

# The Fourth in Victoria, B.C. THE CLUB LOVE FEAST

THE NEWS received a copy of the Daily Colonist this week, published at Victoria, B. C., which contained an account of the Fourth of pelloding that city by the American residents. Among by the speakers were Judge A. A. Freeman and J. O. Cameron, both formerly of Carlsbad.

Jubge Freeman was the speaker of the occassion and responded toast, "The United States, its Past, its Present and its Future." Among other things Judge Freeman spoke of the Foreign Policy of the United States, and said in part:

The United States will never be able to impose her government on the Phillipines, nor on any other unwilling people. No peo-ple have ever yet been able to do that. Great Britain, whose form of government is better adapted to the administration of a colonial policy than that of any other country, is being confrotned with colonial prob-lems that will tax to the uttermost British statesmanship. When in support of that policy it was declared in the British parliament \_nearly years ago that England had conquered Ireland, an eminent British statesman instantly replied that it was not English arms but the English constitution that conquered Ireland. But we are told that we must take no backward step in our foreign policy, must not furl the

"Let us see. We carried it successfully at Lunday's Lane (?) and Chippewa Falls in 1814, and yet today it does not wave over one foot of Canadian Territory, except over your consulate, Mr. Chairman, and floats there only by the consent of the Dominion government. In 1846 we carried it triumphantly at Montamoras, Buena Vista, Cerro Gordo, Monte Rey, and at the very capital city of Mexico, where from the heights of Chapultapiec we gave to the winds of heaven its azure folds, its glowing stripes and its glittering stars! But we did not keep it there. We took it down, furled and brought it home; and yet I never heard that we were thereby disgraced. We might take a lesson from our English brethren. In 1814 the Union Jack was hoisted over the capitol at Washington, or would have been had they not burned


