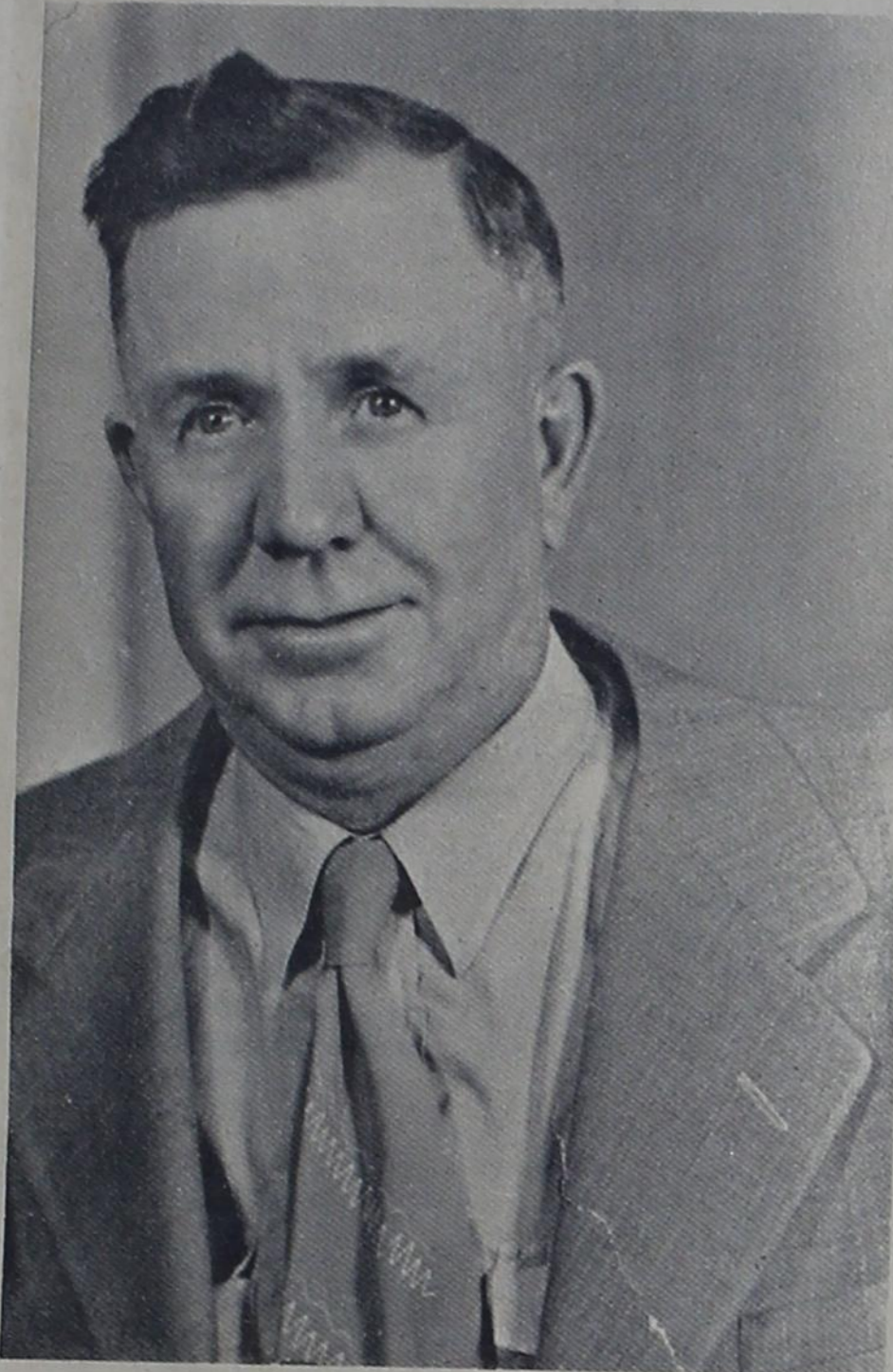

Military Rites Held For Morse Pioneer

World War I veteran McKinley B. (Mack) Dortch of Morse was laid to rest Sunday afternoon in the Lieb Cemetery with military graveside rites under the direction of the Hansford County Sullivan R. Spivey American Legion Post No. 154.

Mr. Dortch, a beloved Hansford County Pioneer, died about 10:00 a.m. Friday, May 28, 1965 at his home in Morse. He had been an active member of the community, owning and managing the Morse Implement Company with his son, Tom, up until the time of his death, which might have been a heart attack with no prior illness. His age was 70.

