Erickson will speak at Pringle-Morse

Nationally known author and humorist, John Erickson, will speak to Pringle-Morse school at 12:30 and to Gruver school at 2:00 on February 20, 1986.

Publishing through his own company, Maverick Books, Erickson has written the popular "Hank the Cowdog" series about the humorous antics of canine head of ranch security. The first book of the series, "Hank the Cowdog", was produced as an animated feature for CBS Storybreak.

In addition to the Hank series, Erickson has written a number of books dealing with the traditions and life of the cowboy. He examines the day to day job of the modern Texas cowboy from the point of view of a man that has been a cow hand in the Texas and Oklahoma Panhandles.

Erickson has also published a collection of cowboy humor and

tales. "The Devil in Texas", "Cowboys are Partly Human", and "Alkalii County Tales" have received wide acclaim throughout the Western ranch county.

His most recent effort is the

biography of Ace Reid, the creator of "Cowpokes" cartoons. This combination of two of the most popular humorists of our day resulted in a book that brings the comic genius of Ace Reid to life.

Erickson is a native of Perryton, Texas, and lives there with his wife, Kristine, and their three children, Scot, Ashley and Mark. He has spoken to groups all over the United States and Canada. He has lectured at the Library of Congress and is a member of the Texas Institute of Letters, the Philosophical Society of Texas, and a board member of the Western Writers of America.

Those who are found in violation of the City Code will be notified by U.S. Mail and will be given a sufficient length of time to correct their violation before any other action will be taken.

After this length of time, the City can fine the owner of the property up to \$1,000.00 for each days violations. However, the City's only intention is to cleanup each and every piece of property in town, not to fine the property owners unless the City has no other option.

RESOLUTION #1-86

HEREBY opposes such a disposal facility being located in this area and hereby request that the United States Rovernment and the State of Texas not allow any such disposal facility be constructed or operated in Hansford County, Texas.

Recently, we at the Police Department have taken note of a problem that have existed for sometime in front of the Elementary School. The problem is that many perents, when they are picking their children up after school, are blocking the entire width of the 400 block of Garrett Avenue. Sometimes for see long se 15 minutes.

The most serious espect of this practice is that it poses a significant danger to those children that must cross the street on their way home. With wehicles parked four abreast in the street, it forces these children to crisscress through the wehicles thus increasing the chance that one of these children may be struck by a vehicle. Along with this danger, there is also the oroblem that those parents that have picked up their children cannot leave because the street is blocked. In addition, there is also the fact that stopping, standing or parking a vehicle upon the main traveled portion of a readway is a wielation of Texas law.

In an effort to deal with this situation resecuably, I have met with the school efficials to come up with a way for parents to pick up their children without the mead for blocking traffic. Beginning Monday, February 10th the children is grades K-2 will be released from the Elementary Gymnasium at the corner of Fourth and Cooper Avenue. There is a large parking area at that corner which should make it easier for parents to pick up their children and leave. Grades 3 and 4 will be released from the front of the building as usual. This should leave ample parking space in front of the building without forcing anyone to park on the main traveled portion of the street. Those parents that have children in grades X-2 and also have children in grades 3 or 4 should direct their older children to come to the parking lot behind the Elementary Cymnasium after school. This will prevent you having to go to two separate locations to pick up your children.

In the future, those parants that choose to stop, stand or park their vehicles in front of the Elementary School on the main traveled portion of the readway will be issued a citation for the violation and required to appear in Municipal Court. It is in the interest of safety for all concerned that this action must be taken. Your cooperation in matter will make things easier on all concerned, and is greatly appreciated.

David Gilbert and Cory Rasor of Pack 550 of Gruver Cub Scouts presented the colors at the P.T.A: program Monday, February 3, 1986.

In recent months we have had an apparent increase in the number of unlicensed drivers in Gruver. A somewhat more serious aspect of this problem is that these drivers appear to be getting younger and younger, much too young to be given the tremendous responsibility of operating a motor vehicle upon the streets and highways.

The Police Department and the Municipal Court receives numerous complaints, and sharp criticism from citizens because the Citv is "letting people drive without driver's licenses." The fact is that the Citv is not letting anyone drive without a driver's license. We have not, however, been too diligent in taking steps to stop it until now.

