

PAST TO THE PRESENT HIGHLIGHTS FROM THE

Highlights from the Past to the Present visits to the north of Gruver this week as the family in the spotlight for the feature story is the J.W. Roper family. This is another of the pioneer families who moved to county when the country was made up of rolling praries to make their home.

This week the story begins in the state of Georgia where Mr. J.W. Roper was born to the S.D. Roper Family in Dawson County Georgia, in 1861. Mr. Roper grew up to be a young man in the state of Georgia.

During his late twenties Mr. Roper came to Fort Worth, Texas where he found work. His aunt and uncle made their home in Texas and were an influence to his coming.

Mr. Roper had not been in Texas long when he returned to Georgia to marry Elizabeth Tatum. Elizabeth Tatum was born in 1864 in Dawson County Georgia also.

The couple moved back to Texas by train where they their home on a farm at Pleasant Point, Texas near the town of Cleburne just south of Fort Worth. The main crops of the family farming were cotton and corn. Two children were born to the couple while they made their home in Pleasant Point, they were two daughters, Pearl and Myrtle.

Yearning for new land and better farming the couple and their two children moved to the southwestern part of what is now Oklahoma to Greer County, in 1889. Greer county at that time was still a part of Texas for the border had not been moved to the Red River as of that time. Here the family homesteaded on a quarter-section of which they later added to by buying an adjoining quarter. As the land turned into Oklahoma territory, their home county changed to Harmon Coun-

ty. They did not move, the county only changed names. During their stay in Oklahoma their farm wasbetween Eldorado and Hollis Oklahoma. Their farm was on a road which freighters used between the two towns. The family recalls a wagon train which was moving one family to Texas near Wheeler, which stopped by the Roper home. The train was made up of fourteen wagons of which neighbors were helping the family move. A blizzard forced the family and their neighbors to stay at the Roper home where they remained for two weeks.

Four other children were born to the couple while they lived in Oklahoma. They were Tommy, Henry, Emory and Rita. In 1908 the family suffered a great loss with the death of their mother, Mrs. J.W. Roper.

In 1815 Mr. J.W. Roper traded his land in Oklahoma with Mr. Robinson for a farm ten miles to the north of Gruver. The farm was the former McBride place. The family's belongings were shipped by immigrant car to Dalhart and on to Texhoma, from Childrens. The children came by passenger car and their father came in the immigrant car with their belongings. Their move was made in the early spring of 1915.

Upon arrival in Texhoma they removed their belongings and esembled their wagon, hitching their horses to wagon preparing theirselves for their journey overlandto their new home in Hansford County. Upon arrival they found a house on an improved plot of ground. Being improved land the farm already had a well with bams built and drilled.

Moving too late to plant grain they harvested a crop of 100 acres of volunteer wheat which averaged six bushels to the acre to begin their farming career in the county. Their main crop was wheat but row crop was also planted and harvested. Out of their three quarter section only a two hundred acre plot was brockn.

Mr. B.F. Wallin and Mr. Roper bought a header together at Texhoma which they used to harvest their-crops. The Ropers used only horse drawn implements in their farm work at the beginning.

In the winter they would freight their wheat to Texhoma where they received a better price. The trip would take a day to Texhoma and a day home by a horsedrawn freight wagon.

During one of their trips to Texhoma they were caught in town by a blizzard. The storm was so hazzardous that they had to remain there for two weeks. Rita the youngest child remained at home by herself during the two week period with the neighbors close by

The children began their schooling at the Bethel country school in Oklahoma. Rita went to school atthe McBride school after moving to Hansford County. Other children who went along too were the Hemphills, Brandiviks, Jones', and Brooks children. After her school at McBride, Rita continued her education at Canyon where she received her teaching certificate She then came back to Hansford County to teach at the McBride school.

Tommy Roper recalls one time when Frank Wallin and he freighted wheat by wagons for Mr. Wilson their neighbor. They would go to Texhoma and spentl the night before returning. He recalls their attending a silent movie in Texhoma for only ten cents and recalls their breakfast which included coffee and all the hot cakes one could eat for only fifteen cents. They would stay in the wagon yard and sleep in the bedding they had brought along.

