Thank you for all the time and hard work you have so gladly given to Alpha Mu Psi and the Gruver community.


After the meal, Glenna Hunt conducted the business meeting. Ginny Grotegut gave a delightsister-in-law, Angela Grotegut.

Is English actually the richest nguage in the world? Could it be id that it is clearly on top? Many Il probably argue and disagree roughout the ages, but they will suredly be on an uphill track ainst the facts.

English is composed of well er 750,000 words. Who can say the final amount when all the prefixes, suffixes and compound words are added? Use a hyphen, possessives and the outcome is pushed even further toward the endless. French, Latin, Spanish... they have all come together to compose what many, myself included, would call the finest language known. Where else does one have the opportunity to make such choices? Does the character look? see? stare? watch? The list doesn't stop, it goes on and on! Think of the privilege one has, the monumental chance we're given to work and conform, not with our hands, but with our mind and lips, the most beautiful and eloquent thoughts that our imagination can

create to be placed upon paper. . Just stop for a moment out of your hurried schedules, and your busy workdays to think of some of the beauty of the things which have been written.

Think of the great men who have reached into the depths of the English language to borrow the words for a time People like Shakespeare, Henry Longfellow, Elizabeth Barrett Browning, Mark

Twaine, Emily Bronte, Thoreau. They could be listed name to name and encircle the world time

and time again. But these are the ones who are given the most difficult task one could be assigned. Their essignment: to please. As in the case of the blacksmith of New York City in the early 1830's, who spoke out against the slave trade. He spoke of the Constitution, the laws, and more importantly, his own personal feelings. The trade was looked down upon severly after that, and anyone who chose to have slaves in that area was much maligned. Thus, in a time later to be completed, for in a small way, the Union had been born! And it all began from a blacksmith who all thought could not even read the size number on his boots! Do you see, a language which

the time of their deagnosis returned to full-time work after being treated for their disease.

Moreover, more than 60 percent reported that their employers made special arrangements to make it easier for the patients to return to work. Some of the accommodations noted inncluded reduced hours and time off for medical appointments.

But patients who looked for a job after undergoing treatment reported a different story: almost half said that they had had problems finding work because of potential employers' attitudes towards them and their disease.

In addition, 21 percent of all the respondents reported difficulties in abtaining medical insurance, and almost 20 percent felt they had had other isurance problems since their cancer was diagnosed.

'These results indicate that we still have a job to do in providing employers and the insurance industry with the facts about cancer,' said Robert O. Kerr, M.D. of Austin, President of the ACS Texas Division.

"The fact is, almost half of the people diagnosed with cancer today are going to survive," Kerr said, "and there's no reason they shouldn't return to work if they want to and lead full and productive lives."

The ACS Texas Division's Employability/Insurability Task Force initiated the survey, mailing questionnaires to 15,000 Texans with cancer who had received services from the American Cancer Society in the past 18 months. Former Division Chairman of the Board D.P. McClure of Corpus Christi chairs the task force.

"We congratulate Texas employees who choose to work during and after their illness," McClure said. "One of our goals is to encourage other employers to follow their example."

The informal survey, the first statewide patient survey undertaken by the ACS, asked patients to identify isurance and job problems they had experienced. Responses were received from 2,116 cancer patients from across the

"Although the response rate is too low for the results to be considered applicable to the majority of our Texas cancer patients, the survey has helped up pinpoint concerns that our task force can address," McClure said.

As a first step, the task force will develop a consumer's guide to selecting insurance, outlining insurance options available to patients who have cancer and offering healthy consumers tips on what to look for when selecting a health insurance policy. The guide should be available this fall.

The task force also is working on 'provider list' of compaines that will insure Texans with a history of cancer. In addition, the task force is considering ways to reach insurance underwriters and large employers with the message that cancer patients are not necessarily uninsurable and unemployable.

Of the patients responding to the survey, 47.2 percent were employed full-time when they were diagnosed. Retirees represented 24 percent of the sample; 15.6 percent were unemployed and 9.2 percent were part-time employees.

Almost 50 percent of the respondents, 49.6 percent, said they returned to work after tratment. Of those who were employed at the time of their diagnosis, only 9.4 percent did not return to work. The overwhelming majority - 87.6 percent - of those returning to employment returned to full-time jobs.

Slightly less than 12 percent of the respondents reported looking for work after their treatment. Of the 11.6 percent who had sought employment after their cancer diag-

Patients with a longer history of cancer reported more difficulties in obtaining medical insurance. Of the 21 percent who reported problems, only 12.9 percent of those diagnosed in the last year reported difficculties. Of those diagnosed five-to-ten years ago, 32.7 percent reported problems; 32.3 percent c those diagnosed more than 10 years ago reported some difficulties in

Our very first Shelter resident was a client from Lipscomb County. Everyone is responding warmly to the delightful lady who is our Shelter manager. Furthermore, she brings a good deal of experience and knowledge to our aid, and is a valuable addition to our staff and to our image.

