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Visitors Come From Near And Far

Although the numbers did not appear to be any greater than years past, more people came from greater distances than heretofore, since the Homecoming was held at an earlier date and did not interfere with children in school, or those who are teachers.

Several came from California, at least one ex-student and his wife were here from Arizona, others were here from Colorado, Mrs. Carrie Jago of Paducah, Kentucky attended, and several from our neighboring states of New Mexico, Oklahoma and Arkansas were numbered among the visitors. Several of the visitors combined the homecoming trip with that of the Sixtieth Anniversary of the First Meth-

odist Church to make the trip a very memorable one.

The visitors gathered at the City Park for the usual bountiful feed at noon Saturday, along with an hour or two of visiting and greeting of old-time friends, probably not seen for at least several years. One visitor was heard to say that he saw people this visit that he had not seen in 39 years.

LOCAL SCHOOLS START MONDAY

School begins Monday for students of the Quitaque ISD, according to an announcement by Supt. John Mason.

The new school year will get under way with a general assembly in the auditorium at 9 A. M. Monday. From the assembly the pupils will go to their regular classes where they will be issued books, lessons will be assigned and new students will be enrolled.

Lunch will be served in the school cafeteria at the usual time, beginning at 11:30. Lunches will be 30 cents plus a 1 cent tax for adult lunches.

Buses will make their regular runs both morning and afternoon and school will be dismissed at 2 o'clock Monday.

Mr. Mason announces that there will be a faculty meeting in the High School Library at 9:00 Friday of this week.

the Homecoming meetings, the auditorium has been redecorated with a fresh, new coat of paint, as has the cafeteria. The school library has had considerable work there, with almost twice as much shelving space available now. The library has been repainted, the floors have been sanded and refinished and a new counter has been added. Workers have been busy most of the summer indexing and shelving the books that were acquired during the PTA Library Fund and Book drive last spring.

The gym floor has been completely refinished, two badminton courts have been added and plans are for the bleachers to be redone by the time basketball season is here.

The most apparent change to greet the students, however, will be in the laboratory, according to Mr. Mason. The lab has been repainted, a tile floor has been added, a 17-foot cabinet with plate glass sliding doors has been installed; also a tubing closet; the microscope storage has been completely remodeled; and a new six-student lab table has been ordered and is due to arrive any day. Mr. Mason has stated that it would be necessary to have seen the lab "before and after" to really appreciate the difference there.

MRS. JAKE HONEA BURIED TUESDAY AT SILVERTON

Funeral services for Mrs. Jessie Marie Honea, former resident of Quitaque and Silvertown, were held at 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the Silvertown Methodist Church. She was the widow of the late Jake Honea, longtime sheriff of Briscoe County. She died Saturday night in a Clovis hospital.

The Rev. Carl Nunn, pastor, officiated at the service and burial was in the Silvertown Cemetery under the direction of the King Funeral Home of Crosbyton.

Earlier services were conducted at 10 o'clock Tuesday at the King Funeral Home in Crosbyton.

Pallbearers were W. E. Hawkins, Pete Blankenship, Ronald Kitchens, David Schott, Carver Monroe and J. V. Self.

Mrs. Honea, who was 71 years of age, was born October 21, 1891, in Crosby County, was the daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. M. C. Potter. The Potter family moved to Briscoe County several years later and lived for some time south of Quitaque.

After their marriage, Mr. and Mrs. Honea lived for a time in Nebraska before coming back to Quitaque, making their home north of town on the edge of the brakes. They lived there until he was elected sheriff of Briscoe County. After his death in 1948 Mrs. Honea again lived here for a short while before moving to New Mexico to make her home.

Survivors include three sisters, Mrs. Bert Hawkins of Quitaque, Mrs. O. B. Hefner of Crosbyton and Mrs. S. F. Connor of Lubbock; three brothers, Allen Potter, Abilene, Emmett Potter, Ruidoso, N. M., and Martin Potter of Wichita, Kan.

PUBLIC NOTICE
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT NUMBER ONE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 9, 1963. SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 1 proposing an amendment to Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Sections 2 and 4 of Article VI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to read, respectively, as follows: "Section 2. Every person subject to none of the foregoing disqualifications who shall have attained the age of twenty-one years and who shall be a citizen of the United States and who shall have resided in this state one year next preceding an election and the last six months within the district or county in which such person offers to vote, shall be deemed a qualified elector; provided that any member of the Armed Forces of the United States or component branches thereof, or in the military service of the United States, may vote only in the county in which he or she resided at the time of entering such service so long as he or she is a member of the Armed Forces; and provided further, that before offering to vote at an election a voter shall have registered if required by law to do so. The Legislature may authorize absentee voting. This Amendment shall take effect on December 1, 1963.

"Section 4. In all elections by the people the vote shall be by secret ballot. The Legislature shall provide for the numbering of ballots and make such other regulations as may be necessary to detect and punish fraud and preserve the purity of elections, and may provide by law for the registration of all voters. Should the Legislature enact a registration law in anticipation of the adoption of this Amendment, such law shall not be invalid by reason of its anticipatory character."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of the state at an election to be held on the first Saturday after the first Monday in November, 1963, at which election all ballots shall have printed thereon the following: "FOR the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

"AGAINST the amendment of the Constitution of the State of Texas so as to repeal the provision making payment of the poll tax a requirement for voting and so as to authorize the Legislature to provide for the registration of all voters."

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for the election and this Amendment shall be published in the manner and for the length of time as required by the Constitution and laws of this state.
