Homemakers, by that very title are community leaders, the vice president of the Texas Extension Homemaker Clubs in the Rolling Plains District.

"Think of yourself as a family leader. Then think of yourself as a community leader. It isn't hard to make that transition," said Mrs. Nell Finney of Tulia. She represented the board of the state organization of more than 22,000 women.

Hansford county was represented by eight persons, said Karer Harruff, County Extension Agent for home economics. Local participants were Paula Foster, Jeanie Laughlin, Delinda McLaughlin, Janie Kunselman, Beverly Antalek from Town and Country E.H. Club; Ethel Byers, Joyce Byers and Adalyn Barnes from Happy Homes E.H. Club.

Jeanie Laughlin received an 100% achievement certificate for Hansford County.

Mrs. Finney urged the delegates to continue to live up to the slogan adopted by the association for 1985-86: "Look Ahead, Become Involved, Build a Legacy."

She cited the achievements of several women in history whose leadership changed their communities and the world. These ranged from Susan B. Anthony and Coretta King to Candy Lightner, the homemaker who founded Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD).

She advised the women to be-

come involved in an issue or cause, to have a positive attitude, see tough situations through, motivate others and spend the extra hours to see the job through.

Mrs. Finney explained a new family community leadership training program being conducted by the national association. She said it is designed to help women learn the proper steps to take to provide leadership in community affairs. "If you know the right way to approach a problem, you can be heard... you can make a difference," she said.

During the district conference in the activities building of West Texas State University, the Extension Homemakers also participated in discussion groups to improve local club programs.

A luncheon fashion show featured Randall County homemakers modeling summer styles.

Joanne Arasim, curator of textiles for the Panhandle-Plains Historical Museum at WTSU, presented a special program tracing changes in the styles of wedding gowns and other marriage customs. She displayed several wedding gowns from the museum's collection.

Extension Homemaker Clubs provide leadership and educational opportunities for homemaker's under the leadership of the county agent and the support of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, an arm of Texas A&M University.

## To God: a note of thanks

Friends in this weeks article I  
certainly want to thank God for  
something that took place in the new  
town of Spearman, and I'm so glad to  
be among the living to tell the story,  
being one of so many who were made  
to sit together in a heavenly place in  
Christ Jesus every night for a month.  
The Morton sisters May, Bess and  
Eva were sent by the 'Holy Ghost with  
a message after the out pouring of the  
Holy Ghost in a school in Topeka,  
Kansas under the direction of Chas F.  
Parham at the very beginning of this  
century. The same experience we  
read about in Acts second chapter  
known as the Latter Rain Joel tells us  
about. Their messages making us to  
know it was the fulfillment of the  
scripture found in Eph. 4:4-6. There is  
one body and one Spirit even as ye are  
called in one hope of your calling. One  
Lord one faith one baptism One God  
and Father of all whos is above all and  
through all and in all. These young  
ladies lived three months in the E.A.  
Greever home as one of the family.  
Three meetings a month at each place  
first in Waka, the next in the Greever  
community (Black) and the third in  
Spearman. The Waka and Black  
community meetings were held in the  
school house and the one in Spearman  
in the Theater building and what a  
time of refreshing from the presence  
of the Lord. It was so wonderful that  
all wanted a place to assemble  
together for such from then on so the  
men began to plan to erect such a  
place and the name given was Union  
Church. For some time the Sunday  
services were in charge of Judge and  
Mrs. Townsend, Mrs. Cooke and me,  
and after that I was the pastor for a  
few years; but something took place  
in 1951 that I'm so glad to know will  
be forgotten when I put on im-  
mortality. Of course at this time  
many of the dear old souls who had  
been so blessed had fallen asleep. A  
part of our group as well as far and  
near known as the Apostolic Faith  
movement formed an Alliance and  
called a general meeting of the  
movement that was held in the Old  
High School building here in  
Spearman and I do declare with a sad