He was born in Peculiar, Missouri, in 1895, and moved with his family in 1907 to the Spurlock Community about 10 miles north of Sunray, Texas where he grew up as the son of a rancher and experienced many cattle drives and the excitement of youth in those days.

On June 16, 1921, he married Lela Boney and the young couple lived first near Stratford, then in the Hartley-Channing communities before moving to Morse in 1927 just when the town was starting. He helped freight lumber for the first buildings in Morse. He worked for a number of years in the elevator business with R. L. McClellan Grain Company.

In 1935, he was converted and baptized in the Morse Methodist Church by the Reverend Culwell, circuit preacher. Mack was an integral part of Morse and the Morse community where he was a charter member of the Morse Community Chapel, Hansford County American Legion Post No. 154, Morse Lions Club; a past member of long standing of the Morse School Board of Trustees, and Hansford County Hospital Board.

Memorial services were held at 4:00 p.m. in the Morse Community Chapel

with the pastor Harold Fleming officiating, assisted by Melvin Kirby of the Gem Baptist Church and of Perryton. Mrs. H. B. Parks presented the organ prelude. The Methodist Men's Quartet from Gruver, including Del Cluck, Rod Barkley, Buddy Murrell and Carlie Knight, accompanied by Mrs. Del Cluck offered "In the Sweet Bye and Bye", "What A Friend We Have in Jesus" and "No, Never Alone."

Pallbearers included H. B. Parks, Earl Henderson, Lynn Davis, Grant Miner, Henry Reid, and Dean Lieb. Boxwell Brothers of Spearman directed the service.

Interment was in Lieb Cemetery with the members of the Hansford County American Legion Post officiating. Post Commander Glenn Truax presented the American Flag which had draped the casket to Mrs. Dortch following the graveside rites.

Survivors include his wife, Lela; two daughters, Mrs. Desmond (Virgie Lee) Kelly, and Mrs. Joe (Maxine) Reising, both of Morse; four sons, Tom of Morse, Jack of Amarillo, Doyle of Spearman, and John of Las Animas, Colorado. One daughter Mrs. Dick (Billie Jean) Robinson of Hollidaysburg Pennsylvania preceded her father in death two years ago.

Also surviving are two sisters, Mrs. Arthur (Ruby) Cartrite and Mrs. Cy (Mary) Sweny, both of Sunray; two brothers, Corum of Stratford and John of Denver, Colorado.

The twenty-two grandchildren are: Larry, Ray, Elaine, Evelyn and Don Kelly; Gary, Judy, Travis and Gayle Reising; Teresa and Vicki Dortch of Morse; Michael, Neal and Paula Dortch of Amarillo; Deonne and Steven Dortch of Spearman; Johnny, Ann Wayne and Christine Dortch of Las Animas, Colorado Richard and Gary Robinson of Pennsylvania.

L.'s sister and family, the Wendell Tooleys.

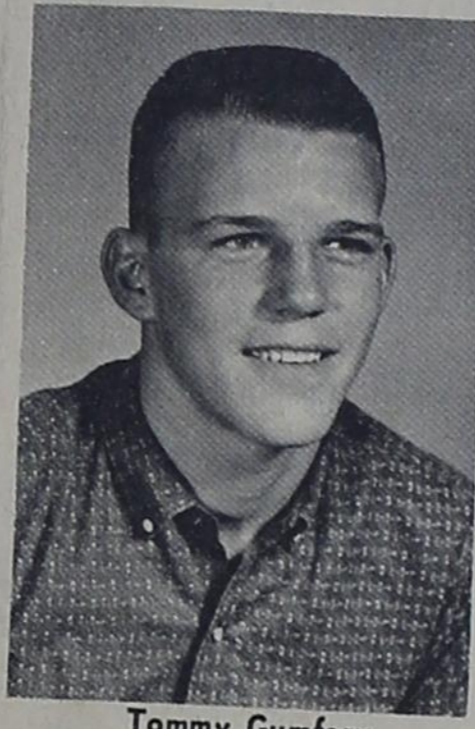

Mack Hoel and Tommy Gumfory will leave Friday joining fifty-four boys from the 18th District American Legion to attend the 1965 Boys State to be held June 5-12 at the University of Texas.

