### BUS DRIVERS ARE BIG WHEELS

"Big Wheels" is the name for the dozen efficient and very careful Gruyer School bus drivers who are responsible for transporting 308 Gruyer students (about half of the School enrollment) to and from school each of the 176 days in the year.

Veterans of the School Drivers are Fred Chase who has been deftly wheeling one of the familiar yellow buses over the roads since 1954 and Edd Snow who began driving the students in 1955. Next, in year's of service, is Winston Upchurch who began driving a school bus in 1956, and Darrell McQueen who has been driving since 1958.

Included in this year's roster also are three men who have had two years experience, Robert Dahl, Jim Chockley, and Ted Te-Beest. Those who had their initial runs last year are W.A. Bratton, Otho Gammill, John Masten, and Richard Williams, with Alfred White, a newcomer this year completing the group of twelve.

The Gruver School District is one of the larger in the State and has a total of 778.4 miles of paved roads covered by the school bus routes and 271.2 miles of dirt road. The longest route totals 126 miles per day with the shortest, 73

drivers cover each day is 1,049.6 miles with a grand total for the school year being comparable to 7.4 trips around the world or 184,729.6 miles! This figure lacks just a little equaling the distance to the moon which is only 216,240 miles away

The largest school bus has a capacity of 70 passengers with two others capable of carrying 60. Aside from the regular school runs, the buses are used to transport students to variour school-related activities during the year. Highly successful has been the equipping of one bus with two-way radio com munication this year through the efforts and expense of several buspatron-parents.

Top physical condition Mileage which the bus is required of each of the drivers who must pass a physical examination at the beginning of the school year, and be holders of a current Texas State Chauffer's license. Steady nerves and an even disposition are further attributes displayed by Gruyer School bus driv-

When not driving the school buses, the twelve men represent a cross-section of the community with the majority being farmers and ranchers of the area; three represent the teaching profession, two are welders; two Gruyer businessmen, and one, a minister.

Gruver area residents salute these men in whose capable hands we confidently entrust the lives and safety of our Youth.

#### CANCER CRUSADE NATIONAL LEADERS

### Tour Held For Soil **Conservation Members**

Mr. Jim Burk, District Sales Manager for Gifford-Hill-Western and Vice President of the Goldens pread Chapter of the Soil Conservation Society of America, made arrangements for some 35 to 40 Society members to tour the Gifford-Hill American Pipe Manufacturing Plant in Amarillo. The group saw the manufacturing of reinforced concrete pipe with sizes ranging up to 72 inches in diameter. This pipe is used in the aqueduct system between Lake Meridith and Amarillo.

Mr. Burk also arranged a tour through the Gifford-Hill Panhandle Plant, east of Amarillo, where the group observed the manufacturing of 15 inch rubber gasket concrete pipe, which is being used more extensively in irrigation systems by farmers in the Panhandle and South Plains.

Construction of the Sanford Dam was observed. Mr. P. R. Kensley, Resident Engineer; Dale Powell, Chief Surveyor, and Phil Larsen, Safety Engineer for Zachry Company, provided a guided tour of the phases of construction, Mr. Kensley stated this would be the next to the last group to tour the dam while under construction. The work has become so concentrated that visitors slow down work and increase probabilities of accidents. The contractor is scheduled to complete the dam in June. Mr. Kensley explained the

A discussion was given on the set up for pumping water to Amarillo and the other member cities to the south. A separate pumping system will be used to provide water to Borger and Pampa. junior college are asking entered the University, a the questions, "Will I lose hours when I transfer to a senior institution?" or "Will his transcript of work taken my grades be changed to C's?"

The answer to both these questions is NO.

If the following requiremen ts are met, any course taken from an accredited junior college will transfer to a senior institution:

1. The course must be passed. (Generally a grade of C is required, although a grade of D may sometimes be accepted.)

1. It must apply on the student's major field of work or be recognized as elective for the major.

3. It must be taken in the proper sequence with the required pre-requisites.

4. The work, to be transferred from a junior college may not exceed more than sixty-six sem ester houss or one-half of the degree requirements. A student may receive special permission from a senior college to take an additional six semester hours from a junior

The following information from the University of Texas answers the question concerning the transfer of grades: "Grades eamed at other institutions are not changed. The transcript submitted as part of his application for admission by a student transferring to the

### Texas Highway Department Distributes Litter Bags

Texas motorists paid for many miles of new highways last year. But they never were built.

Governor Connally emphasized this point today in accepting the first of a quarter-million litter bags given to the Texas Highway Department by the Galveston Chamber of Commerce and the Galveston Convention and Tourist Bureau.

The bags will be distributed to motorists at each of the eight Tourist Information Centers located at points of entry on key highways of the State and in the Capitol rotunda.

"The Texas Highway Department is charged with the construction and maintenance of the State's superb 66,000-mile highway system,"Governor Connally said. He added:

"But the truth is that more than \$1.5 million of taxes levied on highway users is wasted each year to pick up litter thrown along the right of way by careless motorists. This money coudd better be used to build more miles of new highways, and to protect the taxpayers' \$4 billion investment in our existing system."

The bags were donated by the Galveston Chamber of Commerce to encourage litter control among out-ofstate visitors. They also bear a message of invitation to visit the Galveston resort area.

D. C. Greer, State Highway Engineer, pointed out that approximately 12 million visitors come to Texas each year.

"These visitors represent an industry of more than one-half billion dollars a year," Greer said. "We hope that Texans will become conscious of our litter problem and help us present a 'clean house' for our paying guests."

The Texas Highway Department has distributed litter bags through the Tourist Information Centers for many years. However, this is the first instance that any organization has donated such a large number of bags for free distribution.

Some 400 thousand tour-

ists visited the Information Centers last year. Besides litter bags nearly two million pieces of travel-oriented literature were handed out. In addition, Information Center personnel encouraged tourists to extend their trips to visit other Texas scenic and historical attractions.

Presentation of the first litter bag was at a ceremony held in the State Capitol. Edwin D. Hunter, president of the Galveston Chamber of Commerce, presented the initial bag to Governor Connally. He said:

"Galveston merchants who are financing the purchase of these bags are very happy to try to help solve the State's litter problem. We are intensely interested in the tourist program. Only by presenting clean, inviting attractions can we hope to encourage out-of-state visitors to come to Texas again, and again, and again."

Present at the ceremony besides the Governor and Hunter were Greer: John McCann, president of the Galveston Convention and Tourist Bureau, and Pam Latham, travel counselor at the Tourist Information Center in the Capitol rotunda.