**Library News**

D.R. Meredith was born in Eastern Okla., and is the granddaughter of a pioneer who rode in a covered wagon during the famous run of April 22, 1889, when Oklahoma was opened to homesteaders. She now lives in Dumas, Texas, the heart of the Panhandle, and her knowledge of the life and lore of the Texas Panhandle gives her book, *The Sheriff And The Panhandle Murders*, an unusually rich atmosphere. In this book, Sheriff Charles Timothy Matthews was glad to leave the stress and sprawl of Dallas, and some unpleasant memories, for the quiet of Carroll, a small West Texas town. Nestled deep in the heart of the Panhandle, a day's drive from the big city Matthews left behind, Crawford County hadn't seen anyone murdered in cold blood for more than 80 years. And if the sheriff's wish came true, that peace would continue when he took over his new post.

As he settled into the job, the annual Frontier Days are drawing near, Sheriff Matthews is expecting some rowdiness but no real trouble. Both he and the entire town are stunned when a shiftless good ol' boy and a pretty teenage Mexican girl are found brutally murdered less than 24 hours before the eve of the festivities. Stern, meticulous, uncompromising, Matthews narrows down the suspects and finds a surprising amount of information in a town where secrets are hard to keep. *The Sheriff And The Panhandle Murders* is a western mystery whose author shows how greed and ambition can smolder under the tranquil surface of even the most ordinary citizen.

If you tend to have a taste for mystery and suspense, perhaps *Stillwatch*, Mary Higgins Clark's richest and most suspenseful novel to date, will appeal to you. In *Stillwatch* Pat Traymore, a talented young television journalist, is about to break into the high-powered world of Washington D.C. politics with a documentary series called *Women in Government*. Attractive, intelligent, a born interviewer, Pat is also deeply in love with a distinguished congressman. Seemingly, she has everything going for her—except that she has moved back into the beautiful Georgetown mansion where a terrible crime destroyed her childhood. And even before she arrives, someone, a stranger, is making threatening telephone calls, warning her to stay away...

The subject of her first program is a woman Pat has always admired; Abigail Jennings, U.S. senator from Virginia. A former beauty queen, Abigail has become one of the most powerful people in Washington, at the very center of the capital's political and social life. Senator Jennings is on the verge of

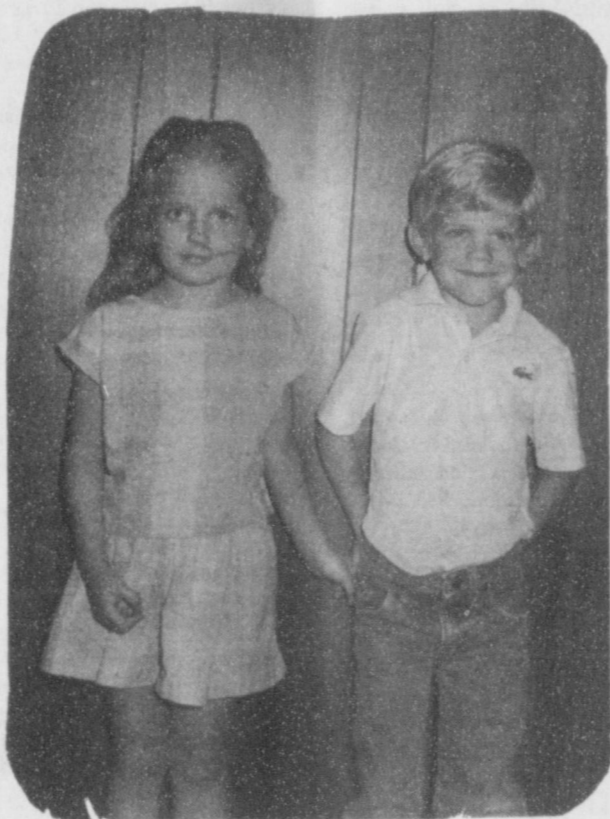