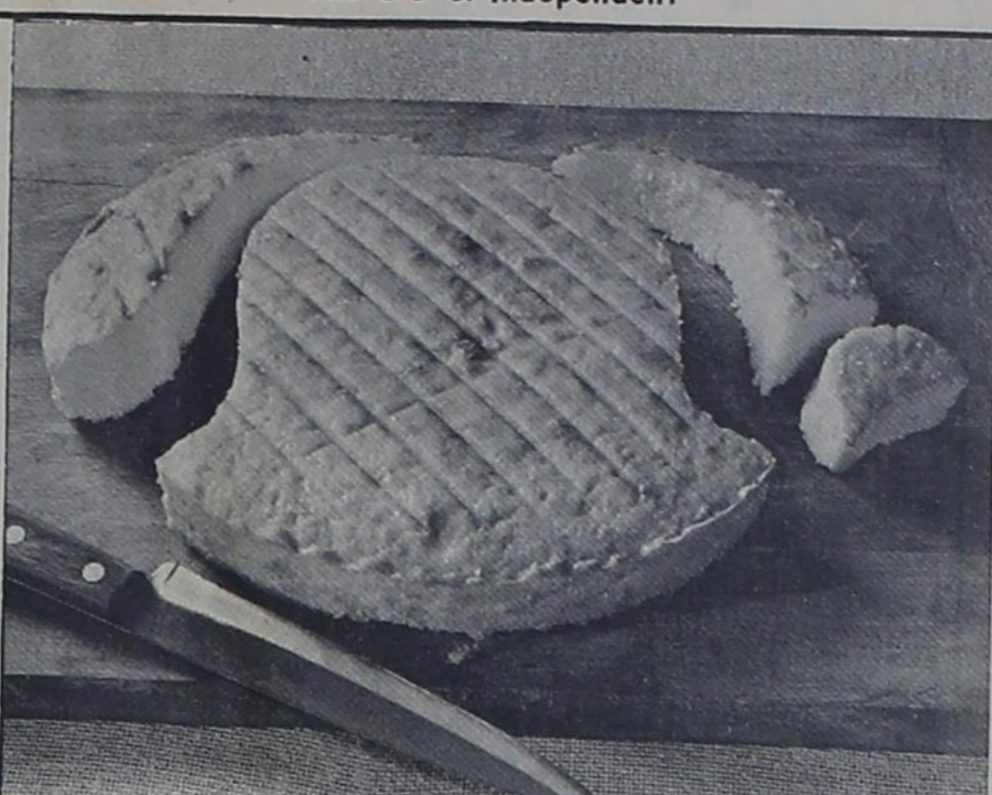

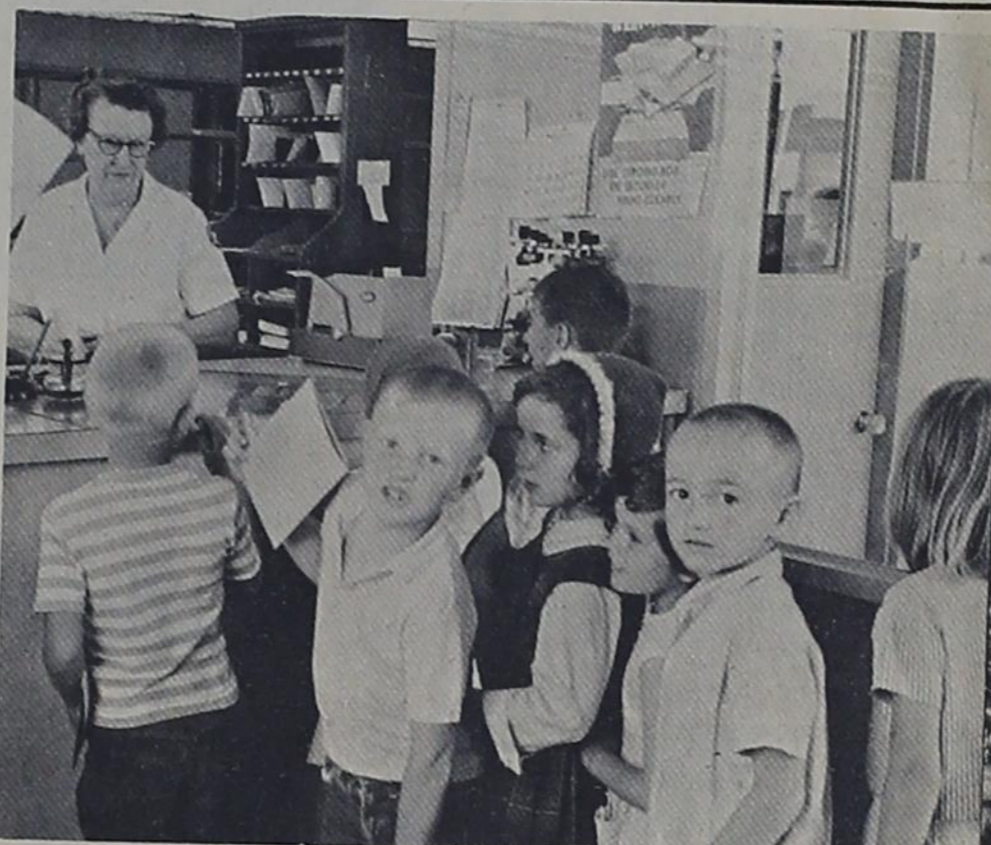

Place bells, on serving tray side-by-side, with tops of bells slightly tilted toward each other. Attach clappers with small amount of frosting. Arrange strips cut from sides to make ribbons at top. Frost with any favorite fluffy white frosting.