Something else exciting is this: Remember that one of our goals is to include men in our services? Well, it's happening! Furthermore, it is even-happening on the preventive level: a man who felt himself capable of becoming a battereer is seeking help in finding other ways of dealing with his frustrations and angers. There definitely are ways of doing this. Just reading about them may be of some help. But placing uourself in a situation where you can prectise these ways without danger of harming anyone is ideal for changing a dangerous thought-or action-pattern into a harmlessly releasing pattern. Furthermore, it can even be fun! (Indicentally, this is also true of angers and frustrations that simply eat you up without your harming another

person.)

Sexual Assault Awareness Week is May 4-10. During this time we want to promote public awareness of the problems of sexual assault. One of the first things to do is to destroy the myth that sexual assault is a crime of sexual frustration. It is no such thing. It is an expression of anger, of a desire to power, to dominate and to control. Many rapists have ample sexual outlets - a wife or a lover. Their urge to vent rage or to dominate and control is the motivating factor. This applies not only to the stranger-rapist, but also to the "date-raper," or even to a husband. The husband wants to dominate his wife. We have already begun to realize that the stranger-rapist wants to vent his rage or to prove his own power. The husband-rapist and the daterapist fall into this same category. These two violaters refuse to accept the woman's limts and intrudes with touches she does not want. Sometimes the date-rapits spreads his itnrusions over several dates before he finally has his victim in an isolated position. Then he pushes his intrusions to the ultimate. A man who doesn't listen to, or chooses to ignore the limits his date wishes to set is signalling that the wishes of his date are not important to him. This is a true danger sign. If he gets angry, this may be a man who cannot bear to allow a woman to cross him in any way. Some men get their "kicks" from rousing fear in a woman. We call this man a "power-tripper." Sexual harrassment on the job is a good example of this. Women and girls must be alert to the signals



not to say a violent one. And do you know something else? A woman who has experienced sexual molestation or rape. especially by someone she has trusted, could pay a penalty by becoming frigid. If this happens, or has happened to you, please get in touch with the Panhandle Crisis Center for help in overcoming the ill effect. Remember. paying peed to the signals could prevent your ever becoming a

With tornado season upon us again, it is important that we refresh our memories about the types of marning the City of Gruver uses during an emergency and the correct action that should be taken when warning is given.

Every tornado is a potential killer and is capable of great destruction. Tornadoes can topple buildings, roll mobile homes, uproot trees, hurl people and animals through the air for hundreds of yards, and fill the air with lethal, windborne debris. Sticks, glass, roofing material, lawn furniture all become deadly missiles when driven by a tornado's winds. Since a large number of these tornadoes strike suddenly and with little or no warning, knowing what to do before and during a tornado could save your life.

During severe weather, the City uses two primary sources of information in determining a need to issue a warning. First, the National Weather Service in Amarillo provides First, the National Weather Service in Amerillo provides the City with information on watches, warnings and tornado activity. They track storm movements by reder and often times are able to determine a storms ability to form a tornado well before one is formed. Secondly, the City relys on police, fire, sheriff's units, and volunteer weather matchers to monitor a storms activity in this county. These people get out in the storm and monitor its movements, and observe clouds which exhibits potential for developing a tornado. Many times these people are able to spot a tornado well before it is detected on reder. This can provide the City with a great deal of time to issue a warning and allow the public a little more time to seek a place of safety. a place of safety.

If a tornado is sighted which is a potential threat to this community, the City will activate the outdoor warning siren located at City Hall. When activated this siren will give a continuous blast lasting approximately three (3) minutes.

Another form of warning used by the City is the Cable TV Marning System. With this system the City can interrupt regular programming and provide necessary information over cable television. During the course of a severe thunderstorm the City will keep the public informed by means of this system and provide emergency messages in the event a warning becomes necessary.

In the event of a power failure the City will utilize warning lights and sirens on the City's emergency vehicles to provide warning to the public. During threatening weather, City emergency vehicles will use their emergency lights and sirens for warning purposes only. If, during a severe thunderstorm, you observe a police car, amubiance, or fire truck driving down your street with red lights and sirens on, PAY ATTENTION! This may be the only warning you receive of an approaching tornado.

Keep your FN radio tuned to KRDF-FN 96 in Spearman during severe weather. The City will provide IGRDF with emergency information concerning the Gruver area during warning situations.

When the danger has passed the City will give one short blast on the outdoor siren at City Hall. This will be the signal that all is clear. The City will also utilize cable TY for this purpose. In the event of power failure, amergency vehicles will be utilized for this purpose.

MHAT TO DO DURING A TORNADO:

Take cover immediately when a tornado warning is issued. A tornado warning means that a tornado has been detected in or near the community.

