Beginning Monday, October 27, the Hansford County Sheriff's Office implemented a crime watch program. The program is a two fold operation. The first being crime watch and prevention, with part two being operation identification. The crime watch will consist of marking property with signs and stickers. Highways and rural roads will have signs posted stating that the county is a participant in the program. Operation identification consist of marking your valuable property with the letters TX, followed by your drivers license number. Should your property be taken it will be entered into the national crime computer. If your property is located the agency finding it will know who it

belongs to by your DL number, and that it is stolen by its entry in the computer. Through this operation a tighter case can be formed against the criminals involved.

The Sheriff's office will be conducting several meetings through-out the county. This program is conjunction with the National Sheriff's Association and has been proven effective in other counties and states. This program not only helps in the recovery of stolen items, but prevents thief through knowledge and visibility of the signs and stickers.

Irving Wallace, whose books have sold over 200 million copies, is one of the most widely read authors in the world. A new novel in the Gruver Library by Mr. Wallace is titled; **THE SEVENTH SECRET.**

Every week a tall, attractive, older woman named Evelyn Hoffmann makes her regular visit to the bustling downtown district of West Berlin. If one looked closely one might detect that she bears an uncanny resemblance to Eva Braun.

But how can that be? Eva Braun was supposed to have committed suicide with her husband Adolf Hitler in the underground depths of the Fuhrerbunker forty years ago. Could Eva Braun possibly still be alive and was Hitler really dead when the Soviet army surrounded his hidden bunker?

Thus, in Irving Wallace's new and most suspenseful novel, begins the search into one of the great mysteries of modern times - and the attempt to solve the mystery by young Emily Ashcroft, a beautiful Oxford historian, and the diverse group of people who become dangerously involved with her.

Weeks earlier, Emily's father, Sir Harrison Ashcroft, writing the definitive biography of Der Fuhrer, had come to Berlin to learn if Hitler and Braun had really died there or lived on, as he suspected, to survive into the present day. When Sir Harrison is killed in a freakish hit and run accident that appears to have been murdered, Emily goes to Berlin to unravel the mystery her father had been pursuing.

In Berlin, Emily's path crosses those of a compelling cast of characters: Rex Foster, the Los Angeles Architect who discovers a provocative missing blueprint; Nicholas Kirvov, the Leningrad museum curator who acquires one of Hitler's undated paintings that raises a startling question; Tovah Levine, the Israeli agent whose hunt for Nazi fugitives becomes more than a routine mission; and Wolfgang Schmidt, the menacing and enigmatic chief of police for West Berlin. In the no man's-land of the Berlin Wall, each of them will find his or her life changed by the dramatic discovery of the seventh secret.

Mixed drink tax

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent checks totaling \$11.3 million to the 220 counties and 425 cities as their share of the state's 12 percent mixed drink tax collected during the third quarter of 1986. Hansford County receives \$446,791.

The Texas Legislature raised the tax from 10 percent to 12 percent in 1984.

Bullock said the state collected \$48.3 million in mixed drink taxes for the third quarter, compared to \$49.4 million collected during the same period in 1985.

Texas cities and counties now each receive a 12.5 percent share of the tax collected on mixed drinks sold within their boundaries under the law that legalized the sale of mixed drinks in the state. Cities and counties received 15 percent rebates until the rate was changed in 1984.

Of the total \$48.3 million in state collections, counties received \$6 million, down from the \$6.1 million received during the third quarter in 1985. Cities received \$5.3 million, down from the \$5.7 million rebated to cities last year during the third quarter. The state's general revenue fund received the balance.

Bullock said \$36.9 million was deposited in the state's general revenue fund from third quarter collections, compared to \$37.5 million collected in third quarter 1985.

The mixed drink tax is collected by the Alcoholic Beverage Commission and city-county rebates are sent out quarterly by Bullock's office.

Final Planting Date November 15

November 15 is the Final Planting Date for Insured Barley and Wheat in Hansford County, Texas, according to Jackie Harris, a representative for the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation (FCIC).

Insured Barley and Wheat planted by November 15 must be reported by November 30 in order to receive full Crop Insurance Coverage. The Acreage Report reflects the actual Acreage planted and reported by the farmer.

"During the Growing Season, if damage occurs, notice should be given promptly," Harris said.

