GRUVER TOPS DARROUZETT

The Greyhounds traveled to Darrouzett last Friday night for a non-conference game with the Longhorns. A pair of wins were brought back as the Gruver boys downed Darrouzett 89-62 while the Gruver girls won 57-42.

For the boys Sam Tipton netted 26 points, followed by Mack Hoel with 22 and Billie Lieb with 19. The Greyhounds held their

lead after the first quarter. As the first period ended Gruver trailed 16-19. But soon after the second period was underway the Greyhounds closed the gap and the half-time score stood 36-30. Continuing to increase their lead Gruver closed the third period with a 60-48 lead.

The girls led by Anita States who netted 36 points held their lead after the first three minutes of the

game and closed the first quarter with the score standing 13-9. They continued through the second quarter and maintained a seven point lead 28-21 at half time.

Gaining a thirteen point lead, Gruver closed the third period 45-32. They added two points to their lead and closed the game with a fifteen point margin over the Darrouzett team.

There are three positions open at this time.

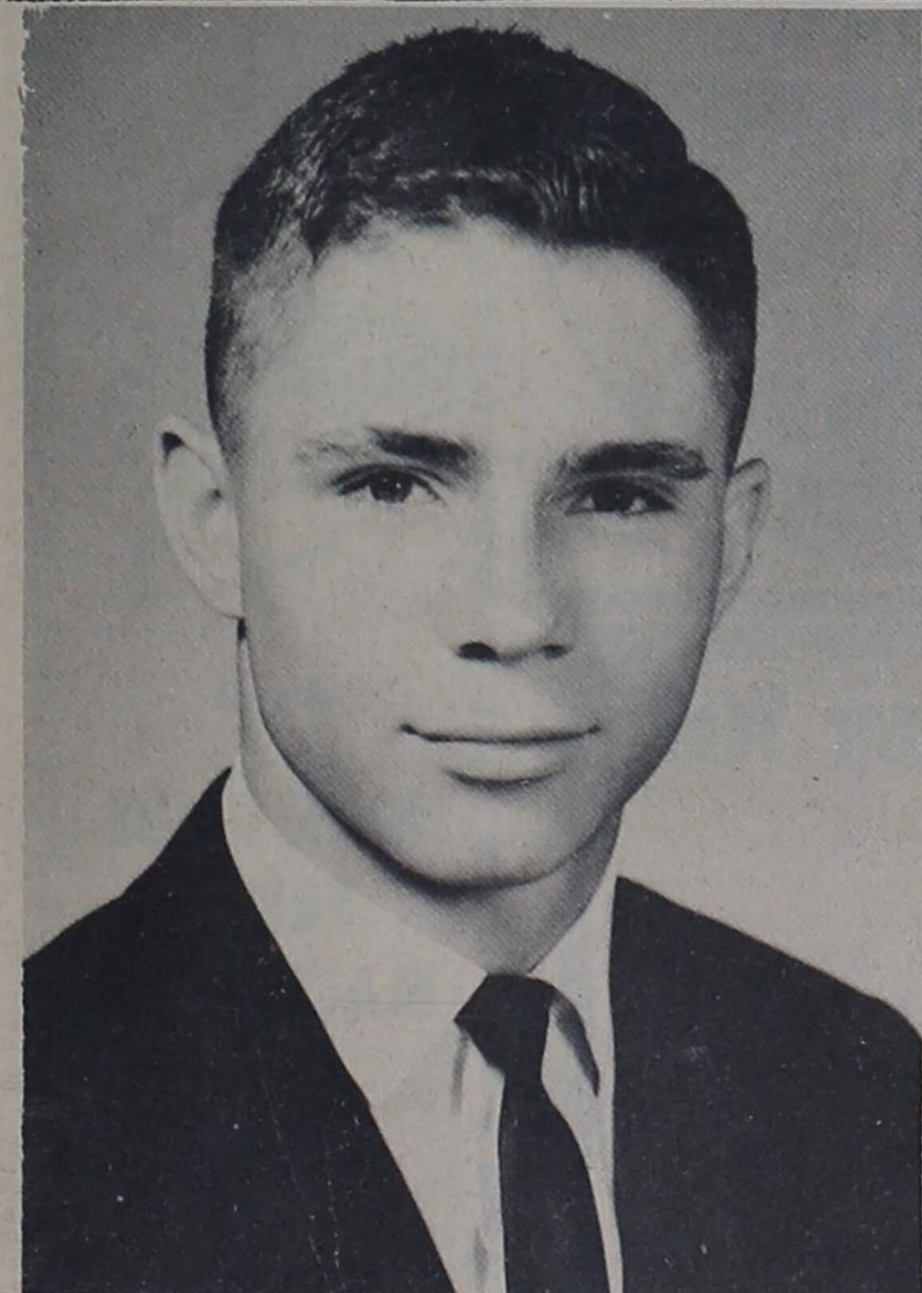
Bake Sale Slated

GRUVER SPLITS WITH SUNRAY

The Gruver Boys tromped Sunray Tuesday night 66-24 while the girls fell to the Sunray girls 44-46.

The Gruver boys jumped to a quick lead and held the Bobcats to only four points during the first quarter while Gruver mounted up 14 points. The Gruver boys continued to mount up their score as the quarters progressed and at half time Gruver led 36-11. The third quarter ended 56-15.

Billie Lieb netted 17

points for Gruver while Sam Tipton scored 12 points followed by Ronny Laxson and Royce Mathews with nice points apiece.

The girls faced troubles as the first quarter was underway as Sunray jumped to a five point lead as the first quarter closed 12-7. The second period offered the same results as Sunray mounted up a ten point lead for half time, 26-16.

Gruver found themselves

pulling to a closer lead as the third quarter closed with Sunray again leading 37-30. Sunray began the fourth quarter with five points before Gruver began to score. Anita netted two free shots as Judy Bayless hit two field goals followed by two field goals by Jan Roper. The lead narrowed to two points 42-40 for the Sunray team. Sunray made two free shots but Jan Roper again netted a field goal to narrow the lead again. Two more

free shots by Sunray gave them a four point lead but Anita States closed the game with her two free shots to give Sunray only a two point margin for their win.

Notes Of Interest