In the interest of safety for all those that travel the streets and highways of the City, it has become necessary for the Police Department to discontinue "looking the other way" and stop the practice of unlicensed drivers operating vehicles upon the streets and highways within the City of Gruver.

I realize this may place a hardship on some people, but you must stop and realize the liability you place on yourselves when you allow these untrained, unlicensed drivers to drive. If it were not important for young people to receive formalized driver's training, the Legislature would not require people that apply for a license under the age of 18 to complete a driver's training course before they are licensed.

For those of you that have children 15 years of age or older that you feel must drive, you should contact the Department of Public Safety and check into applying for a hardship license. For those persons 18 years of age and older that currently do not have a license, should follow the procedures of the Department of Public Safety in obtaining a license as soon as possible.

In the future, those persons found to be onerating a motor vehicle upon a street or highway within the corporate limits of Gruver without having a driver's license will be stopped. Those persons 14 years of age and older will be issued a citation. The owner of the vehicle will be contacted to come and pick up their vehicle and furnish transportation for the driver. Those persons under 14 years of age will be detained until the owner of the vehicle or parent arrives to pick up the vehicle, at that time the owner or parent will be issued a citation for allowing an unlicensed operator to drive. Parents and others that continually allow unlicensed drivers to operate their vehicles within the city limits will run the risk of being charged in Municipal Court with allowing an unlicensed operator to drive. In the event that the owner or parent cannot be contacted, the vehicle will be impounded by the Police Department and placed in a secure place until the owner claims the vehicle, and the driver will be furnished transportation home. Those parents that feel an obligation to show their children how to drive should do so outside the city limits or run the risk of being stopped and charged with the offense.

To ensure compliance with the law, periodic checkpoints will be set up to check for driver's licenses, liability insurance, inspection and registration, those found in violation will be handled as previously stated.

It is, and has always been, the policy of this Police Department to enforce the law fairly and non-selectively. We strive to keep the public informed of policy changes that might affect them. It is with this in mind that we are giving you this warning to ensure your cooperation in keeping Gruver a safe place to live. We encourage you to cooperate with us in seeing that the law is obeyed in the best interest of all concerned.

TEXAS LAND COMMISSIONER GARRY MAURO OPENS PARMPOWER PHONE LINE

AUSTIN--Texas Land Commissioner Garry Mauro today unveiled a toll-free number, 1-800-292-FARM, that will provide information to those Texans interested in participating in the new Texas Farm and Ranch Finance Program that has been established to keep alive the Texas tradition of the family farm and the family ranch.

The Texas Farm and Ranch Finance Program, which was approved by Texas voters Nov. 5, will provide up to \$100,000 in low cost loans to qualified Texas farmers and ranchers for the purchase of 50 acres or

"The Farm and Ranch Finance Program will not solve all the problems facing those in Texas agriculture today," Mauro said. "But we hope that many producers who are wishing to purchase land will be able to use this new low interest loan program as a partial solution in making agriculture profitable again."

applicant to be a Texas resident for at least five years. Also, at least 35% of their gross household income in the previous three years must have come from a farm or ranch and the applicant's net worth must be less than \$250,000. Additional information about the program, which will begin making loans after September 1986, can be obtained by calling the toll free number, 1-800-292-FARM.

"The best part about this loan program is, like our Texas Veterans programs, it is entirely self-supporting without costing the Texas taxpayers a single penny," Mauro said. "Texas farmers and ranchers who obtain the loans -- not Texas taxpayers -- will repay all of the bonds and the expenses of the program."

Mauro also announced that he would be appointing a statewide steering committee to help set policy for the loan program. So far 61 Texans from a broad cross-section of the farm and ranching community and from the loan industry have agreed to serve with Mauro.

"The tradition and success of American agriculture owes much to the concept of private ownership," Mauro said. "A long term, low interest loan program like this will enable young farmers and ranchers to enter the business who otherwise might not be able to make the committment."