Crop Insurance based on actual production history (aph), is available this year to producers of Wheat, Barley, Oats and Rye in addition to Corn, Grain Sorghum, Soybeans, Peanuts, Cotton, Rice and other Crops.

"Increasingly, our Insured Producers and discovering that with a yield guarantee which reflects production capability, Crop Insurance establishes a Farm Income Floor. Thus, Cash Flow and the ability to repay a loan may be more accurately projected," explained Harris.

"Don't Mess with Texas"

The state's tough-talking antilitter program has made litterbags and bumper strips touting "Don't Mess with Texas" so popular that the highway department has trouble keeping them in stock.

Texans who missed getting a litterbag or bumper strip will now find them available free at all State Department of Highways and Public Transportation offices and Texas Tourist Bureaus.

"We distributed one million litterbags and 500,000 bumper strips in a two-month period when they were first introduced last spring. Initially, we expected that quantity to last us six to eight months, but we just couldn't keep them in stock," said Don Clark, director of travel and information with the highway department.

"We are encouraged by their popularity. Research indicates that states with active litterbag distribution, combined with a strong public

awareness program, are making major progress in reducing litter," Clark said.

Last month, the highway department released figures showing that litter had declined 29 percent since the "Don't Mess with Texas" program was implemented.

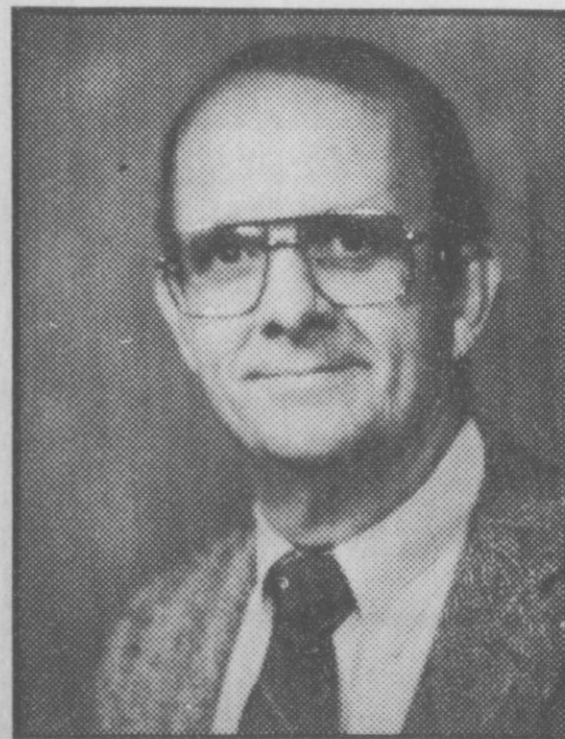

Winterization

With winter approaching, the Public
Utility Commission reminds con-
sumers that now is the time to
"winterize" homes for energy sav-
ings.

Furnaces should be checked at the
beginning of the heating season by a
qualified service person to ensure
efficient operation. Consumers should
stress procedures for improving effi-
ciency of the unit when requesting the
service. Make sure the safety fea-
tures are operating correctly and do
not operate the equipment until any
problems have been corrected.

Check for air leaks in your home by
holding a lighted candle near windows
and doorways. If the candle flutters
even slightly, you probably need
weather stripping or caulking. For a
small investment, you can improve the
comfort level of your home, and
reduce your heating bills at the same
time.

Heat loss through windows during
the winter can be costly and uncom-
fortable. Movable insulation, such as
thermal curtains and shades, and
interior and exterior shutters, can help

reduce this heat loss. It allows full
benefit of the window during the day,
when free solar heating and lighting
are available. And at night when the
insulation is in place heat loss will be
reduced, which lowers heating bills
and increases the comfort of the home.