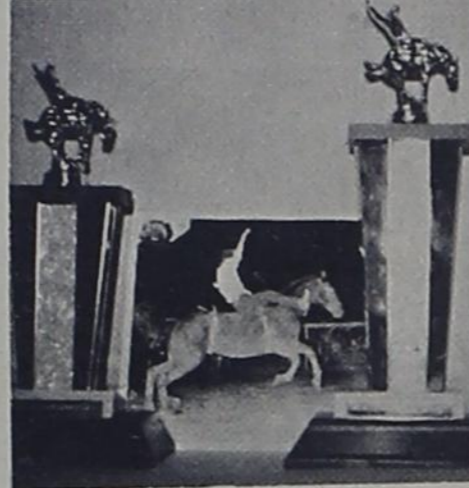

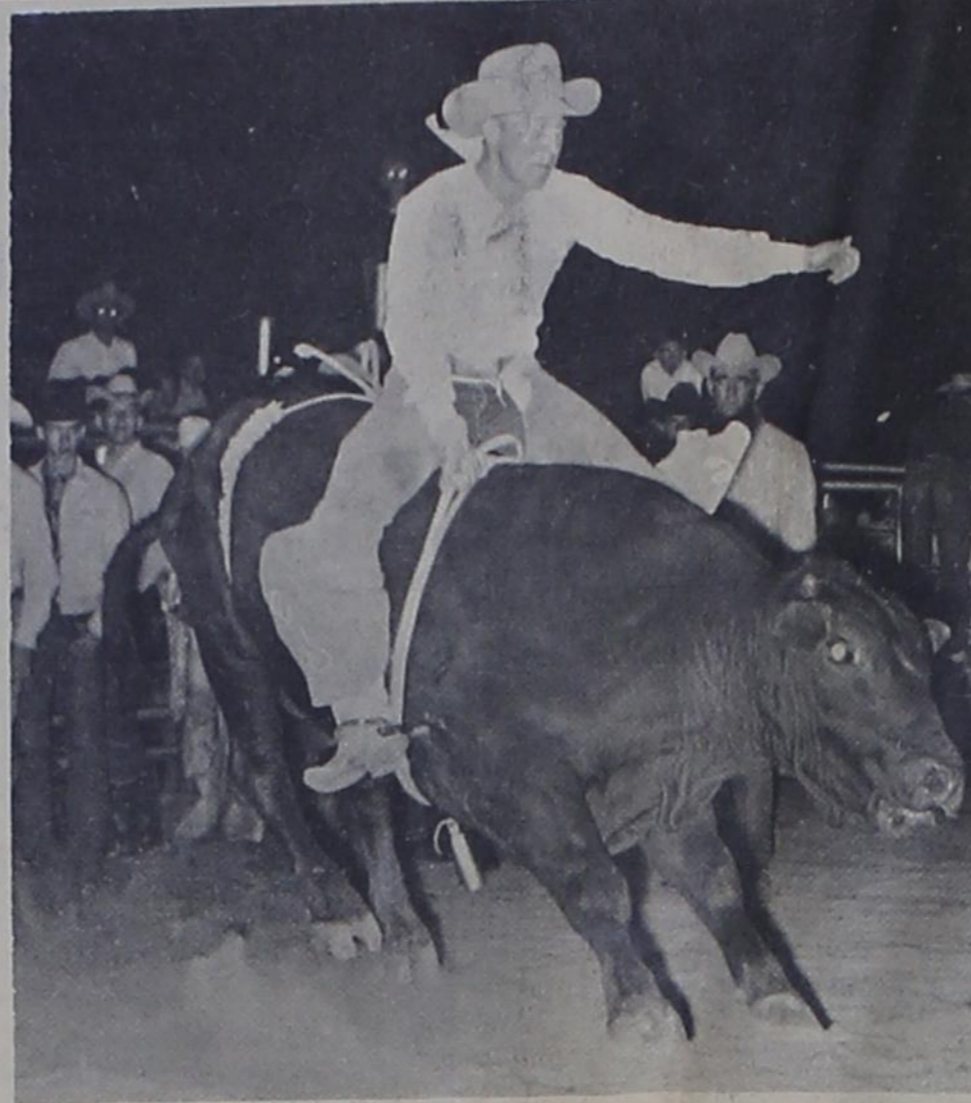

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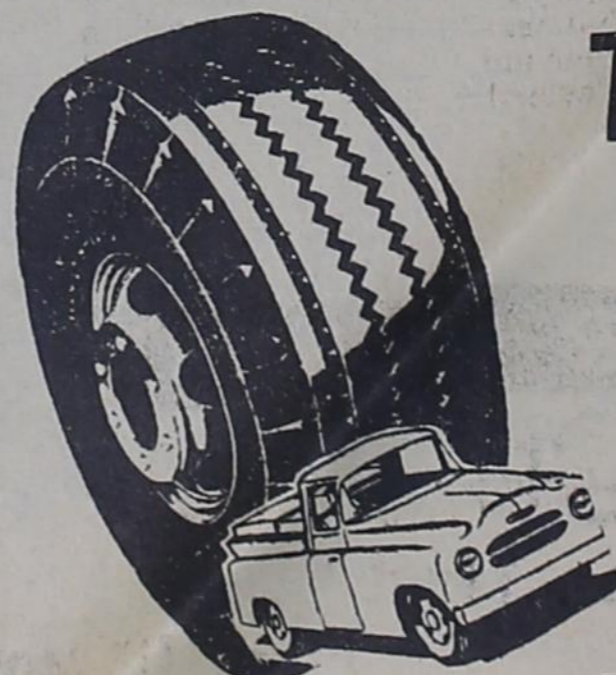

WHEAT TOUR AT ETTER STATION:
You will be able to see some of the research on hybrid wheat on the tour of the whe at variety plots to be held Tuesday, June 8, 1965 at the North Plains Agricultural Research Field Station at Etter.

At 9:00 a.m. the group will meet at the Research Station and make tours of the wheat test plots as follows:

1. Test plots of many experimental and commercial varieties of wheat, fall sown oats and barley, discussed by Dr. Kenneth Porter, Agronomist, Bushland.
