## 320 ACRE ACT PASSES

## The Homsteader Can Now File on Three Hundred and Twenty Acres

Washington, D. C., May 11 .--By vote of 139 to 74 the house today passed the Mondell bill, providing for homestead entries of 320 acres, instead of 160, mineral, non-irrigable, unreserved and nonappropriated public lands in Colorado, California, Idaho, Montana, Nevada, Oregon, Utah, Washington, Wyoming, Arizona and New Mexico.