It was a wonderful moisture filled snow which fell Monday morning. The amounts ranged upwards to three inches and brought the area some one-quarter of an inch of moisture. The snow melted off by evening to a great extent and no blowing or drifting accompanied the storm. The wheat has a new look with the natural moisture falling.

Aside from a quick storm which blew through Saturday a week ago this has been the only moisture recorded this year for Hansford County. The quick flurry of two weeks ago left the roads full and the fields bare and actually amounted to a mess.

Noted only a few days ago the report from the North Plains Water Conservation District telling of the irrigation wells drilled on the North Plains. Hansford County is still leading and is the only county to top the 600 mark in wells drilled. Hansford County now has 657 wells drilled. During the past year the farmers took out some 271 permits and completed 202 wells which also lead the district.

Our neighboring county to the west is reaching toward the 600 mark as they have drilled 592 wells and had 204 permits issued with 172 wells drilled during the past year.

Sherman County follows next with 589 wells drilled and have completed 186 of the 187 permits issued.

Hutchinson County follows next in line with 211 wells drilled with 53 completions last year. There were only 49 permits issued during the past year.

In the western part of the Water District Hartley County stands with 197 wells drilled and only six of them completed last year though some 105 permits were issued.

At the bottom of the list stands Ochiltree County who has 190 wells and 82 of these were drilled this past year. There were some 108 permits issued during the past year in Ochiltree County.

Basketball season is coming to an end. Gruver will have their last regular season district game with Claude Friday night. The Greyhounds have had a good year behind the coaching of Wayne Tipton.

Gruver can be so proud of its teams, coaches and spectators for their outstanding show of sportsmanship throughout the season. With good sportsmanship behind our boys and girls on the teams it gives way to a good season whether winning or losing. Our teams have fared quite well on the winning slate for the season.

The Gruver Boys stand a good chance to be tied with Panhandle for the Double-Round Robin portion of district. If the Gruver boys win their game Friday night with Claude and Panhandle beats Stratford there will have to be a play-off between the two schools. A winner must be determined before the teams enter the district tournament.

The Double Round Robin counts 50% toward the district championship as does the District Tournament also count 50%. Therefore, the winner of the Round Robin must also be a winner of the District Tournament or a play-off must also play and after the tournament is completed.

