The Burdens Fronting
The President

As we turn the corner into
the new year, each of us looks
down the long road marked
"1964" to take a reading on
what lies ahead in our personal
and professional futures and in
the future of our Nation. No
man in the United States can
look forward to a more im-
posing array of problems, a
greater mental and physical bur-
den, than those which face the
President. Having been thrust
suddenly into the world's most
critical leadership position by
the assassination of President Ken-
nedy, President Johnson faces
challenges of a magnitude and
delicacy never before faced by a
U. S. President.

I have every confidence that
President Johnson will meet
these challenges with courage,
intelligence, and imagination.
In meeting his responsibilities,
the President will be as aware
as any other American that this
is an election year and that po-
litical considerations require that
he establish a record in his own
name before November. But the
obligation for a President of the
United States to perform well
goes far beyond purely political
considerations; in these times,
the very survival of the Nation
and the Free World can hinge
on how well a President meets
the challenges that are his alone
to meet. President Johnson,
looking down the 1964 road, can
find his resources tested in an
endless parade of problems
involving our relations with the
world: Cuba continues under
armed Communist domination,
a Red thorn in the side of the
Western Hemisphere; the costly
and near stalemated war con-
tinues in South Viet Nam—a
war bringing a rising toll of
American casualties; South A-
merican countries are under the

eroding subversive pressures of
Cuban, Russian, and Red Chi-
nese brands of communism;
France, under DeGaulle's
ship, poses problems for the
solidity of the Atlantic Alli-
ance; Italy's new government
contains the threat of growing
neutralism in that country and
more problems for NATO; the
political storm is rising in Brit-
ain, with an election showdown
between the Conservative and
Labor parties likely to come this
spring; Berlin remains a Cold
War tinderbox, as does the con-
tinued division of Germany; the
European Common Market cre-
ates new trade challenges for the
United States; our balance-of-
payments deficit, created pri-
marily because of our commit-
ment to stand off Communist
thrusts beyond our shores, de-
fies easy solution; the threat ex-
ists that France and Red China
will soon become members of
the "nuclear club;" Russian
subversion is again posing
threats to the new states of
Africa; tensions are rising in
the Mid-East; the so-called
"non-aligned nations are resist-
ing firm ties to either the free
or Communist worlds while
seeking the favors each can be-
stow, and thereby are creating
new problems in the delicate
power balance. There are other
problems no less vexing than
these—and each requires that
the President of the United
States give close and judicious
attention.

Domestic problems, all per-
meated with controversy, in-
clude tax reduction and reform;
civil rights; the level of defense
spending and the assignment of
defense expenditures; farm
problems (including wheat);
medical care legislation; aid to
education; unemployment; and
many others. The foreign aid

program, under constant fire for
a number of years and sure to
remain mired in dispute, could
be termed a program half do-
mestic and half foreign in na-
ture. The importance of pro-
posals regarded as purely do-
mestic is heightened by the ab-
solute necessity of the United
States to maintain its economic
stability so as to be able to work
in the world from a position
of strength.

But foreign affairs policies,
programs, and strategies are
paramount considerations for a
President who, by the Consti-
tution, is charged to function as
the chief architect of American
foreign policy. With the other
Presidents who have held that
lonely post in the years since
World War II, President Lyn-
don Johnson is well aware that
a serious mistake in foreign
policy could mean the inciner-
ation of the Northern Hemis-
phere. Despite a phalanx of ad-
visors and staff assistants and
experts of every kind, the final
decisions in the foreign policy
area remain the President's to
make. It is hard, hard, hard—
and very lonely work.

And so, I would urge all
Americans regardless of political
party or political convictions
to respect the President and his
office and the enormity of his
duties; to recognize the Consti-
tutional obligation that is his
to formulate a program of legis-
lation and to lead the Nation's
foreign policy; to acknowledge
the love he shares with us for
our country; to acknowledge
his boundless desire to see our
country prosper in continued
safety and full sovereignty; to
support those programs we can
support, to reject those we can
not support—but to support or
reject in a spirit of good will
and with a willingness to ex-
amine the opposing point of
view; and, of course, to pray to
Divine Providence that our Pre-
sident will continue to have His
guidance and be strengthened
thereby.

This is not a policy making group, but holds the legal papers of the church, has a special relationship to the maintenance of property and other functions of great value to the church. The only office in the church as a whole to which a non-Methodist may be elected is trustee. One of three MAY be non-members of the church, in special cases. This is not true at the present. Each trustee is elected for a specific term of three years, and may succeed himself. This is a special provision so that a continuing experienced body of members may

always be in charge. N. V. Hamilton was elected in 1961; Ollie Nall in 1962; and Bill Woods in 1963; their terms expire three years later. When there are five, two terms expire together on two out of the three years.

The World Service leaflet to be distributed next Sunday is "Do We Still Have A Mission?" It is produced by the Commission on Promotion and Cultivation, and the Division of World Missions. It has a special relationship to the evening study, "Our Mission Today." The subject for this discussion next Sunday evening is "The Church On The Defensive." "In the world you have tribulation; but be of good courage, I have overcome the world." John 16:33. Stewardship of property is the general theme of the morning sermon, from Matt. 6:19-24, "Giving So Much It Feels Good!"
