in the Sunray Tournament. The boys have won 11 - and lost 5 ; while the girls have won 11 and lost 4 to begin the 1965 year.

The year ended with another rash of burglaries and thefts as the Gruver Drug was broken into and robbed December 29th of some \$1,000 worth of merchandise and small change stolen. That same night a pickup south of town saw the same results as it was broken into and robbed of tools.

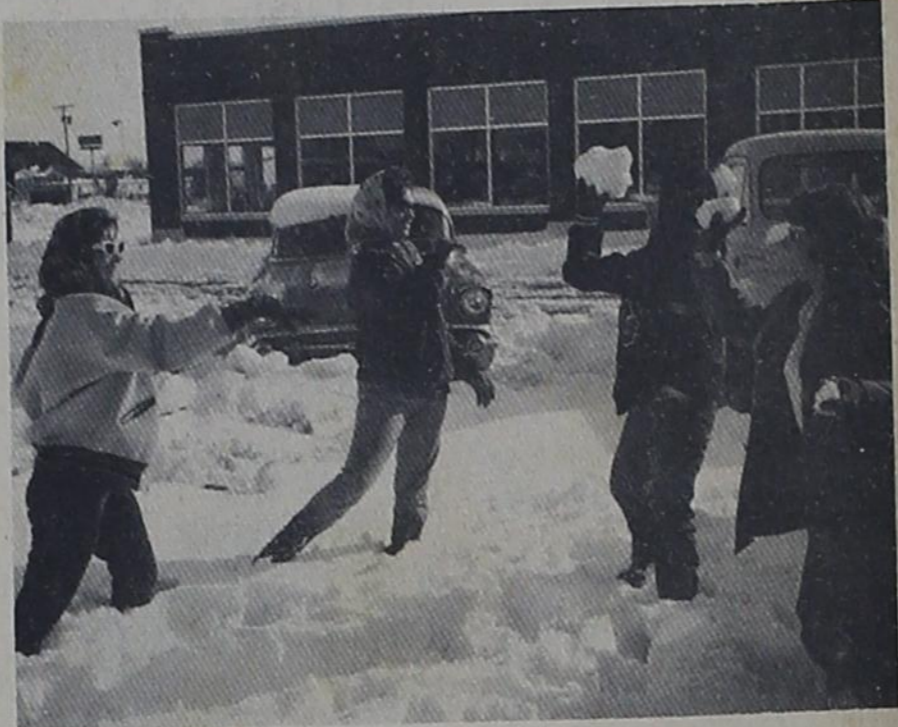

In 1965 at the General Election the town will vote on a raise in their taxes to provide for some form of protection in the form of a City Marshall.

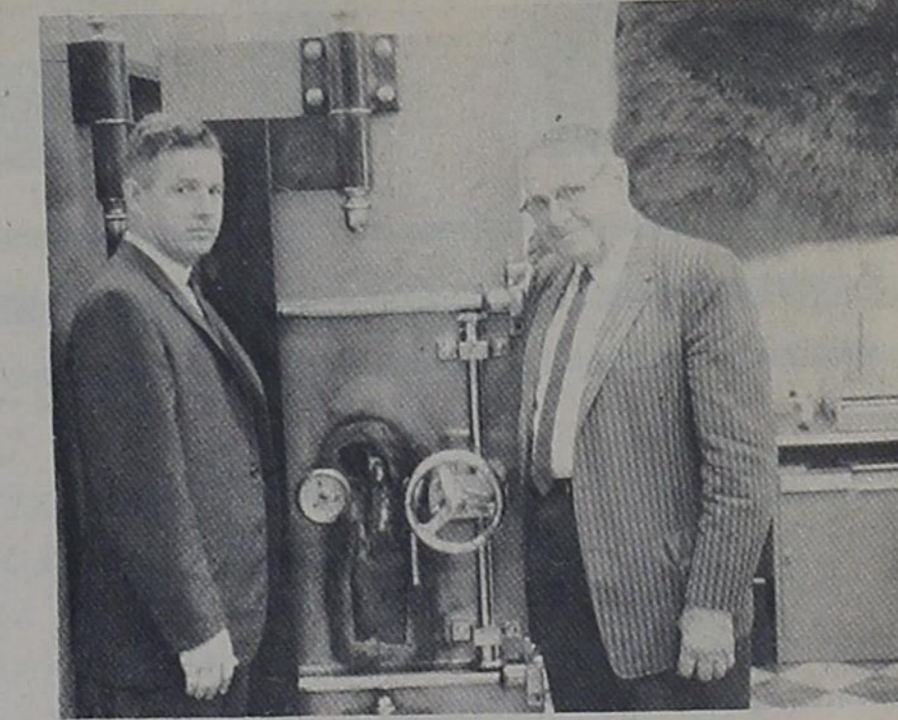
Miss Judy Bayless of Gruver crowned Miss Hansford County with Misses Paulede Hester and Karen Clawson