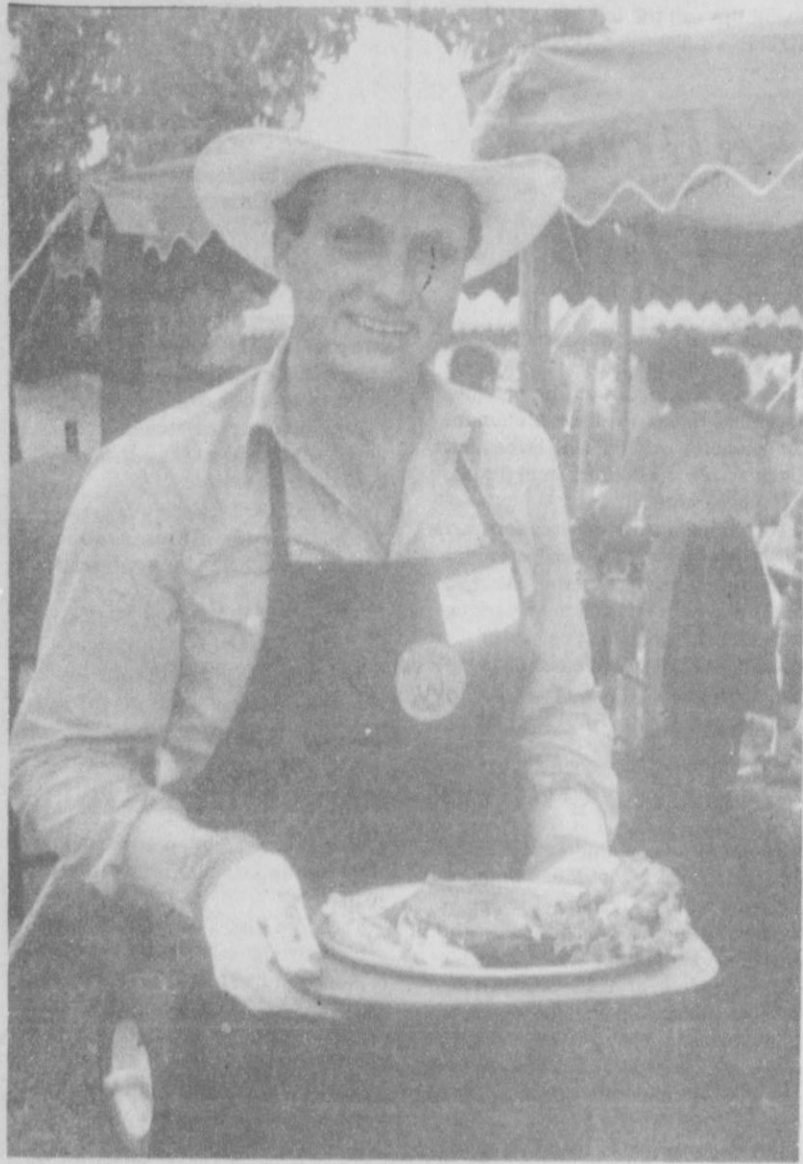

Mesquite Grilled Steaks with Green Chiles

CORRECTION

6 (1 1/2" thick) rib-eye steaks
 1/2 tsp. salt-free herb & spice seasoning (Ms. Dash)
 1 1/4 cup teriyaki sauce
 2 Tbs. browning & seasoning sauce (Kitchen Bouquet)
 4 Tbs. worcestershire sauce
 2 (4 oz.) cans whole green chiles, sliced in strips
 If possible, use mesquite coals from wood fire; otherwise soak mesquite

wood chips 1-2 hours. Place steak in shallow dish; sprinkle one side of each steak with herb & spice seasoning. Combine next 3 ingredients and pour over meat. Marinate 1 hour. Prepare charcoal fire in grill; let burn 15 to 20 minutes. Cover coals with soaked mesquite chips. Remove steaks from marinade and grill over medium-hot coals for 6-8 minutes; turn, placing 3 strips of green chiles on each steak. Grill an additional 6-8 minutes or until desired degree of doneness.

Safety Tips

Now that October is here, children may be thinking about whom they would like to be on Halloween this year. The Scott and White Department of Emergency Medicine would like to share these ideas to help insure a safe evening on October 31.

*Make each costume short enough so the child won't trip when going up and down steps.

*Use bright colors or big patches of white to give good visibility.

*Use fire-retardant fabric or treat material with a chemical fire-retardant.

*When making masks or hoods, allow large enough holes to assure easy breathing and good vision. Better yet, use makeup or face paints instead of a mask.

*If face paints are used, make sure they are designed for this purpose, are nonpoisonous, and wash off easily.

Other suggestions for a safe Halloween include:

*Prevent fires by using small flashlight -- not candles -- to light jack-O-lanterns.

*Do your trick-or-treating before dark, especially if you have young children, and go with them. Set a curfew for older children and enforce it.

*Instruct children to stay in their own neighborhoods and to call only on people they know and trust.

*Remind children to use sidewalks rather than cutting through yards and

vacant lots to prevent tripping over objects.

