

Faculty Members Receive Academic Honors ily, Danny, Lonny, Dana sentation of a foreign lan-

Three Gruver School Faculty members, Bill Gilliland, John Masten, and Harold McCreary, have recently received word of scholastic honors in their chosen fields.

Mr. Gilliland, who is a math instructor at the Gruver Junior High School, was among 40 junior high school mathematics instructors accepted from 800 applicants, to attend a National Science Foundation summer institute at Southwestern Oklahoma State College.

The eight-weeks intensified program opens June 7 and closes July 30 under the direction of Dr. Earl A. Reynolds, chairman of the Southwestern State division of Mathematics and Physical Sciences.

Emphasis will be on the SMGS modern mathematics program and techniques, a field in which the Oklahoma college has been one of the pioneering institute. The college is located in Weatherford, Oklahma.

Gilliland graduated from South Western State College and was awarded a Bachelor of Science Education degree with majors in Industrial Education and Business Education.

Gilliland has taught for seven and a half years, the last vear of which was at Gruver where he taught seventh and eighth grade mathematics and was the football and track coach. Prior to this he taught at the Wetumka Public schools. The Gillilands and fam-

Mr. Masten, who teaches Spanish and English at Gruver High School, has been selected to participate in St. awrence University's fifth Summer Institute for Secondary School Teachers of French and Spanish, sponsored by the United States Office of Education und the Language Development Program of the National Defense Education Act. The institute, which will be in session from June 30 to August 18, 1965, is one of approximately 90 similar language institutes here and abroad. This summer some 5,000 language teachers will participate in the intensive training programs which these insti-

tutes offer. The St. Lawrence University Institute has been established as a center for retraining qualified teachers of French and Spanish in both the practical aspects of the language and in the new methods of foreign language teaching. The participants will devote five to six hours daily to formal class study, will live in a Language House, and will dine together at language tables in a separate dining facility.

The audio-lingual pre-

guage to beginning students is one of the most striking developments in language teaching during the past decade. At the St. Lawrence Institute strong emphasis will be placed upon this new approach. The teacherparticipants will observe expert teachers as they use this new method in in two demonstration classes, each made up of 15 high school students, one class in French and one in Spanish. The participants will be made familiar with

the language laboratory, and will return to their teaching with deeper insight into the wide possibilities of the new method, together with greatly in. creased ability in the auraloral skills. A course in civilization will help to broaden their appreciation of the cultures of France, Spain, and the Latin American countries. Mr. Masten was one of

more than 400 teachers who applied for admission to the St. Lawrence Institute. Of this number, 60 have been selected as participants-30 in French and 30 in Spanish. The majority are from New York Sate and surrounding areas, but teachers from many other parts of the country will be included in the group.

Mr. Masten is completing his second year at Gruver High School having come here from Hartley where he taught one year. He received his education

at West Texas State University and Texas Tech where he received his Bachelor of Arts degree in Spanish with a minor in English and German.

From there they proceeded to an Amarillo City Park where they had fun and a food break before proceeding to the Historical Museum at Canyon.




Between the Bookends







"I am young enough to long for happiness, and old enough to know that it tarries longest with us when we seek it east.