ORDER NO. 3

RULES GOVERNING TOXIC AND HAZARDOUS WASTE DISPOSAL

Notice is hereby given that the following Rules are to be effective within the limits of North Plains Ground Water Conservation District No. 2 ("The District") at 7:00 o'clock a.m. on March 1, 1986, and thereafter, in accordance with resolutions adopted by the Board of Directors of said District, to-wit:

PURPOSE

This Order and these Rules are promulgated and adopted in order to provide for the conservation, preservation, preservation, protection, and prevention of waste of the underground water reservoirs or their subdivisions consistent with the objectives of Article XVI, Section 59, of the Texas Constitution and as provided by the Legistature of the State of Texas in Chapter 52 of the Texas Water Code.

The Rules, Regulations and Procedures herein contained are intended to protect the underground water within the District from pollution or harmful alteration by deleterious matter admitted from another stratum or from the surface of the ground. These provisions are adopted in order to regulate activities which have a potential of causing pollution or harmful alteration of the Ogallala Aquifer, or other underground water bearing formations. The activities addressed are those that pose direct or indirect threats to quality of underground water. Nothing in these rules is intended to restrict, impede, or interfere with the powers of The District or its Board of Directors, or of any other governmental agency or official, state or federal, to prevent pollution or harmful alteration of underground water.

ORDER AND RULES: PUBLICATION, EFFECTIVE

The full text of this Order and these Rules shall be published once a week for two consecutive weeks in one or more newspapers within The District to give circulation within The District. This Order and all of the Rules set forth herein become effective at 7:00 o'clock a.m. on the 1st day of March, 1966, which effective date is more than 14 days after the dates of the first publication.

DEFINITIONS

1. "The District": North Plains Ground Water Conservation District No. 2, 702 East First Street, P. O. Box 795, Dumas, Texas, 79029, Area Code 806 935-6401 created in 1955 under the provisions of Chapter 52 of the Texas Water Code.

2. "Ground water" or "Underground water" means water percolating below the surface of the earth that is suitable for agriculture, gardening, domestic, or stock grazing purposes, including the Ogallala Aquifer, but does not include defined subterranean streams or the underflow of rivers.

3. "Underground water reservoir" means a specific subsurface water bearing reservoir having ascertainable boundaries and containing underground water that can be produced from a well at a rate of 25,000 gallons or more a day.

4. "Subdivision of an underground reservoir" means a reasonably definable part of an underground water reservoir in which the underground water supply will not be unreasonably affected by withdrawing water from any part of the reservoir, as indicated by known geological and hydrological conditions and relationships and on forseeable economic development at the time the subdivision is designated or altered.

5. "Waste" means pollution or harmful alteration of underground water in an underground water reservoir by salt water or other deleterious matter admitted from another startum or from the surface of the ground.

FINDINGS AND CONCLUSIONS
The Board of Directors of the
North Plains Ground Water District
No. 2 has heard and considered
evidence and information with
respect to the subject matter of this
Order and these Rules and has
made the following findings and
conclusions:

1. The North Plains Ground Water Conservation District No. 2 ("The District") consists of all or part of seven counties located in the Northern Texas Panhandle:

Hansford Moore
Hartley Ochiltree
Hutchinson Sherman
Lipscomb

2. Underground water exists unseen in reservoirs beneath the surface of the earth. Within The District it constitutes the only significant source of water to support human populations, food and fiber production. It is absolutely essential to the area's quality of life that adequate supplies of pollution-free underground water be ensured for the present and future generations.

3. The quality of undergorund water is threatened by various human activities. Throughout the United States many of the most prevalent sources of contamination are from disposal of industrial wastes. Prior to 1950 our underground water resources received very little attention; in earlier years it was thought that the natural filtering capacity of soils simply removed dangerous contaminants. Because most contamination is hidden underground, and because most contaminants require a long time to reach water wells, public awareness of the problem was limited. Until recently, the ground was actually thought to be the best place to get rid of waste.

4. While the extent of the threat to underground water nationally cannot be precisely determined, thousands of water wells have been abandoned throughout the United States. More than 200 organic and inorganic chemicals have been identified in various underground water aquifers.

5. Most underground water supplies in the United States are of good quality. The area in which The District is located is fortunate in that underground water contamination has not yet reached critical proportions. Vast areas of underground water remain largely unimpaired, although known instances of pollution do exist.