BURGLARS HIT GRUVER DRUG

The Gruver Drug was burglarized Tuesday night December 29th as the back door was pried open for the entrance of the intruders. One man is being

held in custody in the county jail after his arrest in Amarillo when a watch bearing the Gruver Drug tag was found in his possession.

The loss to the store amounted to approximately \$1,000 in merchandise with only a small amount of change stolen. The burglars took two record

ONE CAR TURN-OVER INJURES DIANE AND DENNIS STEDJE

Diane Stedje and Dennis Stedje, daughter and son of Mr. and Mrs. Gordon Stedje of the Oslo Community, were involved in a one car turn-over on the dirt road between Texhoma and Oslo last Wednesday. Both were taken to the Guymon Memorial Hospital where Dennis remained overnight and Diane remained until Sunday morning. They are both home in fine condition.

Highway Patrolman Bill Cassingham credits the use of seat belts to saving the lives of the two youth. The accident occurred about 7:15 p.m. as the two were returning from Texhoma. The driver, Dennis, failed to make the un-marked turn nine miles east of Texhoma on the stateline road. The car rolled over landing on

its top. The Highway patrolman said the 1965 Mustang was a total loss. It traveled some 250 feet out of control before turning over the one and a half times. The Patrolman said the right front door was torn off and had the occupants not been wearing seat belts, they would have

been thrown out of the vehicle and probably killed.

Diane received forty-seven stitches after facial cuts were received when she was trying to free herself from the car. The two walked a mile and half to a farm home where they called their parents and were taken to the hospital by the farmer.

Mrs Chapman to Lead Mother's March

Mrs. Leon Chapman, Gruver, has been appointed chairman of the Gruver area of Hansford County Mothers' March on Birth Defects according to Mrs. Virgil Mathews, County Chairman.

Mrs. Chapman served as chairman in 1964 and did such a tremendous job, she was asked to serve again this year.

"We mothers have a moral responsibility to get across to the public the point that birth defects are a shocking national problem -shocking to see and shocking in their effect upon the afflicted children and their families", said Mrs. Chapman.

"I believe that our people will do all they can to help the thousands of human beings who are relegated to mental institutions for life because their brains have been irreparably damaged, or doomed to lives of invalidism because their bodies have been crippled by birth defects."

Mrs. Chapman pointed out that it was the knowledge of this terrible toll in young lives and minds that led the March of Dimes to enter the fight against birth defects. Now, despite a lack of public awareness of the problem, significant advances have been made in treating birth defects and in research seeking their cause and prevention.

"Birth defects are the most serious childhood health problem in the United States today", said Mrs. Chapman. "The March of Dimes is already doing something about this problem. It can do much more if everyone in Hansford County will greet the Marching Mother with a generous contribution on January 17th starting at 1:30 p.m.

Also, on January 24th

at 1:00 p.m. there will be a Radio Marathon under the direction of Doyle Barkley. More about this later.