2. Test plots on water use and fertility trials, discussed by Dr. Jim Wehrly and Cecil Regeir, North Plains Research Field.

10:30 A.M.—Adjourn 10:30-11:00 A.M.—Visit over Field Station and observe test plots on sugar beets and vegetables.

Coffee will be served at the North Plains Research Center.

The research on hybrid wheat should be of interest to all farmers in the county. I know this will be a busy time but think this will be well worth your while if you can get off.

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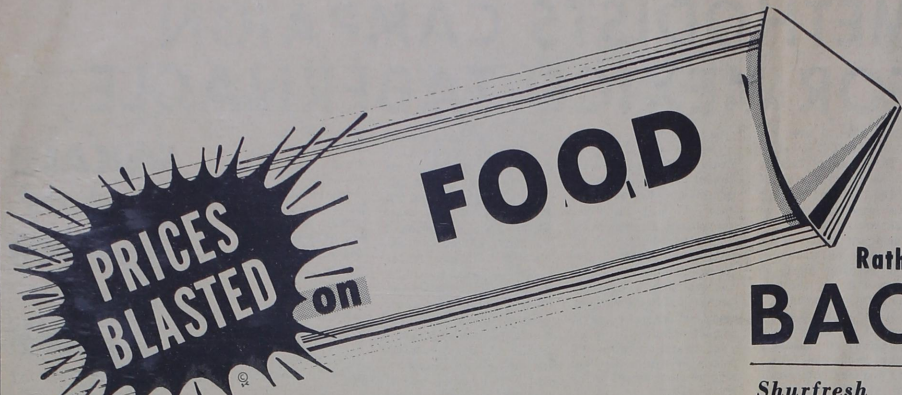

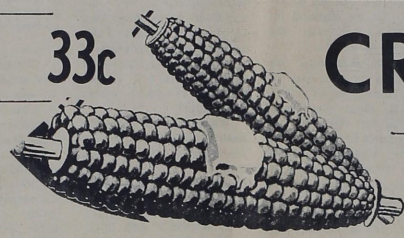

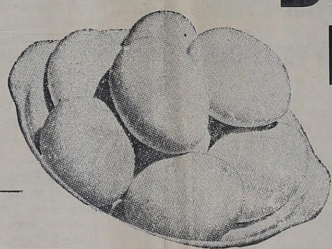