6. The importance of underground water to the national quality of life requires that every level of government aspire to the highest and best methods in preventing the contamination of underground water.

7. The unique nature and variability of underground water resources - geographical occurrence, physical and chemical properties, uses and sources of contamination - demands local control and regulation by persons most knowledgeable of the circumstances.

8. Once underground water aquifers are contaminated, remedial action is extremely costly in the best of circumstances and is not technically feasible in most circumstances. Clean-up can require many years and can cost millions and millions of dollars, and still may not completely solve the problem. Substantial efforts are now underway at various locations in the United States to address clean-up problems and to protect underground water users from the adverse effects of existing contamination.

9. The Texas State Legislature authorized the creation of Underground Water Conservation Districts to perform certain prescribed duties, powers and functions as set forth in Chapter 52 of the Texas Water Code, formerly Article 7880 - 3c, Texas Civil Statutes; generally, these are as follows:

(a) To formulate, promulgate, and enforce rules and regulations for the purpose of conserving, preserving, protecting and recharging the underground waters.

(b) To formulate, promulgate, and enforce rules and regulations to prevent waste.

(c) To require permits for the drilling, equipping and completion of wells capable of producing in excess of 25,000 gallons of water per day.

(d) To provide for the spacing of water wells, or to regulate the production of water wells, of both, so as to minimize as far as practicable the drawdown of the water table or to prevent waste.

(e) To require records to be kept and reports made of the drilling, equipping and completion of wells; and accurate drillers' logs to be kept and copies filed with The District and the State Water Development Board.

(f) To do whatever is practical and possible to recharge the underground water reservoir.

(g) To cause to be made surveys of the underground water reservoir as to the quality of the water, quantity of the water, use of the water, and recharge needed.

(h) To help develop and promote comprehensive plans for the most efficient use and the control and prevention of waste of underground water, to carry out research projects; to develop, collect, and preserve information regarding the underground water and the practicability of recharge of the underground reservoir; and to publish plans and information and bring them to the attention of the users of

the underground water.

(i) To enforce by injunction or other appropriate remedy in courts of competent jurisdiction the rules and regulations duly adopted and promulgated by The District.

10. By the enactment of the Underground Water Conservation Districts Law, now codified as Chapter 52 of the Texas Water Code, formerly Art. 7880-3c, Texas Civil Statutes, the Texas Legislature joined the Federal government and many states in committing the State of Texas to an imperative objective: to protect the physical, chemical and biological integrity of the underground water resources in Texas and ensure that they are not degraded in any way that may be harmful to humans or the enviroment.

11. The several Underground Water Conservation Districts created under the Texas statute, including The District, have as their goals, in common with similar state and Federal legislation, the following: to work with all agencies to promote, conduct, and support all feasible research in an attempt to find the most efficient use of the underground water, to keep District personnel available to help with any water problem within The District; to protect the underground water from contamination and waste; to be mindful of the future and to do everything possible to have available a supplemental supply of water when needed.

12. The foregoing objectives and goals are based on the following principles:

(a) Underground water must be actively managed if the resource is to continue to meet human and environmental needs.

(b) Degradation of the valuable underground water aquifers and critical water supply should be prevented because of the technical difficulties and economic costs involved in clean-up.

(c) Because of the wide variation across the state in the nature, vulnerability, and use of underground water, its protection, preservation and conservation can best be accomplished at the local level by local political subdivisions.

(d) Local political subdivisions often experience the underground water contamination problem most directly because they are closest to it; they must ensure that these supplies remain potable and should be prepared to take prompt action to prevent contamination.

13. By a confirmation election held throughout The District in I anuary of 1955, the citizens of The District made a long-term commitment to protect the physical, chemical, and biological integrity of the underground water resources within The District and ensure that they are not degraded in any way that may be harmful to humans or the environment. The citizens of The District thus determined that this local subdivision of the state could deal with and prevent underground water contamination within its boundaries. The Board of Directors of The District are charged with this responsibi-

14. Toxic and hazardous wastes, including radioactive wastes and polychlorinated biphenyls, constitute a threat to humans and the environment and are capable of percolating down into and entering the Ogallala Formation and other groundwater-bearing formations within The District. Upon such entry the underground water could become polluted and harmfully altered, unfit for human consumption or other beneficial use.

