### CIVIL SERVICE EXAMS ANNOUNCED

New examinations have beer announced by the U. S. Civil Ser announced by the U. S. Civil Ser chologist paying from \$7,030 to \$12,770 a year in Veterans Admin istration installations throughou the country; and Medical Technical Assistant positions paying \$4,490 a year in medical facilities operated by the Public Healti Service in various Federal pena and Congestional, institutions.

To qualify as psychologist, applications must have completed all the requirements for the doctoral degree in psychology and, in addition, have had pertinent experience in clinical, counseling, psysiological, social, of other psychology specialities. Private practice in the field of psychology will not be credited in this examination. Applications must be filed with the Central Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, Veterans Administration.

Assistant, applications must have
had appropriate job experience,
training, of education that enables
them to give nursing care and
treatment. Persons appointed to

the jobs will be given training for approximately 1 year. Those who is satisfactorily complete the training period will be promoted to positions paying \$5,470 a year. Those who do not complete it satisfactorily will not be retained. The Public Health Service desires men for these positions. Applications must be filed with the Board of U. S. Civil Service Examiners, U. S. Public Health Service, Department of Health, Education and Welfare, Washington 25, D. C.

### WALTER ROGERS

For this week's newsletter, I am taking the liberty of passing on to you an article which was placed or the Congressional Record by my good friend, Congressman Frank Bow of Ohio. You will note that this article was published in the Rotary Graph, a publication of the Weslaco Rotary Club. Having beer a long time and ardent member of the Rotary Club and a good friend of Frank's, I have no hesitancy in passing this story along, together with some comments of my own.

KNOW THIS MAN?"

"The Rotary Graph, a publication of the Welasco Rotary Club, has passed along this little story, source unknown. It is almost as funny as it is tragic."

"A young man lived with his parents in a public housing development. He attended public school, rode the free school bus, and participated in the free lunch program. He entered the Army, then upon discharge retained his national service insurance. He then enrolled in the State University, working part time in the State Capitol to supplement his GI Education check.

"Upon graduation, he married a public health nurse and bought a farm with an FHA loan and thenobtained an RFC loan to go into business. A baby was born in the county hospital. He bought a ranch with the aid of the veterans' land program and obtained emergency feed from the government.

"Later he put part of his land in the soil bank and the payments soon paid out his farm and ranch. His mother and father lived very comfortabley on the ranch on their social security and old-age assistance checks. REA lines supplied electricty. The Government helped clear his land. The county agent showed him how to terrace it; then the government built him a fish-

pond and stocked it with many fish. The Government guaranteed him a sale for his farm products

"Books from the public librar were delivered to his door. He banked money which a Government agency insured. His childre grew up, entered public schools ate free lunches, rode free schools ate free lunches, rode free schoolsuses, played in public parks awam in public pools, and joine the FFA. The man owned an automobile so he favored the Federa highway progress."

"He signed a petition seeking Federal assistance in developing an industrial project to help the economy of his area. He was a leader in obtaining the new postoffice and Federal building, and went to Washington with a group to ask the Government to build a great dam costing millions so that the area could get cheap electricity".

"He then petitioned the Government to give the local air base to the county. He was also a leader in the movement to get his specific type of farming special tax writeoffs and exemptions. Of course, he belonged to several farmers' organizations, but denied that they were pressure groups.

"Then, one day, he wrote his Congressman: 'I wish to protest these excessive governmental expenditures and attendant high taxes. I believe in rugged individualism, I think people should stand on their own two feet without expecting handouts. I am opposed to all socialistic trends and I demand a return to the principles of our Constitution and the policies of States' rights."'

Thus ends the story that appeared in the Congressional Record. We do not know who was the original writer of this story, but it is obvious that he was deeply impressed by many of the government programs that seem to get all the attention and publicity, since he made no reference to some of the hidden subsidies which are being the control of the cont
