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This And That About Paving and Another

Commissioners court was held this week to start securing money for the two F.M. roads in the area which have been designated for construction. These are the two south roads, one leading from Quitaque to connect with paving designated in Floyd county, and the other a continuation of the Gasoline pavement to the Motley county line.

Poles were erected by the State Highway Department this week, at the intersection on Main street for installation of a traffic light. Facing east and west the light will be a "blinker caution," and north and south will be a full stop.

The dampness continues and this area received a nice shower Sunday night, registering 22 of an inch on the Quitaque gauge. However, in some areas, south of town particularly, about an inch was reported.

So far, moisture for August totals 90 inch. Rainfall in August, 1948 was 2.98 inches.

Former Quitaque Man Injured in Car Wreck

A Clarendon man was fatally injured and a companion seriously hurt in a car accident about 10 p.m. Monday on a curve west of Goodnight on Highway 287.

Dead is Leslie Pickering, 33. James Marvin Freeman, 26, 605 Osage, Amarillo, received a fractured right leg and possible internal injuries, according to Adair hospital attendants in Clarendon. His condition was described as "as well as can be expected."

The accident occurred at the first curve west of Goodnight, according to highway patrolmen, when the car in which the men were riding failed to make the turn.

Officers said the car, a 1941 Chevrolet, apparently went out of control, skidding to the south side of the highway and then back to the north edge of the road, where it overturned.

The car rolled over twice, officers said, and landed on its wheels. The men, both unconscious as a result of the accident, were taken to the Adair hospital in a Murphy-Spicer ambulance.

Marvin Freeman is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Luke Freeman of Odessa, formerly of Quitaque. His wife is the former Miss Billy June Mayhall. Mr. and Mrs. Freeman went to Clarendon upon receipt of the message of their son's accident, stopping in Turkey to notify relatives there.

A window glass was broken out and the pickup was dented up some but no one was hurt, only frightened out of their wits. They got the vehicle upright and went on to Roaring Springs and enjoyed the day with the folks.

JAMES FAULKNER IS INJURED IN CAR MISHAP

James E. Faulkner was severely hurt in a car accident early Tuesday morning at Oklaunion, between Vernon and Electra, and is in the Veterans hospital at Amarillo. Extent and seriousness of his injuries were not available to the Enterprise Thursday morning.

It was reported that he had a badly cut shoulder and cut leg and that the ligaments in his hip were torn loose, probably necessitating an operation.

His sisters, Mrs. Bill Farley of Turkey and Mrs. Wayne Whittington of Quitaque, were called to the hospital about 10 o'clock Tuesday morning, accompanied by their husbands.

Mrs. Farley called Tuesday night and stated that the doctors at that time did not believe James was internally injured.

No details of the wreck had been learned at press time.

School District Election Slated For August 20

An election is slated for Quitaque Independent School District to be held at the high school building Saturday, August 20.

The recent enlargement of the district by consolidation of the Kent, Gasoline and Edgin districts makes the election necessary. These districts in previous years sent students to Quitaque schools by contract, but they are now included in the Quitaque Independent School District and have a voice in setting tax rates, etc.

Qualified voters are urged to cast their ballots. A qualified voter is one who has rendered some property in this district for taxation.

Two propositions are to be submitted to vote. One to set the tax rate, the other to assume the indebtedness of the enlarged district.

Following is a statement from Supt. H. W. Cross in regard to the election, and condition of the school.

The school board met Monday night and ordered an election for bond assumption and tax equalization for the new Quitaque Independent School District. It is necessary to do this now due to the fact that the recent consolidation with the other districts which we have been serving did away with the old tax rates. The election is to be held on Saturday, August 20 at the high school building.

At that time there will be two propositions to vote on. One is assumption of the bonded indebtedness of the district. There is outstanding on the old Quitaque district a bonded debt of \$98,500 and on the Edgin District there is \$2000 making a total of \$100,500. Now this is not a bond issue but merely the amount of the debt at the time of the consolidation.

The second issue to be voted on is a new uniform tax rate for the district which shall not exceed \$1.50 on the \$100.00 valuation for any one year. This is the rate which was effective in the Quitaque and Edgin districts.

The qualified voters are urged to go to the poll and support these measures on election day. In so doing you will be making your contribution toward building a better school. If we are to keep abreast with the times then we must be ready to make the necessary changes which are prerequisites of progress. Our children are our most prized possessions. Let's give them the best that we have in the way of opportunities.

School will open on September 5. At that time we hope to see all of the boys and girls back who were with us last year. This time we are also expecting some new people to enroll with us and we are going to do our best to have a program that will interest every one.