15. It is imperative to the protection of the underground water formations within The District and the well-being of its citizens who use such water as the sole source of drinking water, domestic water, commercial water, industrial water and agricultural water, that an Order and Rules be adopted by the Board of Directors of The District and thereafter enforced to prohibit disposal of toxic and hazardous wastes within The District and to prohibit facilities used for disposal of such wastes.

IT IS THEREFORE ORDERED:

RULE 1

(A) None of the following materials or substances may be imported from outside The District to a point within The District, nor moved within The District from point to point, for the purpose of temporarily or permanently disposing of such materials or substances within The District:

Radioactive wastes
 Toxic substances

(3) Hazardous substances
(4) Polychlorinated biphenyls
(5) Soil, fluids or other materials or substances contaminated with any of the above.

(B) Exclusions: The following are excluded from this Rule and Order: agricultural insecticides, herbicides and other agri-chemicals.

RULE 2

The following activities are prohibited:

(A) Construction, operation, maintenance or use of waste disposal wells for disposal of any of the materials or substances enumerated in Rule 1.

(B) Construction, operation, maintenance or use of tanks, reservoirs, pits, depressions, sites, land fills, or any other manner of storage of any of the materials or substances enumerated in Rule 1 on either a temporary or a permanent basis within The District.

RULE 3

(A) All persons, firms, corporations, associations of persons, or other entities having in their possession or under their care, custody or control within The District any of the materials or substances enumerated in Rule 1 as of the date on which this Order and these Rules become effective, whether for use, storage or disposal shall report by swom inventory to The District office in Dumas, Texas within 60 days of the effective date of this Order and Rule. The report shall include a description of the materials or substances possessed, amount, location, status and whether a plan or schedule has been formulated for the ultimate disposal of the materials or sub-

(B) Within 60 days after receipt of such report, the Board of Directors shall either approve the report or set the matter down for hearing according to the notice provisions and procedure outlined in Rule 4.

RULE 4

EXCEPTIONS

(A) These rules will be strictly enforced in their application; however, circumstances may arise that are materially different from those normally encountered in, or resulting from, any of the disposal operations or activities described or prohibited in Rules 1 and 2. A departure from Rules 1 or 2, in order to alleviate hardships when such circumstances would not constitute a threat of waste, pollution or harmful alteration of underground water within The District, may justify an exception to Rules 1 and 2.

(B) Procedure.

(1) Any person, firm, corporation, association of persons, or other entity desiring an exception to any of the provisions contained in Rule 1 or 2 of this Order shall file a written, sworn Application with The District office in Dumas, Texas stating:

a. The nature of the exception requested;
b. The justification for

c. Any information that the Applicant deems appropriate in support of the Application.

(2) Seven copies of any Application for an Exception under this Rule 4 shall be submitted to The District at its general office, North Plains Water District, 702 East First, P. O. Box 795, Dumas, Texas, 79028, Area Code 806 935-6401.

(3) All Applications for Exceptions shall be heard and considered by the Board of Directors meeting in regular or special session within 90 days after submittal. At least 30 days notice of the hearing shall be given to the Applicant, to known interested parties including all governmental agencies having potential concur-

rent jurisdiction, and notice shall also be given to the public by appropriate notice published in a newspaper in general circulation within The District at least 30 days before the date of the hearing.

(4) The board of Directors shall enter an Order granting or denying an Application for Exception, with such conditions as it shall deem proper, within 60 days after such hearing.

(5) Any hearing held under Rule 4 shall be open to the public.

(6) At the hearing the Applicant will be given the opportunity to present evidence with respect to the type of substance or materials for which an exception is sought, the quantity, location, description of the present facilities and environment of the materials or substances, and whether the substances or materials will alter or harm the underground water.

(7) The decision of the Board of Directors shall be based upon a preponderance of the evidence submitted at the hearing by the Applicant, by The District, or by other interested parties, state or federal agencies, or public officials.
