Rogers Wins Congressional Race Grewe Chosen For Sheriffs Office

The turnout at Quitaque for the election Saturday was splendid, 314 votes being cast at the Quitaque box. The local voting went very much on the same pattern as the rest of the district and state.

Raymond Grewe shaded out Bill Hardin by a small margin in the only local race, for the office of Sheriff, Tax Assessor-Collector of Briscoe county, winning by 84 direction of Daniel Funeral Home.

Grewe had a short lead in all boxes except San Jacinto and Antelope. Returns show the following: Silverton, place 1—Grewe 142, Hardin 103; Quitaque—Grewe 179, Hardin 129; San Jacinto- Grew 11, Hardin 26; Antelope—Grewe 6, Hardin 11; Silverton, place 7— Grewe 89, Hardin 82; Silverton, place 8—Grewe 593, Hardin 509.

In the congressional race, Rogers carried every box in the county with the totals: Altavene Clark 404, Walter Rogers 654. At Quita-que vote was Clark 94, Rogers 203.

The Lt. Governor's race showed a county total of 638 for Ramsey and 405 for Pierce Brooks. At Qui-taque, Ramsey 182; Brooks 101. John C. White of Wichita Falls



REPORT ON FLOOD DAMAGE

their monthly meeting Tuesday
August 1. The flood damage
that has been occuring for the

These farms had the major portion of planned practices applied on them prior to the heavy rains. Cecil Purcell, chairman of the board, said the treated farms stood up very well. Most of the damage occured on terraces where runoff cured on terraces where runoff runoff was due to terraces giving from other land occured. Purcell away on the adjoining farm. thinks it is very necessary to start terracing and contouring at the top of slopes and work down. 
