Original Reports are Produced in Bursum Investigation.

FROM SANTA FE NEW MEXICAN.
F. M. McMahon, former secretary of the Colorado Title and Trust Company, at Colorado Springs, who was the expert who investigated the accounts of the Territorial penitentiary under the Bursum administration for sever years under and by direction.

Governor Herbert J. Hagerman, reached the city last evening and at the Palace. Mr. Mc-Mahon came on private business.

As soon as Traveling Auditor Charles V. Safford, referee in the suit of H. O. Bursum against the Territory of New Mexico pen in the Third Judicial Distric Court for the county of Socorro, heard of Mr. McMahon's arrival, he called on the later and requested him to appear before the referee in the pending suit for and on be-half of the Territory, that his testimony might be taken in the cas in reference to the correctness of his report as expert in the investi gation

Mr. McMahon flatly declined to give his testimony voluntarily Whereupon referee Safford issued a subpoena citing Mr. McMahon to appea. before him forthwith as such witness. This was turned over to Sheriff Charles Closson of this county at 11 o'clock this morning.

Shortly before noon Sheriff Cl on succeeded in locating Mr. Mc-Mahon and served a subpoena on him. Accordingly, although evisomewhat reluctantly the expert reported at the office of Traveling Auditor Charles V. Safford at 1:30 and the taking of his testimony was commenced. How testimony was commenced. How ever, it developed that the original report to the Governor of the Ter-ritory prepared and made by this expert has disappeared from the official files of the executive office and had been taken away by the ex-Governor. The expert declined to testify from memory or from any data or papers, except this original document which evidently reposes now safely within the precincts of the Hagerman home. How the ex-Governor came to take with him an official document elonging to the Territory naturally the expert could not explain or if he knew he would not.
