



The Water Tap

The corrosion and plugging of irrigation wells by algae, as well as several micro-organizsms, is growing menace to North Plains Irrigation Farmers.

According to a study conducted by Dr. William D. Miller, Dept. of Geosciences Texas Technological College, Lubbock, Texas several types of micro-organisms were isolated in irrigation wells on the High Plains. It is Dr. Miller's opinion that the North Plains are polluted worse than the South Plains.

The predominate organisms found in the water are also present in the soil, which suggests that wells on the High Plains are not properly cemented at the surface to prevent infiltration of soil organisms into the bore hole. This is no doubt the principal source of pollution.

Several other factors suggested from the preliminary biological study areas fol-

(1) The high incidence of algae in samples demonstrates that the practice of dispersing clays with wetting agents and detergents which contain polyphosphates is conducive to algae growth. Phosphorous is an important food source of

(2) The effectiveness of some chemicals used as biocides in treatment of wells in the High Plains maybe questioned.

Wells which have dropped in production over a relatively short period of time should be investigated. This in vestigation should be made by a qualified person or firm which is familiar with the problem at hand.

There has been a number of wells treated in recent months in our area. The response on some of these wells have been significant.