The family were Methodists and Mr. Roper and the children would attend church at the Grand Plains School where a pastor from Old Hansford would come to hold services every week. Aside from the families church activities and the literary societies which were held at the school there was very little entertainment. Emory played base ball with a team from their area.

The family struggled through the good and lean years making their way. Tommy served in the First World War overseas. In 1943 Mr. J.W. Roper passed away after a long illness.

The oldest daughter Myrtle Roper passed away in 1911. Pearl, Mrs. Turner had one daughter Ethel Eubanks. Pearl passed away in 1909.

Tommy Roper married Edith Bratton and the couple had two children Don Roper and Maxine Ferguson. Tommy and his wife made their home in Gruver where he is employed by the city.

Henry married Bea Lytle and the couple made their home on the home place. Five children were born to this couple; Irene, Harlin, Emory D., Florene and Harlene. Mr. and Mrs. Henry Roper now make their home in Gruver.

Emory married Zona Smith and they make their home in Dalhart. This couple has one daughter Betty June Smith.

Rita the youngest daughter married Harmon Lowe who passed away sevdral years ago. She is now Mrs. H.W. Gibbs and the couple make their home in Stratford in the summer and in the valley of Texas in the winter.

This is another of the interesting stories of the Hansford County Pioneers. The Ropers came to the county to find their desire and have become farmers to help build the farming empire of Hansford County as





The weather remains hot and no measurable amounts of moisture have been received.


A small thunder shower rolled over Gruver on Tuesday leaving only a trace




The Gruver School Football Stadium has been completed and is another addition to the School Plant which will be in use for the 1963 Season.




Pictured above is a side view of the Athletic Field Building.

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



PLAN WHEAT

FERTILIZATION EARLY

It is now time to consider plans for fertilizing wheat to be planted this fall. Because Hansford County soils vary in their ability to supply plant nutrients the most logical starting point for determining fertilizer needs in the soil test. My office can supply information on how to collect and mail samples. By sampling early the report will be received in plenty of time for making the final decision as to what kind and how much fertilizer to apply.

Nitrogen is the fertilizer element likely to be in shortest supply. Organic matter as measured by soil tests is one of the guides for determining how much nitrogen will be needed. However, factors such as amount and stage of decomposition of previous crop residue, physical condition of the soil, ability to irrigate adequately, and intended grazing practices will all influence the nitrogen need of the crop.

When wheat is to be grazed it is to be grazed apply allor part of the nitrogen preplant. Adequately fertilized wheat forage can contain 20 percent protein or 3 percent nitrogen on a dry

basis. Phosphorus does not move appreciably with soil moisture so it must be placed in the soil where it will be within reach of the permonent roots for effectent use.

Do you believe that the place where the Lord's people assemble is a hallowed place, a sacred edifice where God constantly dwells and where you go to meet God? A building to be reverenced as sacred?

Jesus answers this question in speaking to the woman at the well in Samaria. He said, "But the hour cometh, and how is, when the true wo rshippers shall worship the Father in spirit and in truth; for the Father seeketh such to worship him' (Jno. 4:23). The woman had wanted to know if she was right in worshipping in this mountain or whether the Jews right in worshipping at Jerusalem? Jesus said, "Woman, believe men, the hour

cometh when ye shall neither in this mountain, nor yet at Jenisalem, worship the Father" (Jno. 4:21). He affirmed that while the Law of Moses was binding, Jerusalem was the place where God's people worshipped, but soon the place would be immaterial.

Today, under law to Christ, we worship without restriction as to the place. Jesus said, "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (Matt. 18:20). Wherever His saints meet to worship, whether i na building or under a tree, He is there.


The young farmers and rural youth attending the sessions also had an opportunity to aim questions at John A. Baker, the nation's Assistant Secretary of Agruculture.