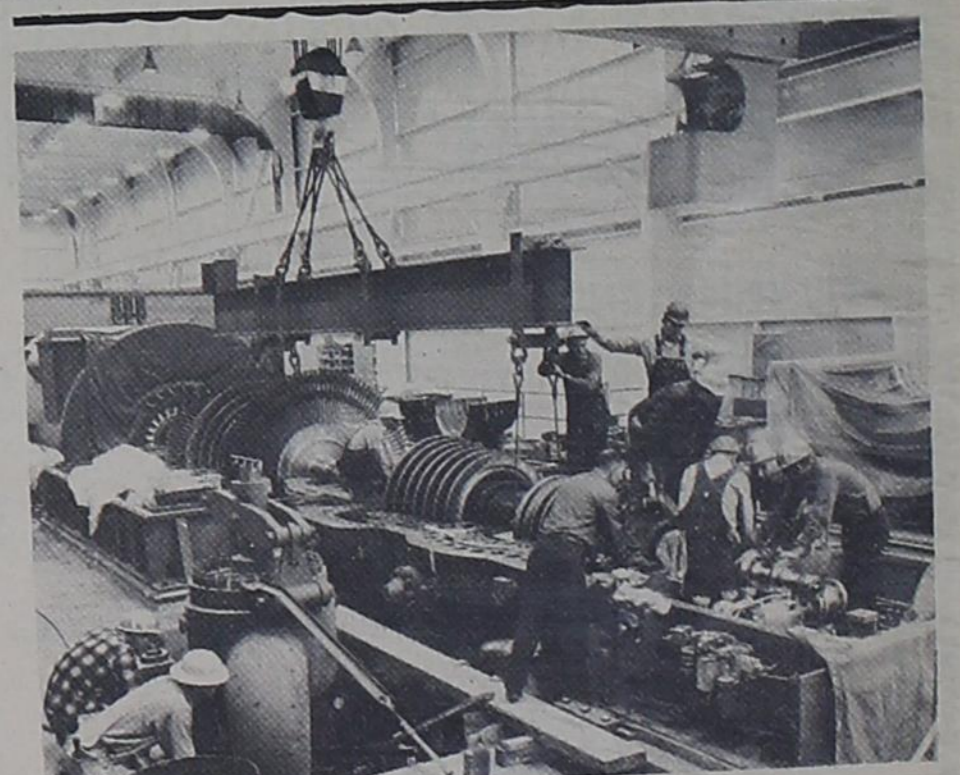

NEEDS OF THE NATIONAL FOUNDATION TOLD

Last August twenty four volunteers from twenty four counties in the Golden Spread Area met in Amarillo to plan and organize a Council for these counties. The purpose of the Council was to bring about a better coordinated program of communication between chapters.

Dr. J. Victor Ellis, Amarillo Neurosurgeon who is medical advisory chairman for the Potter County chapter was principal speaker.

Dr. Ellis discussed in detail the importance of a well rounded program to help in evaluation and care of children with birth defects. He pointed out that in this area the incidents of congenital defects is much higher than the average person realizes.

Dr. Ellis emphasized the importance of a large nation wide organization interested in the problem as to research and finding ways to prevent its occurrence.

He made it clear that help was available for birth defect children, and through the coordinated efforts of the home doctor and the county chapter these cases should be channeled through the National Foundation.

The National Foundation, which made two polio vaccines possible, has now turned its attention to the prevention and treatment of birth defects.

Despite polio's head-

long rush to oblivion, thanks to the vaccine which the American people literally bought and paid for through the March of Dimes there are still many partially or completely paralyzed polio victims who need help to breathe. Aid to an estimated 12,000 polio victims cost about \$3,000,000 in 1964. The high cost of post-polio care will continue in 1965.

On December 11th the Council met again in Amarillo to discuss the problems that might exist in each chapter, and to make plans for the annual January campaign.

Compared to some of the other chapters in the council, Hansford County has been most fortunate, in that we have only had three birth defect cases reported to this chapter this year. These cases have received help through the local chapter.

The facts about birth defects are not pleasant. The human mind instinctively shrinks from them. But they must be faced if we are to accomplish our goals. Ignorance of any evil thing is neither a preventive nor a cure. If the truth about birth defects make us afraid-afraid enough help scientists do something about it-then the fear is very the lesser of two evils.

The money raised in the campaign this January, will be used at a local and national level. Around 37% will be used in our local area while the remainder goes for research.

After lunch the pupils were given candy canes and Christmas candy to start the holiday festivities.

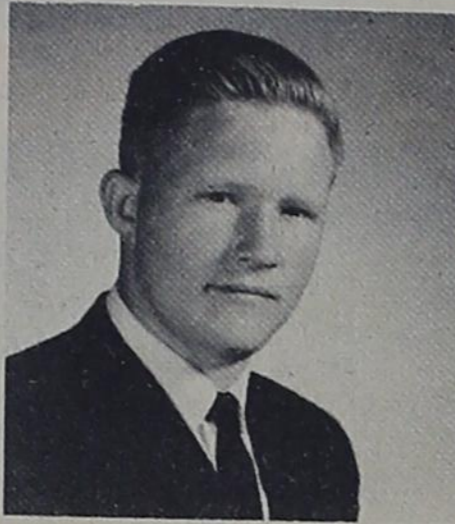
Third Grade Christmas Parties