*Give each child a flashlight and remind them not to shine them into anyone's eyes, especially a driver's.

*If your child get sick, try to find out exactly what he or she ate and where it came from. Call your doctor immediately or contact the Poison Control Center at Scott and White, (817)774-2005.

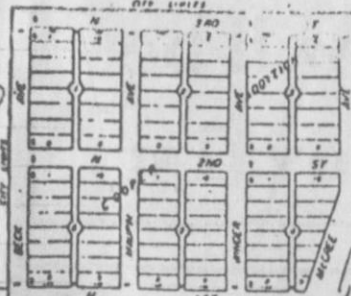

Steele has taken Gruver misfortunes this season in stride

David Steele has seen a lot happen this year to his Gruver football team.

➤ To begin with, the Greyhounds moved up a class, from District 1-1A to District 1-2A in the UIL's re-districting in January.

➤ Combine that with having only 19 players on the varsity.

➤ Injuries, as they have with others, plagued his team early. After his team began 3-1, he lost four players — three to injuries, one to grades — leaving him with 15 varsity gridders and some junior varsity replacements.

➤ "Out of those 15 who we have left, we had two guys miss games with ankle injuries and one miss two games with a shoulder injury," Steele said.

➤ His split end, Steve Duncan, counted upon heavily in the team's passing attack, wound up playing a total of about 2½ games this season due to concussion problems that also ended his playing last season in

the second game.

"He was a big loss because he was a two-way starter, plus the punt returner and the kickoff returner and all of those things," Steele said.

All of that and more occurred in Steele's first year as head coach. At the tender ripe ol' age of 28 — he'll be 29 on Nov. 6 — he's experiencing some problems that some coaches hardly ever go through.

Steele, if not the youngest head varsity football coach in the Panhandle area, is surely among the kiddie corps unit. And he received somewhat of a rude awakening this season, after joining the Gruver program three years ago at the same time as Barry Haensch, the coach whom Steele succeeded.

But the Panhandle State graduate has taken everything in stride as his team has tumbled to 3-4 overall, 0-3 in District 1-2A with Gruver's toughest opponents — Stinnett and Panhandle — still to come.

"It really has been tough because we have a lot of kids playing out of position," said Steele, a high

school quarterback who moved from Hooker, Okla., to Spearman after his junior year, when his dad received an assistant coaching job under then-Spearman mentor Greg Sherwood.

"The kids have accepted the challenges real well and I've been pleased with the way they've come through and played some of those spots," Steele said. "It's hard to take a running back who doesn't catch the ball very much and move him out to split end and say 'We want you to catch it all the time now.'"

That's what happened with No. 3 running back Brian Gillespie, who played in the backfield but now is a flanker. For a team averaging 25 passes a game, having receivers who are true receivers is important.

"We moved up a JV quarterback and moved him out to flanker," Steele said. "They've been alternating that spot and shuttling plays."

"It's been frustrating having to deal with all of the injury problems.

You're going to have injuries every year and you're going to have to deal with them. But we just had a few more than a normal season."

Haensch, who still lives in Gruver and watches the team play, said in addition to finding replacements, the move from Class 1A to 2A always is tough.

"It's like I told somebody not too long ago," Haensch said. "Class 1A teams don't make too much of a difference, but in double A, it's like playing Wheeler every week instead of once a year."

"Early in the season, before the injuries took their toll, they were playing good football. They're still playing good football, but because of injuries ... it's not the same football team that started the season."

Steele said the most important thing he's learned this year as the head honcho has been coordinating the weekly practices to fit the upcoming game plan. But one thing he's learned is he wouldn't change anything he's done this season.

"I think we fit our offense and

our defense the best we could, but the injury factor just had a lot to play in it lately," Steele said. "Because a lot of the people we were looking at in the beginning of the season aren't with us now, we've had to make some adjustments in the personnel and ... in the offense and defense. But overall, I think I would have pretty well stayed with the things I've been doing."

Steele coached for a year in Ulysses, Kan., before Haensch interviewed him for the Gruver assistant's job. Even though Steele was 25 when he took the job, Haensch realized that he wouldn't embarrass himself as a coach.

"He had a good knowledge of football," Haensch said. "He worked well with the players. He had their respect. He got along well with them. He was mature for his years. Those were the things that impressed me the most."

While Steele may have been mature for his age, his first year as the head man might give him some of