BROTHER OF E. E. BURGESS DIES IN ARKANSAS

Guy Ernest Burgess, age 50, died Tuesday, August 2, in a Morrilton, Ark., hospital. He was a half-brother of E. E. Burgess of Quitaque.

He was a pharmacist, and operated a drug store in Plumerville and Atkins, Ark., for many years. The past few years he had been employed as pharmacist at the Corner Drug Store in Morrilton.

Mr. Burgess was a member of the Atkins, Kans., chapter of the Masonic lodge, and Masons were in charge of services at the grave.

Survivors are the wife, a daughter and two grandchildren; the half-brother, E. E. Burgess of Quitaque and three half-sisters.

Fred Jones Dies In Electric Chair

Huntsville, Aug. 9—Soothed by his religion, W. Fred Jones, Floydada grocer, walked to the electric chair in the state prison Tuesday night for a second time.

Jones died shortly after midnight. The State Board of Pardons and Paroles ruled at Austin Tuesday there would be no further recommendation for clemency.

"May the will of God be done," Jones, 40, a convicted murderer, said when he learned of the pardon board's action.

On Sunday, Jones had been saved from the chair by a dramatic last-minute stay. As he reached the death chamber, an order from Governor Shivers stopped the execution and gave Jones three more days of life.

Governor Shivers had granted the stay on recommendation of the pardons board which had been told it would receive new evidence in the case.

But the ruling of the pardons board Tuesday said, in effect, that the new evidence had failed to materialize.

Don Reid Jr., Huntsville newspaperman; B. C. Anderson, prison chaplain and Mrs. Minnie Watters of San Antonio, member of the American Prison Chaplain's Association, carried the bad news of the pardon board's ruling to Jones.

They handed him a copy of an Associated Press dispatch from Austin. He read it carefully, then folded the dispatch and placed it between the bars of the cell.

"Well, I feel like all things are well," he said. "My trust in Him has never wavered."

"I am praying for those who dislike me and hate me, and I am going out of this world tonight, praying for their souls."

Jones, a veteran of World War II, shot H. C. Love of Floydada in front of Jones' Floydada grocery store Sept. 27, 1946. Love also was a veteran of the last war and a holder of the Purple Heart.

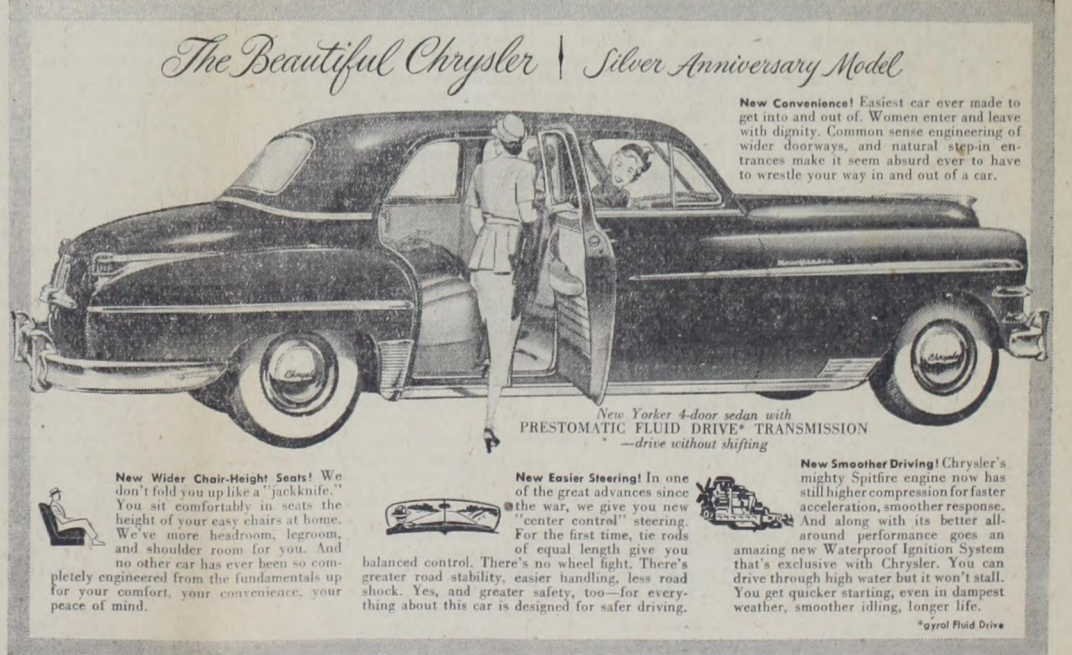