\*Do not attempt to flee from the path of the tornado in a car or other vehicle. Over half of the deaths recorded in the Wichita Falls tornado in 1979 were attributed to people trying to escape in motor vehicles.

\*Abandon cars or mobile homes and seek shelter elsewhere. Automobiles and mobile homes afford the least safety during a tornado. If you are in a car when a tornado approaches, get out and head for the nearest ditch or depression if there is no better shelter immediately available.

"If you are at home or at work, stay inside, away from windows and exterior walls, until the storm is over. The safest place in a home during a tornado is in the basement. If there is no basement, take shalter in a bathroom, a closet or under a heavy piece of furniture on the lowest level. Small tooms, such as closets or bathrooms, in the center of a home or building offer the greatest protection from flying objects. Such rooms are also least likely to experience roof collapse. Do not waste time opening windows or doors in an attempt to lessen the likelyhood of damage from changes in atmospheric pressure. This theory is no longer considered valid. Tornadoes do their destructive work through the combined action of their strong rotary winds and the impact of windborne debris. In the most simple case, the tornado's push the windward wall of a building inward, the roof is lifted up and the other walls fall outward. You may waste valuable time opening windows and get caught may waste valuable time opening windows and get caught

\*If a tornado strikes during school hours, teachers should keep children away from windows and seek shelter either in a designated area or in interior hallways. Concerned parents should not attempt to go out in the storm to pick up their children at school.

There is very little one can do about the property damage caused by tornadoes, but with early warning and proper action lives can be saved!

What can you do to protect yourself before a tornado? First of all plan in advance what action you and your family will take in the event a warning is issued and make certain that everyone in your family is familiar with this plan. Know in advance where designated shelters are in the City or make plans with neighbors to use their cellar or basement. The City of Gruver currently utilizes the basement of the City Library located at 504 King and the basement of the Golden Age Center located at 105 East Broadway for public shelter. Secondly, keep a battery operated radio, flashlight and a supply of fresh batteries in a convenient place.

### Letter to the editor

### State needs leader

DEAR EDITOR

Since the election of Gov. Mark White - or is it Gov. H. Ross Perot - there has been constant upheaval in the educational system in Texas. For the taxpayers of Texas who are not familiar with H. Ross Perot, he is a billionaire political conservative from Dallas whom Gov. White retained to be the dictator of the educational reform bill of Texas: House Bill 72. When White retained Perot, he allowed this man to dictate the way education in Texas should be handled, that is in a big business manner. He failed to listen to educational professionals and reduced the power of the local districts who had no voice in the reform measures, but who will be held responsible for financing those re-

Let's take a critical look at facts and figures which have evolved as a result of this educational reform which are affecting each of us as taxpayers:

1. Career ladder — This is a system of merit pay intended for teachers who perform well in the classroom, and which has effectively destroyed the morale of the educators of the state. This, when fully implemented will cost \$300 million a year, with the state paying only \$100 million and local taxpayers paying the \$200 million balance.

2. Cost of competency test — This test given to teachers March 10 to prove competency, cost \$4.7 million to develop, score and administer; an additional \$21 million was dispensed to pay salaries of 210,000 teachers who were taken out of the classroom away from student instruction to take the test. Furthermore, the publisher of the test demanded \$2 million in escrow to protect himself if sued. Another \$1.3 million will be needed to administer the retake test to those who failed on March 10. The retake test is scheduled June 28. The total cost of the testing was \$29 million of taxpayers' money.

3. Subject area test — This test is to cover 60 different subject areas and is projected to cost an additional \$27 million. Taxpayers can add \$21 million more for salaries of teachers who again will be taken away from student instruction for the day of the test. Here again, our tax dollars will be footing the bill.

4. Teacher unemployment — The state has projected 10,000 teachers will fail the test and be without jobs. Who picks up the tab for teacher unemployment? Taxpay-

5. New accountability system — This deals with teacher documentation of all learning taking place in the classroom; this system is a detriment to the enrichment of individual student learning in that teachers are required to handle more and

more paperwork, thus taking away valuable and necessary preparation and instruction time. Each student is an individual, and teachers must help maintain that individuality; students are people; they do not do all things in synchronization and this includes learning.

6. New appraisal system — This statemandated reform deals with teacher evaluation, and is to be implemented in the 1986-87 school year. Though the state mandated this system, local districts are held responsible for funding.

7. No-Pass, No-Play rule — This section states that students are not allowed to participate for six weeks in extracurricular activities if not passing all classes. This is not a positive reinforcement to the student; it is negative reinforcement. Six weeks taken away from any sport is almost the complete duration of any one season.

Taxpayers, it is our children and their futures which are in danger. The solution to the problems caused by the educational reform, House Bill 72, is to find new leaders who will listen, really listen, to the voices of those of us who speak for the children of this state.