Gruver will host the District Tournament this year. The Tourney will begin February 16 and will also be played on the nights of the 18 and 19. Admission for the tournament has been set at \$1 per session for adults and 50¢ for students per session.

Tuesday night two games will be played for the girls and boys who rank in third and fifth position in the district. The Tuesday night session will begin at 7:00 p.m.

Thursdays session will open at 2:00 p.m. with the girls in second position along with the winner of the Tuesday night game. Following in the Thursday afternoon session will be the boys in second position playing the winner of the boys in third and fifth positions.

For the Thursday night session the games will be the boys and girls in first and fourth positions beginning at 7:30 p.m. The final session of the tournament will come Friday February 19th as the finals will be played.

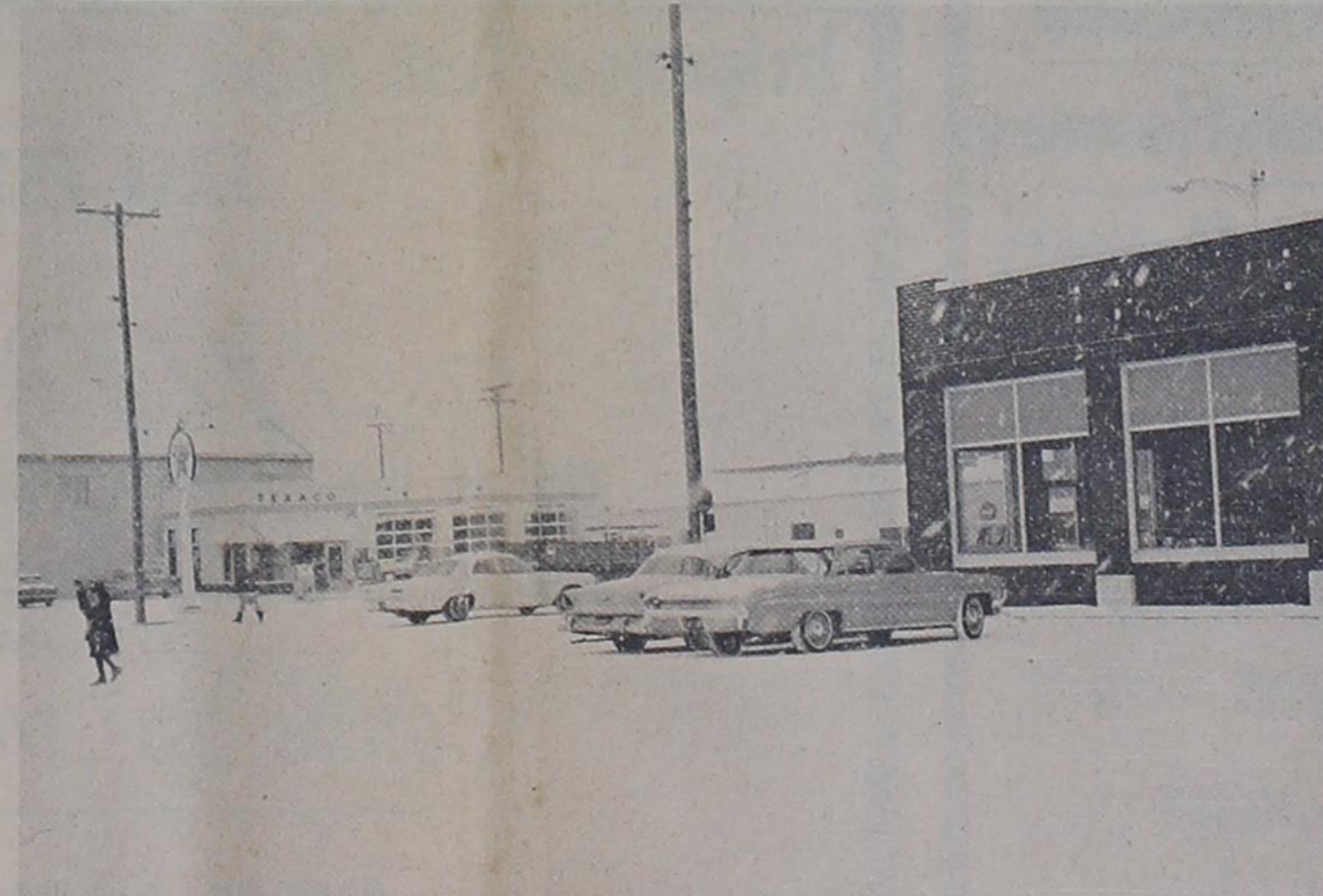
TROGDON TO SPEAK TUESDAY

Rodent Control Demonstration

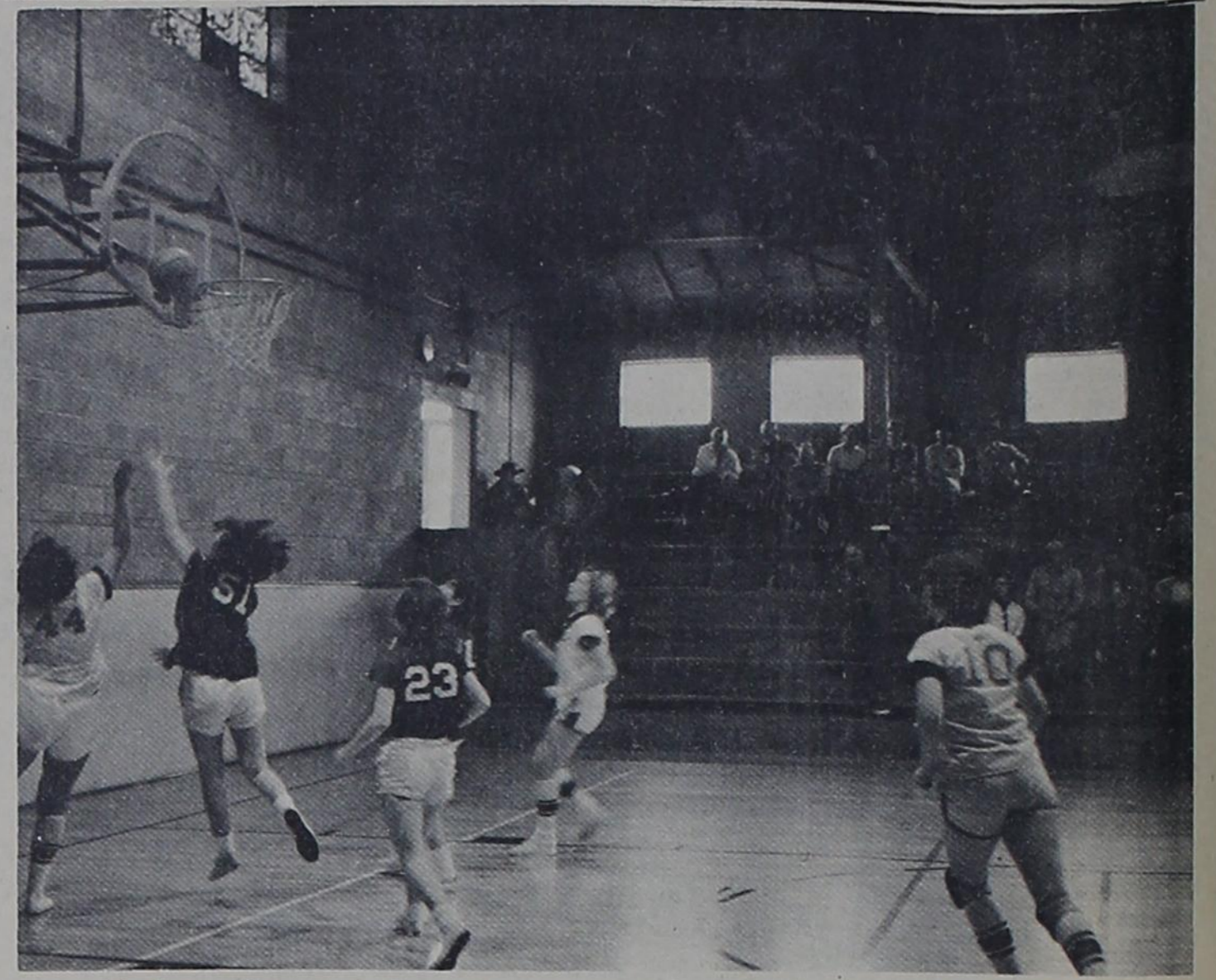
